A Word To The Wise Department

Here's a cheery note of caution from Bill Barnes of the Plant Protection and Security Division.

In the ancient city of Nineveh, roads were considered sacred and often inscribed: "Royal Road. Let no man lessen it." Anyone who parked his chariot, wagon or cart on such roads was put to death and his body was impaled on a stake in front of his home.

Brookhaven National Laboratory is hardly this strict. However, it has been noted lately that illegal parking has been spreading-particularly on Bell Avenue and the west side of Center Street. As a clarification, here is a restatement of the BNL parking regulations. Parking is prohibited:

- On Bell Avenue, Cornell Avenue, and Upton Road;
- On Brookhaven Avenue, except where 15 minute parking signs are posted;
- Directly adjacent to building entrances and exits;
- Any posted location;
- On any narrow street or alley where two-way traffic would be hindered or obstructed;
- Within 10 feet of any fire hydrant;
- On any lawn or landscaped area, unless permission to park there has been specifically granted.

Letters To the Editor

Pure Research, Brooklyn Division

We reprint this letter, received by the Public Information Office, in order to keep the Lab personnel abreast of research projects being conducted in other parts of the land.

Mr. Scientist,

This concerns electromagnetism. I made a hapstance observation that I consider might provide a key to an understanding of the so-called "free ride" (homing in on the destination planet) principle. I would like to try to state my observation and a theory about the observation and a few ideas about how this freaky routine could be duplicated.

My purpose in writing to you is to try to get you to have some experiments made - in an effort to prove and learn more about this phenomena. I'm coming to you with this thing because I don't have any money or technical experience, right now. A nuclear physicist (in the Scientific American) stated that there are actions that our presence ("usually" - me) suppresses.

My observation seems to have been a spectral dimension additive.

Suggested Starting Point Frame of Reference:

The principle in question (the "free ride" principle) is called the "electromagnetic (color-?) snap." (I think you scientists have a name for it but I don't know what it is.) The game in question is called twinkle ball. The ball is the carrier and the carrier is an electrical charge. The passenger in my observations was a reddish dust that looked like rust dust.

My Observation:

Fact:

A cluster of (3-5) very small piles of reddish dust (needle head - pin head size) started playing twinkle ball with some reddish dust on the other side of the room. After they had been twinkling at each other for a while a wind-sucking sound started and crescendoed into a pop. After the pop, the little piles of reddish dust were missing. (I witnessed this routine five or six times but the nutty circumstances under which I witnessed it did not permit me to photograph it.)

Theory:

(The sound and the sensation, Etc., indicated to me, the probability that:) The wind-sucking was the drawing back of the air and the creating of a vacuum which started in the middle, and then, (gradually, in this case) extended to each of the twinkle points. The vacuum reached the twinkle points simultaneously. The little piles of dust were snapped through the vacuum to the twinkle point on the other side of the room. The pop had to do with the air going back together again.

A Few Theories and Suggestions Concerning the Initial Experiments:

The immediate aim should be to transfer electrical charges, with and without small objects, over small distances, through the air, by the "electromagnetic (color-?) snap" method.

The experiments must be conducted in a vacant, lighted room. (Vacant, here meaning, no people or other animals in the visible area.) The experiments must either be pre-set or remotely controlled. The action must be seen and heard through mechanical means.

Equipment and Materials:

An electric energy producing machine that can be remotely controlled, mechanical eyes and ears (for viewing and controlling the experiments), some electric energy gauges (to measure the transfers of electrical energies, to and from the twinkle points), a half glass or so of reddish rust dust.

Each of the little piles (or cluster of little piles) of reddish rust dust must be visible to each other. Each of the little piles will become a twinkle point. One of these little piles must be placed on the electric energy producing machine. To get the hang of how this thing operates it may be desirable to make a few experiments in a vacuum or with one of the twinkle points grounded. (I don't claim that this information is, in itself, adequate.)

Finally: I challenge (1) that aiming and firing objects at distant planets is not the best way to do this job, (2) and that "homing in" on the destination planet by the "electromagnetic (color-?) snap" method is the safest and fastest and best possible approach to this problem, (3) and that this information will help in the control of certain diseases by providing us with

a "window into bugsville" (the hidden processes of germination, etc.) and that an understanding of this principle might, indirectly, help us gain support for a system of world law - which is our most important problem, right now.

I presently figure that it will probably take about a year to prove this principle and from ten to twenty years to be able to utilize it in space. I urge you to have this information proven and developed - starting immediately.
