
Valentine Dance Tomorrow Night

Van Slyke Hailed At White House This Morning

In ceremonies in the White House's East Room this morning, President Johnson presented Dr. Donald D. Van Slyke, Senior Scientist (Emeritus) in the Medical Department, with the National Medal of Science.


This medal, established by Congress in 1959, is given by the President to scientists "who are deserving of special recognition by reason of their outstanding contributions to knowledge in the physical, biological, mathematical, or engineering sciences." The awards are made on the recommendations by the President's Committee on the National Medal of Science.

Dr. Van Slyke was cited for his outstanding contribution to biochemistry over the past 60 years. His pioneering studies in the field of chemistry as related to medicine have laid the foundations for much of the methodology in clinical medicine in practice today. He is especially noted for his studies in blood chemistry and amino acid metabolism.

60 Suffolk Schools Invited to Science Youth Day

Mixed Doubles Bowling Tournament

Saturday, March 12--3:00 p.m.--Port Jeff Bowl

Applications for the mixed doubles bowling tournament must be in by 3 p.m on Friday, March 4.

All new bowlers are welcome--you need not be a league bowler to enter the tournament. Only 64 teams can be accommodated. Here are the rules:

1. A team shall consist of two bowlers, one male and one female. At least one member of the team must be a BNL employee (per BERA definition).
2. The tournament shall consist of three games per bowler, bowled across six lanes.
3. Handicap (per bowler per game) shall be arrived at by using the standard BNL bowling rule which is 80% of the difference between the bowler's average and 200.
 - a. Bowlers in BNL leagues this season use BNL average as of 1/30/66. Bowlers must have bowled at least twelve games to use this average.
 - b. Bowlers not in BNL leagues this season, but who bowl in other leagues this season, use highest current sanctioned average as of 1/30/66. Bowlers must have bowled at least twelve games to use this average.
 - c. If no current average is available, bowlers in sanctioned leagues last winter season use final average. 1965 final sanctioned summer league average will be accepted if none of the above apply. Bowlers must have bowled at least 12 games to use these averages.
 - d. All others use score of first game for first game average; use scores of first two games divided by 2 for second game average; use scores of first three games divided by 3 for third game average.
 - e. Maximum handicap allowed per game for men is 70 pins; there is no maximum handicap for ladies.
4. Prizes will be based on scores plus handicaps, and awards will be given to 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place teams plus ladies' and men's individual high gross game. Awards will consist of Baskets and Bottles of cheer.

The above prizes are guaranteed for the minimum number of tournament entries (30). Additional prizes will be awarded based on the number of entries in excess of 30, e.g., fourth and fifth place teams, second place ladies' and men's individual games. No ABC or WIBC prizes!

5. Team entry fee, including cost of bowling is \$5.00. Entry blank and fee must be presented at the Recreation Office not later than 3 p.m. on Friday, March 4. No entries will be accepted after the first 64 have been received. The fee is non-refundable; only in the event that the minimum number of entries is not reached will the fee be refunded and the tournament called off. Teams not present and ready to bowl at the start of the tournament will forfeit the team fee.

6. The rules of the American Bowling Congress are adopted for this tournament except as otherwise stated herein.

BERA Film Series

Shoot the Piano Player

Our next feature is one of the finest films in my experience. It's a funny, sad picture. I've heard it argued that it is as close as possible to a modern-day Shakespearean tragedy though in form it is about as far from classical drama as possible. I've also heard it argued that the theme is more like, "Isn't it odd? Isn't it sad? We might have been happy but for that funny bounce of fate. Too bad. That's life." Whatever way you choose to look at it, though, the film is a brilliant one with universal appeal.

It has a down-to-earth plot and really fine acting. It's entertaining and continually amusing; watch the cafe song, for example. It has charm and suspense and action and surprises. It's hard to believe that so much has been made out of what is at the core a gangster picture.

Film buffs will note that this is one of Francois Truffaut's films. One of the "New Wave" directors, Truffaut

is acutely conscious of being a film maker as opposed to either a writer, playwright or dramatist. As such, he uses elements whose availability is limited to the film medium, close ups and constant scene switches.

See whether you can spot the scene which was done completely ad lib . . . and can appear as it was done since the best take can be edited into the final film. Some will note that "Shoot

the Piano Player" has already played at the Lab. It is being brought back on demand and on the consensus of the Film Study Group of its excellence.

Here are excerpts of review by Pauline Kael from "Film Culture":

"Truffaut's film busts out all over - and that's what's wonderful about it. The film is comedy, pathos, tragedy all scrambled up-much, I think, as most of us really experience them (surely all our lives are filled with comic horrors) but not as we have been led to expect them in films. . . . Charles Aznavour, who plays the hero, is a popular singer turned actor - rather like Frank Sinatra in this country, and like Sinatra, he is an instinctive actor and a great camera subject.

"... The girl, Marie DuBois - later the smokey-steam-engine girl of "Jules and Jim" - looks like a Hollywood '40's movie type; she would have played well with Humphrey Bogart - a big clear-eyed, crude, loyal, honest girl."

Rounding out our pianistic program is the great Laurel and Hardy short, "The Music Box." This Academy Award winner is explosively funny from start to finish.


Molecular Storage of Biological Information

Dr. Leonard Hamilton of the Medical Department remarks that the entire population of the planet at their earliest stage of development - a fertilized egg - could be carried about in a three-gallon wine jug. Each of the specialized packages contains all the instructions and codes to form the egg into a human. The crux of Dr. Hamilton's lecture will deal with the storage and transfer of this information on a molecular level. The lecture will be supported by slides and models.

BERA Board Slate


