## BNL VISITORS


The Trustees' BNL Committee met at the Laboratory on March 2 and 3.

## BERA FILM SERIES

### Francois Truffaut's JULES AND JIM

**Thurs., Mar. 5 - Lecture Hall - 8:30 p.m.**

Francois Truffaut was the originator of the New Wave, but is paradoxically the closest link with the classic French cinema of the 1930's. For sheer vitality of characters, beauty of landscapes, and evocation of a period, all suffused with an extraordinary musical setting, "Jules and Jim" can only be compared with Renoir's pre-war masterpieces, "Une Partie de Campagne" and "Rules of the Game."

If Truffaut's first film, "The 400 Blows," was the classic well-made film, and his next, "Shoot the Piano Player," a wildly experimental one - then "Jules and Jim" is surely a fusion of both. In it, his mastery of cinema technique is dazzling yet somehow unobtrusive. And though once France's best-known critic, he is essentially a born story teller. His tale of the quixotic Catherine (played by Jeanne Moreau) who loves two men is endlessly fascinating in all its twists and turns.

## WARNING! WATCH OUT FOR "DETERGENT GASES"

Recently a peculiar type of accident struck two housewives undertaking a household chore in separate locations but under similar circumstances. Both were using an ordinary lavatory cleanser. Dissatisfied with the way stains were being removed, each decided to add a household bleach and stirred the mixture with a brush. As a result, one died quickly – the other spent a long, long time in the hospital.

Another example – according to a government medical newsletter, twenty people were overcome a short time ago by toxic gases released from a do-it-yourself cleaner, a brew of chlorine bleach, ammonia and a cleanser.

What occurred in each of these cases was the generation of a poisonous gas when the users decided to combine two or more cleaning agents commonly found in almost every household. The addition of the old familiar chlorine bleach (a sodium hypochlorite solution) to an acid or acid-producing substance, such as a lavatory cleanser or just plain vinegar, will suddenly release a quantity of toxic chlorine gas. Similarly, when it is mixed with other alkaline matter – ammonia or lye – the chemical action liberates a highly irritating gas. If inhaled, these fumes can cause serious injury and possibly death.

Don't make the mistake of thinking that, because certain household products are good and useful, a combination of them will do the job better.
