Seaborg to Inspect Recommended Sites For 200 BeV Unit

An AEC group, headed by Chairman Dr. Glenn T. Seaborg, will inspect five of the six sites recommended by the Site Evaluation Committee of the National Academy of Sciences for the 200 BeV accelerator this week. The three-day trip will start in the midwest and swing through the Denver and California sites. The Lab will be visited at a later date.

The AEC has indicated that their final choice on the site for the proposed accelerator will come from the locations chosen by the Site Evaluation Committee.

ADP in New Quarters

Administrative Systems and Data Processing Division played host to about 100 last week to celebrate their move into new quarters. ADP moved into the space at 2 Brookhaven Ave-

nue formerly occupied by Applied Math. The roster of guests including representatives from Fiscal, Personnel, Supply and Materiel, the Library, the Director's Office and the Budget Office gives some indication of the scope of ADP's operations.

This group prints the phone book and the payroll checks, and provides information for accounting, job costing, budget and expenses; it keeps stock inventories and capital equipment assignments and personnel records.

The name of the game is control - achieved by a series of interlocking systems and subsystems that are programmed and run through the division's Univac computer. An administrative system is a reporting procedure designed to accumulate information and give it out in a specified form. As Ron Williams, ADP's Division Head, puts it, "A system is defined as a function having input, processing, and output. For example, payroll is a system. Its inputs are time cards, rate changes, tax deductions, bond deductions, annuity options, and so on. Its processing includes computing

AEC Names Five For Lawrence Award


Five scientists have been named for the 1966 E.O. Lawrence Memorial Award for meritorious contributions in the field of atomic energy. The award, named after the inventor of the cyclotron, is presented to five scientists annually.

This year's recipients are: Harold M. Agnew, Weapons Division Leader, Los Alamos Scientific Laboratory, Los Alamos, N.M.; Ernest C. Anderson, member of Biophysics Staff, Los Alamos Scientific Laboratory; Murray Gell-Mann, Professor of Physics, California Institute of Technology, Pasadena, Cal.; John R. Huizenga, Senior Scientist, Argonne National Laboratory, Argonne, Ill.; Paul R. Vanstrum, member of Technical Management Staff, Gaseous Diffusion Plant, Oak Ridge National Laboratory, Oak Ridge, Tenn.

gross hours times hourly rate, subtracting Social Security, Federal and State withholding taxes, savings and loan bond deductions, updating year-to-year salaries, etc. Its outputs are paychecks, payroll registers, W-2 statements, tax reports, labor statistics and management control reports."

ADP is roughly divided into three sections: the systems analysts, who decide the method for acquiring the specified information; the programmers, who translate the system into computer language and procedures; and the operators, who punch the cards and run the machines.


