BERA FILM SERIES

FRANZ KAFKA'S THE TRIAL



Thurs., April 30—Lecture Hall, —8:30 p.m.

A master's film, from one of the great novels of our Age of Anxiety, Orson Welles' screen interpretation of Franz Kafka's "The Trial" has stimulated more discussion, because of its originality and cinematic brilliance, than any other picture of 1963.

Mark Van Doren has said of Kafka's original story that nobody could read it without being disturbed to his very foundations... "The Trial" is about a young man named Joseph K., perfectly commonplace and successful, who is arrested one morning and accused of a nameless crime. The rest of the story concerns his attempt to find out who is accusing him. The difficulty that Joseph K. has in understanding what is going on is, in itself, Kafka's commentary about the fact that we in the modern world have ceased to understand the nature of the universe; human destiny is not simply what we can see on the surface of our existence.

The many levels of meaning of Orson Welles' film, the astonishingly pervasive comic aspects as well as the nightmare brilliance, have been explored at length in a critical essay by Ernest Callenbach, editor of "Film Quarterly," in the Summer 1963 issue. An excerpt is quoted below:

"The film is an attempt to create a nightmare world, rather like that of

DR. LEONARD HAMILTON NAMED HEAD OF DIVISION OF MICRO- BIOLOGY AT BNL

Dr. Victor P. Bond, Chairman of the Medical Department at Brookhaven, has announced the appointment of Dr. Leonard D. Hamilton as Head of the Department's Division of Microbiology. The appointment became effective on April 20, 1964.

Dr. Hamilton succeeds Dr. Bond, who resigned from his position as Head of the Division to take over the Chairmanship of the Medical Department in July 1962.

Born in Manchester, England, Dr. Hamilton received the following degrees from Balliol College, Oxford: B.A. in 1943, B.M. and B. Ch. in 1945, M.A. in Medicine in 1946, and D.M. in 1951. He also received an M.A. in 1948 and a Ph. D. in 1952 from Trinity College, Cambridge.

Dr. Hamilton first came to the United States in 1949 to continue his medical work. After holding various positions in this country, he joined in 1954 the Sloan-Kettering Division of the Graduate School of Medical Sciences, Cornell Medical College; in 1956 he became an Assistant Professor of Biology, and in 1959 an Associate Professor of Biology at that institution.


