Four motor vehicles, located in the rear lot of Building T-87, are available for Public Sale.


Inspection will be permitted from January 31st through February 4th. Bid opening will be held on February 8th, 1966.

Confirm \$45 Million for AGS - Appears in New AEC Budget





An AEC spokesman in Washington has confirmed that the new budget contains a request for \$45.8 million to improve the research potential of the Lab's AGS. A local newspaper broke the story last Saturday on information from Representative Otis G. Pike (D-Riverhead). At that time the AEC declined to comment pending President Johnson's presentation of the proposed budget to Congress early this week.

The AEC's total proposed fiscal 1967 budget is \$2 billion, 300 million - down some \$90 million from last year. The AEC also reaffirmed its intent to build the 200 BeV accelerator, squelching rumors that the project had been postponed for economy reasons, but indicated that funds won't be requested until after a suitable site has been chosen later this year. Other projects on the AEC docket are design work on a new research facility at Los Alamos cost-

ing \$55 millions, and preliminary designs for a \$75 million "fast-breeder" reactor as a testing facility to develop the fast-breeder reactor as a civilian power plant. Such reactors are designed to produce more fuel than they consume.

Whether the President's proposals materialize into cash depends on Congressional reactions to a budget pegged at \$112.8 billion - the largest in the Nation's history. Optimism over an early settlement in Vietnam is waning in the Capitol, and Congressional supporters on both sides of the "guns or butter" economic spectrum are lining up. President Johnson, in presenting his budget to Congress, said: "No one can firmly predict the course of events in South-East Asia . . . As a consequence, budgetary requirements could be either higher or lower than the amounts I am now requesting." Whether or not See AGS Project, page 2

the AEC's proposals for new and improved research projects can be financed may depend as much on what happens in Hanoi as in Washington.

As proposals for the Alternating Gradient Synchrotron Conversion Project now stand, the 50 MeV linear accelerator used to inject particles into the AGS ring will be replaced with a 200 MeV linac. Also, the power supply of the AGS magnet will be modified so that the AGS's cycling rate will be doubled. Additional experimental facilities will be added. The fiscal 1966 budget included \$2 million for design study.

With the new modifications, experiments that had heretofore been impossible or impracticable may be accomplished, and the capabilities for a broader research program would be realized. The modifications would take from four to five years to complete.

Suffolk County Health Department Launches Measles Vaccination Plans

The Suffolk County Health Department is sponsoring a series of free, special measles vaccination clinics. These clinics are for children, from one through five years old, who have not had measles and are not allergic to eggs. One visit is all that is required.

Because measles is a serious disease, the medical profession and the Health Department are anxious to immunize young children, particularly those in the early age groups. In recent years, deaths from this disease and its complications have ranged from 400 to 500 per year in the United States. About one out of 1000 children who contract measles develop encephalitis which may leave permanent brain damage in many of the survivors.

Another 5 to 10 percent develop middle ear infection, pneumonia, an other complications.

In 1963, an effective measles vaccine was licensed by the federal government. Further research led to the development of a single dose vaccine (the Schwarz strain). It is propagated in chick embryo tissue culture medium, hence the possibility of untoward reactions in persons allergic to eggs.

On Saturday morning, January 29, from 9:30 to 12:30 o'clock, Brookhaven Memorial Hospital and the Health Department will jointly conduct a measles vaccination clinic at Brookhaven Memorial Hospital, Hospital Road, Patchogue.

The next Health Department clinics will be held from 9:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. as follows: Wednesday, February 2-Congregational Church East Main Street, Riverhead; Tuesday, February 8-Babylon Town Hall, Sunrise Highway, Lindenhurst; Tuesday, February 15-Southampton Hospital, Herrick Road, Southampton; Saturday, February 19-Greenport Elementary School, Front Street, Greenport.

More clinics will be held in February at other locations. The dates will be announced by newspapers and radio stations. Further information may be obtained from the Health Department's Information Office, County Center, Riverhead; Park 7-4700, Ext. 373.

Pure Research Revisited

Dear Sir:

The letter published last week, though the writer was not identified, is obviously a young man of the near-genius type who has a splendid future in science before him. It is also obvious that he is handicapped at his now tender age because of the lack of education and experience. We think it is wrong that you should print his letter in jest. It is such brilliant young men as this on which the future of science will depend.

Your young correspondent is apparently not aware that the so-called 'Free-Ride' principle was thoroughly investigated by Frobisher-LaRoche back in the early thirties (another man ahead of his time). The publication of his results received little attention (but who among us has not had that unhappy experience?). A cursory literature search would have turned up this work in the Archives of the Sarah Bennington Memorial Library, Upper Creek, Colorado.

Frobisher-LaRoche was handicapped by the lack of modern equipment and technology (Weren't we all in the good old days?). He was unable to contain his theory strictly to "Homing in on the destination planet." Lack of suitable mathematics forced him to stay within more general bounds and he published his theory as a means of "Homing in on the nearest planet" (Any-Old-Port-In-A-Storm Theory). It may be possible, as your correspondent seemed to suggest, that newer techniques of celestial navigation, together with miniaturized computers of the type on Gemini VI and VII would enable this early theory to be updated as a method of truly homing in on a desired planet.

Your young man also appears to be unaware of Joseph Belleau's work with various-colored dusts. We happen to be familiar with Joe Belleau's work which he started as part of his Ph.D. Thesis and carried on later under the auspices of the Electro-Flux Research Division. Belleau's work turned up some interesting data on dusts other than the red oxide. It is not recorded, but personally known to us, that Belleau inadvertently introduced some organic compounds into his dusts which eventually forced him to give up his work in despair. The official reason for not continuing this valuable piece of pure research was given as "lack of funds," the Electro-Flux Corporation not being able to justify to their stockholders the expenditure of large sums of research money on investigations into purple dusts.

Your correspondent gives his age away by his lack of assurance when he repeatedly uses the term, "Electromagnetic (Color?) Snap." It became apparent from Belleau's work that the phenomenon tended to go above the high-purple area of the visible and into higher regions of the electromagnetic spectrum. As long as we are assured that it does go beyond, the doubtful word "color" is no longer used.

Belleau's early work resulted, in a round-about way, in applications for several patents, most of which are still under litigation, and which eventually resulted in the development of color television. However, most of the litigatees have become so enamored of the result of their work that they spend too much time enjoying the sensory delights of the Tube to do any further research or litigating.

The kinetics of the "Snap" phenomenon have been investigated and have been found to bear a relation to every-day electro-deposition, with which we are all familiar. Classic work has been done in several media, notably water, aqua regia and nitrous oxide. (A soon-to-be-felt Spin Off will be an expected revolution in the laundry detergent industry?)

Preliminary investigations are getting underway at various sites (prompted, we must admit, by rumors that the USSR has already started) on similar experiments using darkened vacuum as a medium. This is obviously what your correspondent had in mind. It appears to those of us who are deeply interested in the subject, that the magna-striction that occurs during various chromo-magnetic declinations or variations (depending again on the type of dust that is used) will lead to further interesting developments. One unknown factor at the moment, that looms large in future planning and budget requests, is the effect that the newly-observed magna-sonance, or various sound frequencies, will have on the whole theory. In this one aspect, we must admit we are still up in the air.

One thing we must not do in the future is to close our minds to outside sources. Just because outsiders cannot think as logically or express themselves as clearly as we do is no reason to assume that we are infallible.
