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## BNL Host To Foreign Scientists

Several foreign participants in the National Particle Accelerator Conference held last week in Washington, D.C., visited BNL this week to exchange ideas with members of the Accelerator Department.

Countries represented by the BNL visitors include Russia, Japan, France, and Switzerland.

S. Suwa, from the University of Tokyo, is in charge of the design study for a 40 GeV machine that has been authorized to be built in Japan.

Professor Y. Denisov, from the Joint Institute for Nuclear Research at Dubna, is an expert in the stability of magnetic fields.

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## Biosatellite Returns?

Efforts to locate the Biosatellite launched on December 14 from Cape Kennedy were suspended last week.

When last heard from, the spacecraft, which was being tracked by radar, returned to earth somewhere in the vicinity of the Australian orbit path. With batteries dead and no homing signals being sent, the search teams could only guess from the radar signals where a landfall might have taken place.

Arnold Sparrow and Lloyd Schairer, Biology Department, said that the experiment was not a total loss. The control material that was at Cape Kennedy was exposed to all conditions of the experiment except weightlessness. Analysis of this material will complete part of the experiment, and will guide planning for the next launch scheduled for sometime after June 15.

## Queens College Taps Dienes

Dr. George J. Dienes, Senior Physicist at Brookhaven National Laboratory since 1951, has joined the Faculty of Queens College for the spring 1967 semester as an Adjunct Professor of Physics.

Dr. Dienes, while continuing as a regular staff member of Brookhaven National Laboratory, will serve as consultant to the college's department of physics, conduct seminars and colloquia, advise faculty members and students on research projects and serve as a liaison between the college and the laboratory.

## Clarke Williams to Spark Marine Research

### Sir Isaiah Berlin to Give A.U.I. Lecture April 3rd

Sir Isaiah Berlin, who is internationally famous for both his wit and wisdom, is a speaker in great demand. He is a Fellow of the British Academy and an honorary foreign member of both the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and the American Academy of Arts and Letters. He has been Visiting Professor at Harvard, Chicago, Princeton and Bryn Mawr and has received honorary doctorates at several universities. During the war Professor Berlin was First Secretary at the British embassies in Washington and Moscow.

It has been announced that he will resign his chair as Chichele Professor of Social and Political Theory at All Souls College, Oxford, to become President of Wolfson College, a new graduate institution largely devoted to the sciences. During the past year he was one of the first to be chosen for the newly created Distinguished Professorships in the Humanities at the City University of New York. It is fortunate that he has agreed to share an evening of his crowded sojourn in this country with Brookhaven.

Professor Berlin has decided to beard the Brookhaven audience with a lecture on anti-scientific attitudes as they have developed in universities and society. His title will be "Irrationalism" and he writes that he will deal "not simply about the effects of Darwin and the resistance to him, but about the roots of anti-scientific attitudes towards the end of the 18th and beginning of the 19th centuries, with repercussions now that seem to be almost universal." As one of the world's most respected historian-philosophers, famous for his ability as a speaker, Professor Berlin should be able to cope most effectively both with this topic and with the Brookhaven audience.

Dr. Clarke Williams, Deputy Director, was named by the Nassau-Suffolk Regional Planning Board to be research administrator of the newly formed Marine Resources Council.

The appointment, announced by Planning Board Chairman Leonard W. Hall, followed action by the Nassau and Suffolk Boards of Supervisors to approve an initial budget for the council's operation.

Dr. Williams will be the research administrator and will seek oceanographic research grants from both government and industry. He will assume the post on July 1. 6-223-65



The Marine Resources Council is the Planning Board's answer to oceanographic research on Long Island. After extensive study, the board concluded that if Long Island concentrates on Marine biology, pollution, shellfish and other problems of marine environment, a reservoir of talent would be developed and would attract more research. As a result, Long Island could become a center for oceanography.

According to Dr. Williams, "there has never been a coordinated study of the island's marine environments, one that would emphasize its promise as well as solve its problems. Up till now it has been a matter of bits and pieces—one group tries to find out why the Great South Bay is choked with algae blooms, for example, and another studies the failure of the oyster industry." For Dr. Williams, this is the second time in twenty years he has been asked to start a research operation from scratch. In 1947, he was the first scientist hired to form the nucleus of what is now Brookhaven National Laboratory.

According to Chairman Leonard Hall, Dr. Williams . . . "is a scientist familiar with federal grant programs. We needed an all-around man, and Williams is one of the few, if not the only man on Long Island, with that kind of background. The primary function of the research administrator is to take the program to be developed by outstanding scientists and translate it into contract language and then go to federal agencies with grant programs and secure the grants."

Dr. Williams, whose offices will be located in the Hauppauge County Center, said his first move will be to appoint an advisory committee chosen from various fields having an interest in the Marine Resources Council's work.

Professor Engel Myae, a member of the Institute of High Energy Physics at Serpukhov, is working on the 70 GeV accelerator that will be the highest energy accelerator in the world.

Professor Atlant Vassiliev, from the Radio Technical Institute of the Academy of Science in Moscow, is concerned with the design for a Cybernetic 1000 GeV machine which the Russians have under consideration. Vassiliev has already constructed a working model of this accelerator that operates in the 1 GeV region.

From France the visitors included J. Parain, and B. de Sereville, who are working on a design study for the new Saclay machine. P. Tardy-Joubert and H. Vialettes also came from Saclay.

From Switzerland K. Helmut Reich represented CERN.

During their visit to Brookhaven, these scientists held several meetings with members of the scientific staff during which they explained their fields of interest and exchanged views on high energy physics.

BNL members who have been involved in either the Washington Conference or the Brookhaven visit are: G.H. Vineyard, Associate Director; R.L. Cool, Associate Director for High Energy Physics; R. On Tuesday, the Russian visitors left Brookhaven for their Legation in New York.
