
### Power Failure Prevented Grand Slam

## DOZERS AT WORK

## ON NEW CAFETERIA SITE



**PROPOSED LECTURE HALL-CAFETERIA**—Architect's model of the new Lecture Hall-Cafeteria shows the proposed design of the \$2.3 million building. The structure will be built of reinforced sprayed concrete or stucco and will be located about 300 feet northeast of the present cafeteria.

This morning bulldozers started clearing the site of the new Lecture Hall-Cafeteria in order to take test borings for the foundation design. The proposed new building will be located about 300 feet northeast of the present cafeteria and will straddle Columbia Street. When the building is completed, sometime in late 1967, Columbia will no longer be a through street.

The first of three phases that Federally sponsored construction must go through is complete, namely Title I. This phase consists of approval of site selection, preliminary design and preliminary data. The A.E.C. has authorized Title II to proceed. This consists of the preparation of working drawings, specifications and bidding documents; Title III will be the actual construction. This construction is expected to begin sometime next Spring.

The proposed \$2.3 million building is being designed by the Office of Max O. Urbahn, Architects and Seelye, Stevenson, Value and Knecht Inc., Engineers. This building will have a gross area of 53,000 square feet and will contain a 750-seat cafeteria and a 450-seat lecture hall. The present cafeteria seats 450 with the coat racks down, 400 with them up. In addition to the lecture hall itself, there has been a provision made for four meeting rooms, which can be used by small groups. When the lecture hall is completed, it is expected to accommodate symposia and conferences of high caliber. BNL, at present, is at a disadvantage because of its limited conference facilities.

## AND THEN THE LIGHTS WENT OUT . . .

It started out just like any other late-afternoon Tuesday. In the Gym there were a couple of basketball games going. Several **Judokas** were making Great Circles on their way to the mat. In the swimming pool there were about 30 people splashing about and down at the Brookhaven Center the guests were assembling for the Medical Symposium Dinner.

In the Accelerator Department, crews were going about their accustomed duties; and at the reactors, operators were monitoring their panels as they always do. Up at the Print Shop, the Classified Ad Supplement of the Bulletin Board was on the press; and in the men's residences, there were thoughts about where to eat dinner. The solid mass of headlights along Bell Avenue had dissolved to an occasional glow, and it looked like it was just going to be another Tuesday night. And then the lights went out.

At the HFBR, the operators on duty noticed an unexplained power flux on their gauges; before the darkness came, they shut down the reactor. Then the propane auxiliary generators came on. The graphite reactor's instruments sensed the power drain and started the shut-down procedures; the crew helped it along with the manual controls. Actually, the reactors and the accelerators go down about six or eight times a year because of power failure; so this was old hat to them. As Robert Powell, Head of the Reactor Division, put it: "This was no different than the other power failures we've had, it just lasted longer." That same comment might apply to all the technical departments; with a couple of exceptions, things went quite smoothly. The exceptions were automatic equipment that failed to go on automatically. They were soon set by hand.

Laboratory Director, Dr. Maurice Goldhaber, who was on site when the

lights went out, said: "I was happy to see that standard emergency procedures designed for this sort of situation went into effect so smoothly. With a few minor exceptions, it went like clockwork. I was especially impressed with the utilities men, and others, who came in automatically - without being telephoned - to do their jobs."

When the lights went out, the Lab Police under Captain Wocel cordoned off the gate to check who was coming and going, and started a prowl-car patrol around the site. The Fire Department answered six alarms during the blackout - none serious; and the big problem seemed to be how to get enough candles, quickly enough, to light the Medical Dinner at the Center. (They did.)

At the printing plant, all was not so smooth. The presses stopped with ink on the rollers and plates in contact; and, in the words of Carl Thien, "it was a real mess." They cleaned up the presses by the light of matches and cigarette lighters, and they all went home.

The swimming pool's battery-operated emergency lights lead the swimmers out of the pool; but in the locker rooms, where they tried to dress by the light of matches, it was a cross between a fraternity hazing and a ragamuffins parade. At the Gym, with no lights whatsoever, many just gathered up their clothes in their arms and went home as was; the others resembled their compatriots caught in the pool.

Those living in the residences sort of drifted over to the Brookhaven Center, where it was said that the bar did a brisk business by candlelight. Perhaps the greatest presense of mind in the area was possessed by the manager of the Bohack Supermarket in Shirley, who was heard yelling at his clerks to light candles from the shelves - "But not the 49 cent's, use the ones marked 19 cents."





### CLASSIFIED AD POLICY

The use of the classified section of THE BULLETIN BOARD is a privilege accorded to individuals employed at the Laboratory, to retired employees, and, in some cases, to the families of recently deceased employees. The following rules apply to all three classes of users (hereafter referred to as employees).


4. Ads are run on a space-available, first-come-first-served basis; ads not carried because of space reasons will be held for inclusion in the next issue.
