BERA FILM SERIES Ingmar Bergman's MONIKA



Thursday, Mar. 19 - Lecture Hall, 8:30 p.m.

One of Bergman's least sympathetic, yet curiously touching, female figures is Monika, played by Harriet Andersson, a lower-class, sexually-experienced girl who embarks on a love affair with a gentle middle-class boy (Lars Ekborg). He throws up his job in a stockroom, borrows his father's cabin boat, and sets off with Monika for an idyllic summer in the Swedish north woods. Traveling without money or equipment, they rough it for several weeks in scenery beautifully photographed by Gunnar Fischer, but as the summer wanes Monika announces she is pregnant, and they return to Stockholm and married life in a cramped apartment. Harry tries to work and go to night school while Monika grows increasingly restive and impatient at his inability to keep her in pretty clothes, light entertainment, and an aura of romance. Their marriage quickly disintegrates, leaving Harry with the baby and Monika headed for a life of grimy prostitution.



SCOTCH DOUBLES BOWLING TOURNAMENT

A Scotch Doubles Bowling Tournament is set for 3:00 p.m. Saturday, April 11, at the Port Jeff Bowl. A maximum of 64 teams can participate, so sign up early to make sure you don't get left out.

THE RULES

1. A team shall consist of two bowlers, one male and one female. At least one member of each team must be a BNL employee (per BERA definition). Anyone who has bowled 12 or more games in any organized league from September 1963 to March 13, 1964 is eligible.
2. The tournament shall consist of 4 games per team, bowled across two pairs of lanes. Each team will bowl a single score for each game with the **team members alternating balls rolled**. The first ball to start each game will be rolled by the **female** member of the team.
3. Team handicap shall be arrived at by averaging the two bowlers handicaps which were calculated per regular season BNL League rules (80% of the difference between bowler's average and 200). Seventy pin maximum for men.
 - a. Bowlers in BNL League this season use BNL average as of March 13, 1964.
 - b. Bowlers not in BNL Leagues this season, use **highest** current league average as of March 13, 1964.
 - c. Bowlers without current averages, some earlier averages may be used, check with Recreation Office or Tournament Committee for applicable rules.
4. Prizes will be based on gross team scores and awards given as follows:
 - 1st Place Team, 4 game series - Two trophies and 6 bottles of Scotch.
 - 2nd Place Team, 4 game series - Two trophies and 4 bottles of Scotch.
 - 3rd Place Team, 4 game series - Two trophies and 2 bottles of Scotch.
 - 1st Team High Gross game - Two trophies.
 - 2nd Team High Gross game - Two trophies.
 - 3rd Team High Gross game - Two trophies.

The above prizes are guaranteed for the minimum of 40 entries. Additional prizes will be awarded based upon the number of team entries in excess of 40. No ABC or WIBC prizes.

5. Team entry fee, including the cost of bowling, is \$4.50. Entry blank and fee must be presented at the Recreation Office not later than 3:00 p.m. on Friday, April 3. **No entries** will be accepted **after** the first **64** have been received. The fee is non-refundable; only in the event that the minimum number of team entries (30) is not reached will the fee be refunded and the tournament called off. Teams not present and ready to bowl at the start of the tournament will forfeit the team fee.
6. The rules of the BNL Bowling Association are adopted for this tournament except as otherwise stated herein.
7. Decisions of the Tournament Committee shall be final.
