### The Rise and Stability of The Earth's Atmosphere

Lloyd Berkner  
Southwest Center  
for Advanced Studies

The next Brookhaven Lecturer will be Dr. Lloyd Berkner, Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Southwest Center for Advanced Studies. From 1951 to 1960, as President of Associated Universities, Inc., Dr. Berkner was closely associated with the Laboratory. His scientific and engineering activities have been widespread, with a major interest in the geophysics of the earth's atmosphere. Dr. Berkner's talk, covering a topic in this field, adds breadth to the scope of the Brookhaven Lecture Series.

He will discuss the basic premise that the earth was without a primordial atmosphere and that its secondary atmosphere has arisen primarily from local heating and volcanic action associated with continent building. In such a situation, photo-chemical reactions in the atmosphere and photosynthesis in living material are required to generate the present atmosphere which supports life on the earth's surface. The lecture will consider the interrelations between these various factors.

Refreshments will be available in the Exhibit Hall, following the lecture.

## Dr. Bond Appointed Associate Director



Dr. Maurice Goldhaber has announced the appointment of Dr. Victor P. Bond as Associate Director of the Laboratory, effective April 1. In this post, he will be concerned with the activities of the Biology, Chemistry and Medical Departments, as well as Health Physics.

Dr. Bond, who holds M.D. and Ph.D. degrees from the University of California, joined the staff of the BNL Medical Department in 1954. In 1958, he was appointed Head of its Division of Microbiology, and was named Department Chairman in 1962. His research at Brookhaven has been primarily in the areas of radiation effects in mammals and the kinetics of cell proliferation.

He has served on a number of advisory groups to the Public Health Service, the NAS-NRC and the Armed Forces, and is currently Director of the Commission on Radiation and Infection, Armed Forces Epidemiological Board.

In his new position, Dr. Bond will continue as Acting Chairman of the Medical Department, pending the appointment of a successor.

## Mystery Bowling Tournament



### Ticket Practices

The Recreation Office will be open for ticket sales and information daily from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.

Tickets are intended for the employee and members of his immediate family. It is understood that a single employee might wish to purchase an additional ticket for his or her escort.

### For Each Stadium:

Employees may purchase either two or four tickets.

Tickets will not be sold to any one employee for more than two games in advance.\* An employee who has purchased tickets for two games in advance will be permitted to buy additional tickets only after he has attended at least one of his games. In other words, tickets will not be sold to anyone currently in possession of tickets for two unplayed games.

Tickets will not be returnable or acceptable for refund at the Recreation Office.

If a game is rained out or postponed, refund or exchange should be made at the Ticket Office at the ball park.

\*If there are tickets which have not been sold one week before game time they will be sold regardless of the number of tickets already in the purchaser's possession.
