BEYOND THE CALL OF DUTY . . .

Weekly Employees - You almost didn't get paid last week! Since it was a short week (only three working days), the payroll computation and printing of pay checks had to be scheduled late Thursday afternoon or Thursday evening. HARBOTTLE OFF TO VIENNA TO HEAD U.N. RESEARCH LABS

Dr. Garman Harbottle, Chemistry Department, has been given a two-year leave of absence to serve as Director of the Division of Research and Laboratories at the International Atomic Energy Agency in Vienna, Austria. This organization is a United Nations Agency which promotes research and applications of atomic energy for peaceful uses.



Dr Harbottle will direct research activities at IAEA labs in Vienna, and Seibersdorf in Austria and a third in Monte Carlo. He will also coordinate the international exchange of nuclear data, plan scientific conferences on an international level, and administer research contracts with IAEA member nations.

WANTED: TECHNICAL BOOKS, JOURNALS FOR OVERSEAS SCIENTISTS, UNIVERSITIES

For the past two years, many BNL staff members have donated their technical books and journals, when no longer needed, to the Engineers and Scientists Committee of the People-to-People Program. This voluntary organization then distributes such material to universities and libraries in the developing countries, notably in the Far and Middle East, the Balkans, and Latin America.

Those who have contributed so generously to this worthy cause, and others who may still wish to participate, will be interested in the following extract from a letter recently received.

"The Engineers & Scientists Committee is now incorporated in the District of Columbia and has embarked upon a program of expansion. We hope to soon have in operation three or four collecting centers in the vast Los Angeles area and another in the San Francisco-Bay area. Interested groups in northern New Jersey and in Massachusetts are also making plans to start col-

lecting material to send overseas to colleges and universities in the countries of their choice. It is also hoped that a center will soon be established in the mid-west in Detroit."


"All these new centers will mean that our program of sending much needed technical literature to professors and students overseas who cannot afford them will be able to reach many more of these deserving people."

An article in the August issue of CHEMICAL ENGINEERING PROGRESS (pages 36-37) describes the program in considerable details, and shows how it has grown from a modest beginning, when 3,800 journals were sent to eight foreign organizations, to the figures for 1964, when over 45,000 journals and 4900 books went to 47 organizations.


