## From Russia With Relief

It was a Tuesday night, and I should have been at the lanes in Port Jeff getting stuck for the first beer game with that noble group of bowlers known as The Losers. Instead I was pulling back the lace curtain which covers the window of the restaurant in the Hotel National in Moscow, and was looking at the

scientific information centers in the Soviet Union to learn operations and techniques of the Soviet scientific information system by observation and discussion.

A blue light in the distance turned out to be the neon light of the Uzbekistan restaurant two blocks down the fogged-in wet street. Clustered about its locked door was a group of diners waiting to get in. When we announced we were Americans, the crowd parted, the door opened and a free table was waiting for us in a packed restaurant. An evening of

## British Nobel Laureate Dr. Kendrew, To Lecture

Nobel Laureate Dr. John Kendrew, Deputy Chairman of the Medical Research Council Laboratory for Molecular Biology, Cambridge, will give a seminar on "Chemical Interactions and Protein Conformations" on Tuesday, May 10. The session will be held in the conference room of the Medical Building at 3:30 p.m. Dr. Kendrew was awarded the 1962 Nobel Prize for Chemistry for work on the structure of myoglobin.

Dr. Kendrew's visit to this country is being sponsored by the Symposium on the Relationship Between the Biological and Physical Sciences at Columbia University.

The Symposium, organized by Dr. Samuel Devons, Chairman of Columbia Physics Department and supported by the New York State Science and Technology Foundation, comprises a series of visits by outstanding scientists in the field of biological and physical inquiry.

## Dr. Jacob Bigeleisen Elected to National Academy of Sciences

Dr. Jacob Bigeleisen, Senior Chemist and Chairman of the Brookhaven Council has been elected to the National Academy of Sciences by its Members.

Founded over 100 years ago, the Academy acts as an official advisor to the government on matters of science and technology. Membership in this prestigious organization, which now totals 745, is not only a favorable comment on a scientist's accomplishments; it also indicates that he is esteemed by his colleagues.

Since its inception, the Academy has been concerned with all manner of scientific and technological projects, from the development of antibiotics, to the selection and training of aircraft pilots. One of its most recent projects was the recommendation of the Lab out of 200 applicants as a possible site for the planned 200-BeV accelerator.

As a member of the Academy, Dr. Bigeleisen joins with Dr. Maurice Goldhaber, BNL Director; Dr. Samuel Goudsmit, Physics Department; and Dr. Donald D. Van Slyke, Medical Department, who are also members.

Dr. Bigeleisen's work is concerned

with the general subject of isotope chemistry. His original and outstanding contributions give him the position of a pioneer and leader in this

field. He has developed a comprehensive theory of kinetic isotope effects which is widely known as "The Bigeleisen Formulation" and which has opened the way for a new and fruitful approach to the the problem of obtaining detailed information on the intermediates in chemical reactions known as activated complexes.

His more recent work on the effects of isotopic substitutions on vapor pressures has provided a new tool for investigating the liquid and solid states. His researches have thus, through the use of isotopes, had a significant impact on very fundamental areas of chemistry. He has contributed directly to the development of practical methods for separating isotopes of importance to the U.S. atomic energy program. Aside from his wartime work on the gaseous diffusion method for uranium isotope separation, his efforts have helped to achieve significant improvements and economies in the separation of uranium, hydrogen and other important isotopes.

Dr. Bigeleisen received the American Chemical Society's 1958 Award for Nuclear Application in Chemistry. In 1964 he was one of five U.S. scientists to receive the Atomic Energy Commission's E.O. Lawrence Me-

Kremlin shining in the mist, and the glowing red stars fixed to the towers inside the walls. It was 10:45 p.m.: we'd been in the dining room since 6:30 p.m.

Each night our group had arrived at the dining room at an earlier hour, hoping for faster service, but our check would never be presented until 10:45.

It seems waitresses are paid by the hour in the Soviet Union and use every trick in the trade to avoid serving new customers.

Lunches were also leisurely and graciously served, but often we had to conclude them as rapidly as possible so that we could get on with our business.

This business was to visit seventeen scientific and technical libraries and

exotic food (but good!), strange faces and wild music ended with the vocalist facing our table and singing a nostalgic "Auld Lang Syne" - a warm and friendly gesture to foreigners far from home.

Moscow would take no prize as a beautiful city. The only buildings of inspiration and grandeur are the cathedrals - an architectural form never pursued by the Soviets. Streets are wide, however, and the spring thaw which arrived with us soon filled many of the boulevards with water. One morning a speeding truck passed us on the left sending in a sheet of brown water which covered our driver, the windshield, the ceiling and dashboard. We overtook the offender, forced him to the side of the road. To my surprise, I noticed that three Soviet citizens who had seen the incident and who had followed us, got out of their cars to act as witnesses for our driver. A practice which we sometimes suspect is often neglected in the U.S.

In spite of this incident, courtesy toward each other and visitors was very apparent. In the famous Moscow subway, I hesitated too long and was pinned between the closing doors. A young soldier standing nearby immediately helped me pry them open just as the train began to move.

After seventeen days in the capitol, I was ready to board the Red Arrow, the crack Soviet train to Leningrad. The accommodations are luxurious to the Russians, but would only get a rating of fair in the U.S.

