Lab Team Advises

June HS Graduates

Even though "Dress Down" was the order for the day at Bellport HS last Friday, the seniors were told to "Dress Up" when applying for a job.

Lawrence Paisley, guidance director, told the team of BNL staff members who came to the School to instruct the seniors in the proper way to apply for a job, that "Dress Down" was a school tradition on one day of each year.

Janet Whitehead, employment supervisor, who headed the team was assisted by Rick Villacara, personnel representative, and Mrs. Ella MacLean of Photography, a resident of the school district.

The purpose of the team was to instruct the students in the proper way to apply for a job. Areas covered included availability of jobs for those who were not going to college; what an employer looks for in an applicant; and how to fill out an application.

After a short formal presentation, the 50 students formed small groups and discussed very practical matters such as how to dress, what to do when arriving at an employment office, and what attitudes should be expressed.

"It is very important" said Villacara, "to stress all of the activities participated in while at school. The average student has little credential for an application, and should concentrate on telling what clubs he was in, or what awards he won. All

these things show an attitude to the prospective employer."

Janet Whitehead said that the program would include visits to Center Moriches HS, Longwood HS and William Floyd HS as well as Bellport. The aim of the team is to reach minority groups that might be economically disadvantaged.

TIAA-CREF Changes Permitted This Month

Each May, participants in the AUI Retirement Plan are allowed to change the apportionment of their premiums applied to TIAA and CREF. Each change, which affects the retirement contributions made by AUI as well as those by the employee, must be requested prior to June 1, and will be effective July 1. Change forms are available at Personnel Services.

Those who have previously applied all premiums to TIAA, the fixed annuity, may have up to 75 percent of future premiums applied to CREF, the variable annuity. Participants may also reduce or terminate premiums being applied to CREF and increase their TIAA premiums accordingly.

Current CREF participants will be interested to know that the value of the CREF accumulation unit rose to an all-time high of \$43.12 last month. This is an increase of some 18% over the December unit value which was reported on the annual statements received last March.

Film Festival Shows Brookhaven Spectrum

On Friday, May 12, the American Film Festival held its 9th Annual Awards Dinner at which trophies were presented to winners in various categories of Educational Films.

BNL's *Brookhaven Spectrum* was one of twelve finalists in the judging for first place in the General Science category. The award went to a film made by Sterling Educational Films titled *The Noisy Underwater World of the Weddell Seal*.

Over 800 films were entered in the festival, and more than 500 were eliminated before the final judgment.

The *Brookhaven Spectrum*, has been distributed all over the world by the U.S. Information Agency, and is available for local showings through the BNL Motion Picture Film Library. Arrangements for showing the film may be made by calling Mrs. Maria Tasso, Extension 2327.

Submarine Officers Train At BNL Medical Center

The current class of the U.S. Navy's Submarine Medical School at New London, Connecticut are in session at BNL for the week of May 15, 1967. Twelve active-duty Navy Medical officers are attending a five-day course in "Radiobiology for Submarine Medical Officers." Tours of radiation facilities, as well as practical exercises in radiation measurement and calculation, are scheduled.

The training course will be conducted by Naval Reserve officers who, as civilians, are members of the BNL staff. Capt. Victor P. Bond, Associate Director, will be in charge of the course and will be assisted by Cdr. Leonard A. Baker, Jr., Manager of Safety Services. These reserve officers will be on temporary active duty during this period. Other members of the Laboratory staff will be utilized as instructors.

Camp Upton Ghost Still Haunts BNL

"Brookhaven is a city - a complete urban organism - a specialized one, but none-the-less a city," said Tician Papachristou, architect from the firm of Marcel Breuer and Associates.

"It also has the common characteristic of having aspects of urban blight. We found a strong physical legacy from the past. Camp Upton is still very much alive."

The final report of a site plan for future growth and modernization, resulting from a study completed during the past year, by the Breuer firm was presented to the principal staff last Thursday in the Lecture Hall. Papachristou, who made the presentation, was introduced by Clarke Williams, Deputy Director.

Williams noted that the architects were commissioned to make impartial recommendations for a harmonious, esthetically pleasing arrangement of facilities to take advantage of the natural beauties of the site rather than to design buildings.

