## Information Provided by AGS Challenges Ideas of Particle—Anti-Particle Symmetry

The Alternating Gradient Synchrotron, of late somewhat eclipsed by visions of a 200-BeV Machine, has once again made a major contribution to nuclear physics.

In a Columbia-Stony Brook experiment, using the AGS and the 30-inch bubble chamber, a basic theory concerning the behavior of matter has been challenged.

## Groundbreaking Today For Lecture-Hall Cafeteria

Ground was broken at noon, Thursday, July 14, for the construction of the new Lecture Hall-Cafeteria building following the AEC's award of a contract to the George A. Fuller Construction Company. All employees were invited.

The \$2.3 million building will have an area of 51,000 square feet and will have a 750-seat cafeteria, a 450-seat lecture hall, and four meeting rooms for small groups. Construction is expected to be completed in early 1968.

## Lab's First Electronics Tech Retires

When Porter joined the Lab in March, 1947, Dr. Kuper recalls, "we set him up in an old mess hall - where part of payroll is now - with an oscilloscope, a scale, and I think we scrounged up a soldering iron. He was pretty lonely at this little bench in this big room. I guess he wondered what he'd gotten himself into."

The incipient electronics shop, then part of the Physics Department, was soon spun off into the new Instrumentation and Health Physics Department, where Porter became known for his expertise in meter repair.

Up to now, scientists believed that particles and anti-particles, except for the opposite charges and reversed magnetic poles, were identical and that they behaved alike - that they were mirror images of each other. Now it appears that this is not necessarily so.

The experiment conducted by Dr. Paolo Franzini of Columbia and his wife, Dr. Juliet Lee-Franzini, of Stony Brook analyzed 1,144 instances of the decay of the eta meson. This extreme-



## Cort Retires as Budget Officer 6-1952-66 Dr. Tape Surprise Guest

AEC Commissioner Gerald F. Tape was a surprise guest among the more than 200 who gathered at Brookhaven Center to give retiring Budget Officer H. Russell Cort a warm farewell. Less than 24 hours later, Dr. Tape was back in Washington being sworn in to a second term as an AEC Commissioner by President Johnson.

The fact that Dr. Tape, for 11 years BNL's Deputy Director and a former President of AUI, came all the way from Washington for a retirement party; and the fact that there were over 200 friends, colleagues, and associates at the party are indeed testimonials to the esteem in which Mr. Cort is held. Traditionally, an organization's Budget Officer and its operating divisions have a somewhat stormy relationship.

Since 1947, when Mr. Cort became the first Budget Officer here,

the Lab's budgetary procedures have become an admired model for a national laboratory.

As Dr. Charles Falk, BNL's Associate Director, said during his remarks at Mr. Cort's farewell party: "Russ Cort's abilities as a fine budget officer are well known. Not so well known are his abilities as an educator who had to teach many of us young administrators the 'mysteries' of the AEC Financial Plan and the 'mystique' of such magic letters as DDL, G&S, and so forth." (Distributed Direct Labor, General & Administrative: both are categories of expense).

Mr. Cort has the proper credentials. His first budget in 1947 totaled 70 pages; the one sent in this past June hit 1200 pages.

Following a presentation in which Mr. Cort was given a watercolor on behalf of his friends, Dr. Maurice Goldhaber, Director quipped: "All one needs to have in a good national laboratory is a good Budget Officer

## The Tournament

Contestants are required to familiarize themselves with the posted tournament regulations and to report game results to the Recreation Office as soon as possible.

Trophies will be awarded to the winners of the mixed doubles. First and second place awards will be presented in the men's singles and doubles.

Preliminary matches are to be played during the scheduled week under conditions mutually agreeable to contestants. The finals will be scheduled and announced by the Recreation Office. Balls and volunteer officials will be provided for the finals only.

## The New Rules

## Move To Condemn 725 Acres Along Lab South Border

Condemnation proceedings have been initiated by the Government for the acquisition of 725 acres of land lying along the Lab's southern border.

This is the largest of the three tracts of land totaling 1,595 acres that was asked for in 1965 to provide for normal laboratory growth. Negotiations to acquire the 200-acre tract on the north boundary, and the 670-acre eastern tract are in progress.

A spokesman from the Brookhaven AEC Office said that the condemnation proceedings on the southern tract were necessary because of the failure of the land's owner and the Government to reach a price.

The Government has filed a Declaration of Taking Land with the Federal District Court. The owner can proceed to trial unless a compromise is reached.

The AEC also said that there was no connection between this acquisition and the proposed 200-BeV accelerator.





## Bubble Tracks of the Decay Products of "Eta Mesons"



**NONSYMMETRICAL** - In the photograph, shown on the left side, tracks are seen of positive pions, which travel in many numbers from bottom to top. When a positive pion hits a deuteron - the nucleus of the deuterium atoms that fill the chamber - it interacts to produce two protons and a neutral eta meson. The two protons are depicted as the dark tracks resembling an arrowhead. The eta meson (invisible) disintegrates almost instantly into a neutral pion (also invisible) and a positive and negative pion. The latter two are seen as tracks diverging from the arrowhead vertex. These decay products, particle and antiparticle, were observed to be nonsymmetrical.

ly short-lived particle breaks down into three pions; a positive, a negative, and a neutral.

Under the old theory the negative and the positive pions should have been a particle/anti-particle pair with

no significant difference in behavior. But, according to the Franzini experiment, more than half the time the positive pion moved through the bubble chamber faster than its negative particle, casting doubt on the theory of particle symmetry.

## The Toe You Mow May Be Your Own

The Safety Office has a report of an accident to a member of an AEC employee's family. He was mowing his lawn with a rotary mower, wearing normal soft-toed shoes. The blade of the mower sliced into his shoe cutting off his toe.

Another report tells of a severe eye injury received while mowing a lawn with a power mower. A U-shaped rusty wire or nail approximately an inch long ricocheted, entering the eyeball.

**Freak accidents?** There are 40-50,000 of these "freak" accidents reported annually - some fatal.

Here at the Lab those using power lawn mowers are required to wear safety shoes (shoes equipped with a steel toe cap) and safety glasses. Those not issued safety shoes many purchase them at cost through Supply and Materiel in Building T-100. (Ladies, too).

Safety Plano glasses are available from local ophthalmic dispensers at a reasonable cost. Always insist on safety glass in prescription glasses.