Each compartment has two berths and is often shared by members of the opposite sex. There was a good deal of speculation in our group because we had an uneven number of men and women.

It meant that one of us would be bunk mates with our attractive young

Russian guide (female, of course). At the last moment her boss decided to come along, so the matter was quickly settled. *C'est la vie!*

Each car had a samovar heated by charcoal and glasses of tea were served shortly after we'd left the station. It was good medicine because in spite of a road bed rivalling the L.I.R.R. in unevenness, I went to sleep fairly quickly.

The shocker in Leningrad was a beautiful cathedral now used as a museum of religion and atheism. Nearly all exhibits and displays emphasized the theme that religion was based on superstitions and ignorance; that the church in Russia was an oppressor of the poor and a supporter of the aristocracy. The other side of the history of religion was never shown.

Our visit wound up with two elaborate parties and memories of the Bolshoi and Kirov ballets, the circus, the Moiseyev dancers and the realization that a day can be longer than twenty-four hours because the last few before our departure seemed interminable.

When I got back the Losers were still loosing!

## Letters To the Editor

### Mondo Cane or Caveat Emptor?

The *Bulletin Board* of August 25, 1965 carried a film review on *Il Mondo Cane* in which the reviewer termed that study in cinematic sensationalism "one of the most critically maligned films of recent years." Those who saw the film enjoyed the theme music if not the film fare. A few may have been taken in by the so-called "radiation, or Bikini Atoll sequence." This section showed a number of ostensibly mixed-up fish, reptiles and birds.

A close reading of a transcript of the sound track discloses some "facts" which would not have survived the critical scrutiny of a high school biology student. "Birds learned that if they wanted to survive, they mustn't come out (of their underground shelters) at all . . ." That "instinct . . . was transmitted to the following generations." This bit of whimsy follows the genetic theories of Lysenko which were accepted by party-liners in Italy at the time of the film's production.

The birds are Wedge-tailed Shearwaters one of the most widespread shearwaters of the Pacific. Its common name is the "Black Burrower". The outer toes of these birds are

stronger and calloused due to their use in digging nesting burrows in the sand. (*Atoll Research Bulletin*, November, 15, 1963, No. 99, National Academy of Sciences - Pacific Research Board, Washington, D.C.)

Fishes that crawl out on the mudflats and up the slanting mangrove roots are real, not sick-sick-sick! These fishes, called mud-skippers, are found along the humid Asian and South American coasts. They are not found on the comparatively arid atolls. Sea turtles are extremely rare around Bikini.

The University of Washington (Seattle) Laboratory of Radiation Biology, in co-operation with the AEC, sent a scientific team to Bikini and Eniwetok in August, 1964. The color film footage they took have been made into a 23 minute film just released by AEC. Called *Return to Bikini*, it shows conditions on the Atoll six years after the last nuclear detonations. There is little resemblance to the Italian film. This is no surprise! The makers of *Mondo Cane* never put ashore at Bikini or Eniwetok.

**Heartbreak House Cast Probes Shaw's Character Motivations**

To cross the threshold of *Heartbreak House* is to step into another dimension. A place where the carefully constructed deceptions, shams, and delusions that a human being constructs to hide behind are stripped away.

In this house, the poseur loses his role, the insecure must function without his defenses, and spiritually impoverished become bankrupt. How the assemblage reacts in the catalytic atmosphere of *Heartbreak House* is the tale to be told.

Here's how the players see their parts:



ELLIE DUNN (Eileen D'Arcy): Ellie is the chameleon in the menagerie of "Heartbreak House" characters. The strange assortment of people and events change her progressively from a dewy-eyed romantic to a hardened realist, and finally to an older and wiser version of her first self. Which is the real Ellie?



HESIONE HUSHABYE (Ann Leonard): A born actress who creates drama wherever she is, Hesion is fascinated by other people, and is therefore fascinating to them. She is charming, yet frequently caustic, and a dreadful flirt.



MAZZINI DUNN (George Cox): Although considered to be gullible by the businessmen (whose affairs he efficiently manages), and ineffectual by the idle rich (with whom he comes in contact at "Heartbreak House"), Mazzini Dunn is proud to live by his principles, with his books and his love for his daughter, Ellie.



BOSS MANGAN (Charlie Meinhold): Outwardly a very successful, hard-driving, dominating man. In this house, however, his insecurity and need to be understood and respected, come violently to the surface and he is shown to be the immature childish man he is.



CAPTAIN SHOTOVER (Ron Peierls): Captain Shotover is a man who has always been in control of his surroundings; an individualist who has built his life, even his house, to his own unique pattern. As old age has crept up, he has put up a screen of eccentric senility to help him hide his failing strength. He holds little hope for the future of the world.



HECTOR HUSHABYE (Jerry Friedman): Hector is irresistible to women because of his dashing looks and the equally dashing tales of adventure that he passes off as real. He cannot resist using his charms on any passing target, but underlying his surface gloss and his participation in the mad household that he is so much a part of, is a reluctance to face the world, which he finds too depressing to live in.

ARIADNE UTTERWORD (Anna Passell): Though Ariadne Utterword represents everything Shaw disliked about the British upper classes, she does have the saving grace of a sense of humor. One wonders if some of her more outrageous remarks are not made with the same desire to shock that motivates many Shotover statements. Or does she really believe in the caning of the "British native"?
