Two in Physics Shifted To New Appointments

Two members of the Physics Department have been named to administrative posts. Dr. George Vineyard, Chairman of the Physics Department, has been appointed Associate Director, a post most recently held by Dr. Charles Clark, now with the National Science Foundation. Next year, when Dr. G. Vineyard retires, Dr. Clark Williams, the Lab's Deputy Director, will move into that position.

Dr. Vineyard, whose research interests are in solid-state physics, joined BNL in 1954. In 1961, he was named Chairman of the Physics Department, a position he will hold concomitantly with his new duties until a new Physics Department Chairman is appointed.

The second member of the Physics Department to move into a new job is Donald K. Poillon, the department's Administrative Officer. Mr. Poillon moves to the Director's Office today, September 1, as Executive Assistant to Dr. Rodney L. Cool, BNL's Associate Director for High Energy Physics.

Mr. Poillon, a 1957 graduate of Hofstra, joined the AUI Audit Staff in 1962 as an accountant. He moved to the Physics Department in 1963. In his new post he is responsible for the broad administrative duties associated with the coordination of high-energy physics programs.

Theatre Group Holds Tryouts For Fall Play



'Atoms in Action' Irradiators Dedicated to Otto Kuhl

When the AEC's two touring "Atoms in Action" exhibits open in Dublin, Ireland, and Managua, Nicaragua, this fall, their cobalt-60 irradiators will bear plaques indicating that the irradiators have been dedicated to their designer - the late Otto Kuhl.

Mr. Kuhl, Supervisor of the Nuclear Engineering Department's High Intensity Radiation Development Laboratory, and an irradiator designer of international repute, died suddenly last June while attending a symposium in Germany.

According to Charles Pelzer, the AEC's Assistant Director for Exhibits, a dedication of this sort is unprecedented within the AEC and singularly honors Mr. Kuhl, "who was such an important part of the 'Atoms in Action' program."

"Atoms in Action" comprises two traveling exhibits - one in Europe, the other in the Western Hemisphere - designed to show the populace of countries abroad the many peaceful uses of atomic energy. Also, the program offers technical assistance and use of facilities to scientists and institutions in the host country. Since its inception in 1958, more than six million people in 27 countries have toured the exhibits.

Mr. Pelzer said that an inscribed bronze plaque would be fastened to the guard rail around each irradiator. The plaques made in the BNL shops were presented to the AEC by Bernard Manowitz, Head, Radiation Development Division, Nuclear Engineering Department, in a simple ceremony. They are inscribed: "Dedicated in Memory of Otto A. Kuhl, 1910 to 1966, Brookhaven National Laboratory, Designer of this facility and enthusiastic supporter of the USAEC international program."


Swimming Pool Schedule

Vermont Soliciting Bids For Nuclear Power Plant

Central Vermont Public Service Corporation and Green Mountain Power Corporation is set to award a construction contract for a large nuclear power plant in Vermont.

Albert A. Cree, chairman and chief executive officer of Central Vermont, said competitive bids have been received from Westinghouse Electric Corporation for a 490,000-kilowatt nuclear plant using a pressurized system and from General Electric Company for a 540,000-kilowatt nuclear plant using a boiling water system.

He said the plant is expected to produce power at a cost of about 4-10th of a cent per kilowatt by its second year of operation, less than half the cost at which Central Vermont currently buys most of its power.

Argonne's R&D, Tech Information Sent to Industry

A program to disseminate information to industry is being launched by the Argonne National Laboratory.

The purpose of the program is to identify technological innovations resulting from research and development projects, to prepare brief, business-oriented summaries of these innovations, and to distribute the summaries to industry.

It is anticipated that many of the innovations, even though originated in connection with nuclear work, will be of interest to non-nuclear industry, including small businesses.

For the most part, the summaries will consist of information that customarily is not reported in the scientific literature.

The AEC will evaluate the Argonne program after a year of operation. If the program appears to have benefited industry, consideration will be given to expanding it to other AEC-supported research facilities.

The AEC and the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, as part of their coordinated technology utilization program, will issue a series of publications to be known as AEC-NASA Tech Briefs.

The Briefs will be processed by NASA, distributed by the AEC and NASA as well as the eight NASA regional dissemination centers and sold by the Clearinghouse for Federal Scientific and Technical Information, Springfield, Virginia.

Duke Power Co. Orders Its First Nuclear Facility

Duke Power Co. joined the many electric utilities turning to nuclear power for their generating needs by announcing plans for a \$157,138,000 atomic power plant.

The Duke Power nuclear plant will be built in South Carolina at a site on Lake Keowee, about 10 miles north of Clemson.

The 1,644,000-kilowatt generating capacity expected from the nuclear plant when completed in 1971 and 1972 represents about one-third of the utility's current generating capacity of 4,800,000-kilowatts.


