## Applied Math's New Computer Is the World's Most Powerful


Concomitant with the Applied Mathematics Department's move into their new quarters was the delivery of their new computer system. The Control Data Corporation 6600, now being installed, is the most powerful computer in existence today.

Eleven independent computers make up the system: the central processor, a high-speed arithmetic device, performs calculations and data processing while 10 peripheral processors provide the control and perform the input and output of data and programs.

The 6600 can perform an addition in 400 billionths of a second and a multiplication in 1000 billionths of a second, but this is not the ultimate in the machine's bag of tricks. Working at full throttle, up to ten operations can be performed simultaneously in the central processor and a new instruction can be issued every 100 billionths of a second.

The CDC 6600 replaces the IBM 7094 which will remain in the old location and will be devoted primarily to Bubble Chamber problems. A spokesman from the Applied Math

Department said that their scientific and programming staffs are squared away in their new quarters and are available to help users convert their programs from IBM 7094 to the CDC 6600.

## The Federal Telecommunications System

The Federal Telecommunications System (FTS) is a direct dial, station to station, government telephone system designed to carry telephone calls between the federal government, its agencies, and their contractors.

BNL was tied into the FTS in July, 1964. Initial experience indicated that many improvements were needed for adequate service. Therefore, the AEC and GSA entered into an agreement whereby the Laboratory would use the FTS only for calls to other directly connected points; the balance of official long distance calls would be placed commercially. This rule came

about because it was difficult to reach off-net telephones over FTS and 92 percent of all long distance calls were to off-net telephones.

New circuits have added to areas which could not be reached by the network. Additional FTS operators are available to help with your off-net calls. Since the Lab pays its share of the overall FTS costs, all the calls placed over FTS are in essence already paid for; long distance calls over the Bell System are extra.

There are FTS Telephone Directories still available: call the Communications Group, Building 179.

## Ad Policy

The use of the classified section of *The Bulletin Board* is a privilege accorded to individuals employed at the Laboratory, to retired employees, and, in some cases, to the families of recently deceased employees. The following rules apply to all three classes of users (hereafter referred to as employees).

1. All items for sale or rent must be the property of an employee.

2. No want ads will be accepted for property associated with a full or part-time business. This includes merchandise, automobiles, real estate, etc., acquired for purposes of resale.

## Jewel Brown & The All Stars Will Be Here Too!

Appearing with Louis Armstrong at the Theatre will be vocalist Jewel Brown, and the fabulous All Stars. The All Stars feature Danny Barcelona on drums, Buddy Catlett on bass, Tyree Glenn on trombone and Buster Bailey on clarinet. This talented group has played the world over, and always the raves have been the same - spectacular.

Background on the group reads like a who's who of the jazz world Tyree Glenn first played with Eddie Mallory's Band, then with Benny Carter. In 1940 he was featured, along with Dizzy Gillespie, Jonah Jones and Cozy Cole, in Cab Calloway's band. From 1947 to 1950, he was with Duke Ellington. He appeared for seven years on the Ted Steele Television Show and has played nightclubs around the world.

Buster Bailey started on the clarinet more than 50 years ago. He was a

member of W.C. Handy's Band, participating in the first public performance of that composer's biggest hits, "St. Louis Blues" and "Beale Street Blues." He was an illustrious virtuoso with Coleman Hawkins and Joe Smith for more than a decade and was one of the first jazzmen to tour Europe extensively.

Buddy Catlett has played with Count Basie, Coleman Hawkins, Horace Henderson, Johnny Smith, Quincy Jones and Chris Hamilton.

Danny Barcelona, the popular drum master, had his own sextet and has toured throughout the Far East. He has been with the All Stars since 1958.

## BERA Film Series

### 'Sawdust and Tinsel'

To film connoisseurs, director Ingmar Bergman is one of the very few contemporary film makers who can be called an artist. Here is a searching intellect, preoccupied with the largest questions of good and evil; a master of film imagery; a particularly subtle stylist who combines what he has learned from the world's theatre (Strindberg, Schnitzler, the German stage after World War I) with the most personal expression of Freud, the New Testament and Scandinavian mythology. A Bergman film may remind one of source materials, but it always bears its own cachet.

'Sawdust and Tinsel' illustrates an important phase in Bergman's career. As John Gillett wrote in the program for the London National Film Theatre's Swedish film retrospective, it "is a study in humiliation and sadism. In this film, Bergman takes a long sustained look at the darkest side of the human personality. The plot development includes scenes of hysteria, eroticism, nudity, and is often reminiscent of the masochistic German school of the 1920's. There is also some pity and truth in the characterization of the circus director and his mistress. Lighting, decor and music are all used to build up a dark and sinister atmosphere."