Williams said, "I think everybody has to understand that any plan for site use is not a rigid thing. On the other hand, if you try to develop a site without a plan, you will end up with something pretty gruesome."


The proposed plan would take advantage of the natural surroundings as well as the arrangement of the present major buildings. Papachristou pointed out that existing patterns of streets must be respected to a great extent because of utility lines. The green belt that surrounds the Lab is an asset most cities do not have. Another asset is the large amount of parking space.

Entrance to the Lab does not pose a serious problem, but exit roads must be improved. It is proposed that Upton Road be widened and re-surfaced, Railroad Avenue be made a four-lane arterial road, and a new access be made from Long Island Expressway to join up with Upton Road.

Feeder roads to these main roads would be developed as changes were made to the "downtown" area along Brookhaven Avenue from the Cafeteria east to Personnel.

The over-all plan as proposed by Papachristou calls for changes to be made on a continuing basis for the next fifteen years. Eventually, he envisions a central mall in the "downtown" area surrounded by the major permanent buildings.

Some of the work of implementing this plan has already been done. Old buildings at 60 Brookhaven Avenue have been demolished, and the recently renovated Personnel Building has had new plantings and paved parking areas.

Max Small, head of Plant Engineering and Planning will match this proposed architect's conception to an engineering study.

"All aspects will be considered," he said, "besides the utilities we must do some 'people planning' and allow for such things as mail delivery, traffic flow, and all the other things that make such a plan practical."

Before the end of this calendar year, the Master Plan will be revised to incorporate these studies for future implementation.



21st AEC Metallography Group Meeting at BNL



Metallographers from the various AEC sites and prime contractors throughout the country were brought together at Brookhaven for the 21st AEC Metallography Group Meeting on May 10-12, under the chairmanship of Jerome Sadoffsky, Metallurgy.

Talks during the session dealt with new techniques and equipment and covered both optical and electron microscopy of radioactive and non-radioactive metals.

The entire group has undertaken a thorough evaluation of metallographic mounting materials. This treatise will be published later this year and will be available to both AEC and industrial laboratories.

A tour of Brookhaven facilities was included in the group's itinerary. Under rather wet Thursday afternoon skies they visited the Hot Laboratory, the Metallurgy Hot Cells, the HFBR and the Metallurgy and Materials Science Department.

Looking at Matter With Particles

Physicists have been concerned from the beginning with the nature of matter. We can observe some macroscopic properties of matter by our ability to see, but when we ask about the nature of matter on a submicroscopic-building block scale, we have to rely on other means than our own senses.

At Brookhaven we have devised methods to use neutrons to study the structure and motions of the individual building blocks (atoms and molecules) that make up bulk matter, i.e. solids, liquids, and gases. By a generalization of the same approach, we have recently been able to study the building blocks (nucleons) that make up the atomic nucleus.

Letters To The Editor

Dear Sir:

Eight years ago BERA sold a number of Kidde 2½-pound dry chemical fire extinguishers. I bought one and installed it near our kitchen in a special closet having a glass window that permits viewing the pressure gauge on the extinguisher without having to open the closet door. I check the pressure whenever I go by, which is several times a day. Because the pressure has always remained high, I assumed that the extinguisher was always ready for instant use.

However, our neighbor's house across the street recently caught fire, and in attempting to help him put it out I found that the chemical in this extinguisher had apparently become caked so that only less than about 5% of it could be released. Moreover, I wasted what seemed like about 20 seconds in trying to figure out whether to pull the "safety" pin out or push it in and then in trying to free it, pull it out, and force the discharge lever down after I realized that this was what was required.

As a result of this experience, after this extinguisher has been recharged I plan to discharge it at least once a year in a drill in which my family will take turns using it. I hope by this means to promote familiarity with the device and insure that the chemical will not have caked in the meantime.

Many employees also bought similar extinguishers when I did. If they have never had occasion to use them, I suggest that they try them out now. While it is doubtful that this house could have been saved by the time I got there (which was still before the fire department arrived), it is nevertheless frustrating to be so ineffective at an early stage in a fire when every second is important.
