**(THE GREENGAGE SUMMER)**

"Loss of Innocence" is a screen exploration of a young girl's sudden awakening to love and jealousy. It is based on the widely-read novel, "The Greengage Summer" by Rumer Godden and filmed in color in the champagne country of the Marne River in France. Susannah York received critical praise for her performance as the girl who takes charge of her younger sisters and brother when they become stranded in a chateau. Kenneth More plays the mysterious English guest who befriends them and sees his own affair with the chateau-owner (Danielle Darrieux) torn apart by her jealous resentment of her innocent younger rival.

"After some of the recent pictures we've seen about young girls in love and about the brazen, barbaric behavior of certain precocious kids, it is soothing, if not electrifying, to sit down and watch a genteel film about well-brought-up British children learning the facts of life in a French chateau. When the exercise also embraces some beautiful color scenes of the champagne country in the summer and some pleasant sight-seeing around Rheims, including a visit to the Cathedral, it is one to recommend." —NEW YORK TIMES



2. Children must be eight years of age or four feet in height.
3. Each child will be scheduled for a specific day once a week.
4. A fee of \$2.50 per child must accompany application. (Make checks payable to BERA.)
5. Children will report at the Swimming Pool not earlier than 12:50 p.m.
6. Classes will end at 2:30 p.m. Offsite children must remain in the Pool Area until picked up by parents. On-site children must remain in the Pool or proceed directly to the apartment area.
7. Children will pay daily admission fee (.35) or present season ticket to enter Swimming Pool.
