Ten BNL Administrators, Scientists Abroad for 'Atoms in Action' Program

Nine members of the BNL staff and one from the on-site AEC Office will participate in the "Atoms in Action" demonstration center in Utrecht, The Netherlands next month. The 28-day program is the 19th in a series of AEC-sponsored exhibits designed to illustrate the many peaceful uses of atomic energy for people abroad. Since the Atoms for Action program was started in 1958, more than six million have visited these exhibits. In each case, local university students give demonstrations and short lectures.

Like all other programs in the series, the Utrecht program will have special educational and scientific facets. The educational arm is sponsored by the Oak Ridge Institute of Nuclear Studies and will consist of lectures delivered to groups of students by local high school teachers who have been trained in ORINS programs. Lectures will be aimed at high school students and will include basic physics, and atomic and nuclear structure. There will be a Technical Information Center with books, reports and films available.

The Scientific Institute will have a cobalt-60 irradiation facility for research and demonstrations, and a 10-Kw reactor for training and some isotope production. A conference will provide a forum for the presentation of scientific papers and exchange of information.

BNL staff members who will participate are Dr. Harold Atkins (Medical), who will discuss scanning with Technetium-99m; Dr. Donald Borg (Medical), activation analysis for

trace metals; Dr. Eugene Cronkite (Medical), extra-corporeal blood irradiation; Dr. Paul Craig (Physics), Mossbauer effects; Dr. Herbert Kouts (Nuclear Engineering), reactor safety; Dr. Donald Metz (Nuclear Engineering), radiation chemistry; and Dr. Arthur Paskin (Nuclear Engineering), superconducting magnets.

Mr. Dennis Puleston (Information) is Technical Information Officer; Mr. Joseph John (Instrumentation) is Building Construction Equipment Coordinator; and Mr. John Sears (AEC) is Scientific Coordinator.

HFBR Delivering At Design Flux

Clouds of steam pour from the cooling towers at heat from 60 Megawatts of reactor power - 20 from the Graphite Reactor and 40 from the HFBR - is dissipated into the air. Dr. Eugene Weinstock, Nuclear Engineering Department, has been conducting flux measurement tests since the HFBR reached design power level of 40 Megawatts for the first time last Wednesday.

Dr. Weinstock reports that the new reactor is delivering neutrons "at least equal to design levels." Robert Powell, Head of the Reactor Division, said that the HFBR would be ready for 40 Megawatt operation after a few weeks of design evaluation tests. When the reactor reached 40 Megawatts last week, Gerald Kinne, Assistant Group Leader, said that "all systems performed satisfactorily."

The material is a sprayed-concrete type of finish, and when exposed to weather for a few months, will provide more information on appearance and durability. These panels are experimental and do not represent the appearance of the actual structure, a spokesman said.
