
#### PISTOL SQUAD

### ELIGIBILITY AND ENROLLMENT FOR THE MEDICAL INSURANCE PLAN

#### FAMILY BENEFITS

When a single employee marries and wishes to change from the Single to the Family Plan, application should be made at the Personnel Office. If the application is made within 90 days of the date of marriage, no medical examination will be necessary. After ninety days evidence of insurability will be required.

#### MATERNITY BENEFITS

Maternity coverage for the wife of an employee with a Family Plan becomes effective nine months after the application for family benefits is approved.

#### STUDENT BENEFITS

When the child of an employee becomes 19, his coverage under the Family Plan is automatically cancelled. By payment of an extra premium equivalent to the premium paid by a single employee, children over age 19 are eligible for coverage if they fulfill all of the following conditions:

1. They are unmarried and make their home with the employee;
2. They are fully dependent upon the employee; AND
3. They are attending school on a full-time basis.

Application should be made at the Personnel Office within 90 days from the date of starting school as defined under Condition #3.

## ARCHERY CLUB CONTEST AND TOURNAMENT

**Archers take note!** There will be a handicap flint round shoot on Sunday, January 27, at 2:00 p.m. First, second, and third place medals will be awarded. The men's handicap will be figured on 80% of the difference between 200 and your score. The women's handicap will be figured on 100% of the difference between 200 and your score. The top score you can shoot on a 28 target flint round is 280. There is a registration fee of twenty-five cents.

Whoever establishes their average on Sunday will be ready to compete in the "Goat Tournament" which is to be held during the month of February. The archers will be able to shoot with their challengers in the Gym on Monday nights or, by prior arrangement, on Friday nights and anytime Saturday and Sunday. If the weather is good, the archers can use the flint round target at the outdoor range. This will be put in condition to use.

The rules for the "Goat Tournament" are as follows:

At the start of the tournament, each club member is given a "goat." This can be any kind of token. Any member may then challenge any other member to a match for his "goat." Anyone receiving more than one challenge may not pick his opponent, but must play the first challenger. Handicaps are used, of course. When a player wins his match, the loser must surrender his "goat." The loser can still challenge any other member who possesses a "goat," either his or one he has won. Before he challenges he must replace his lost "goat" with a "kid" to be purchased from the tournament chairman for twenty-five cents. The "kid" also may be lost, in which case another must be purchased. Whenever a "goat" is won, the winner is back on a non-paying basis.

The tournament will run through the month of February with contests taking place whenever two members can get together.

A record of "goat-play," and the location of "goats" will be kept and posted in the Gym where it is available to players who wish to find out the status of the contest. The winner will be the person who finishes the tournament with the most "goats."

Any new archers are welcome to join this contest and tournament. Come out and establish your handicap on Sunday, January 27, at 2:00 p.m. Join the tournament, but don't let anyone get your "goat!"
