

COUSTEAU'S UNDERWATER FILM TO BE SHOWN AT BNL THIS WEEK

On Friday, April 17, the Brookhaven Divers' Club, in cooperation with BERA, will present an unusual film and lecture: the exciting official films of Captain Jacques-Yves Cousteau, presented and narrated in person by Owen Lee. Captain Cousteau is renowned as an underwater pioneer and the inventor of the aqua-lung. Lee is the only English-speaking member of Cousteau's staff. The film will be presented in the Lecture Hall on Brookhaven Avenue, beginning at 8:00 p.m.

The Cousteau film was shot in thrilling color by skilled teams of divers using batteries of powerful underwater lights. It follows the divers of Cousteau's famous oceanographic research ship, the "Calypso," as they explore the unknown depths of the Red Sea, the Mediterranean and the Caribbean and encounter the bizarre forms of life that inhabit them.

Among other revelations, the audience will see Cousteau's divers among hordes of sharks, gathering new forms of algae which promise to become a mainstay of our future diet, exploring uncharted reefs with underwater electric motor-scooters, and capturing beautiful fish for the aquarium in the Oceanographic Museum of Monaco. The audience will also witness experiments with the revolutionary Deep Diving Saucer, a two-man submarine designed to explore the continental shelf, and the bathyscaph, which plumbed the oceans to a depth of seven miles. They will also learn how these startling innovations may affect man's future well-being on earth.

Captain Cousteau created the award-winning book and film entitled "The Silent World," as well as a more recent book, "The Living Sea." Owen Lee's diving exploits were featured in the book, "The Treasure Divers of Vigo Bay." He has produced a color film by the same name which will also be shown on Friday as an added attraction. His "The Complete Illustrated Guide to Snorkel and Deep Diving" is considered the most definitive book on skin diving ever published.

**LAWRENCE TEAM WINS
NASSAU-SUFFOLK
TEAM-OF-FOUR BRIDGE EVENT**

For the past six months, bridge teams-of-four from Nassau and Suffolk Counties have been competing in a knockout event. After six rounds of play, with the original 40 teams diminishing successively to 32, 16, 8, 4, 2, and finally 1, the lone surviving team is that captained by BNL's Leslie Lawrence. Partnered with Sandy Wagner and two non-Laboratory employees, the team narrowly won their first match, but then proceeded to romp through their remaining matches with large margins of victory.

International Match Point (I.M.P.) scoring was used. A 28 board match is typically won by 5 to 30 I.M.P.'s. Lawrence's team won by an average of 46 I.M.P.'s per match. The final match was played against the top-seeded Nassau team which consists of four life masters many times over. At half-time, the local team led by 55 I.M.P.'s and breezed in by 59, despite losing 35 points on the last four boards.

Each member of the winning team will receive a trophy and about fifteen master points, a commodity dear to the heart of all bridge players.

Lawrence and Wagner, who won last year's United States International Par Championship (sponsored by the National Industrial Recreation Association), three weeks ago scored 97 out of a possible 100 in this year's event. They are now anxiously awaiting the results from the rest of the country. First prize is a trip to Bermuda.
