## Summer Job Drive Gets Winter Start

Neither snow nor sleet nor icy blasts of cold Long Island air will stop the US Mail from completing delivery of applications for summer student appointments at BNL.

Brochures have been sent to 200 colleges and universities all over the United States soliciting application for the 100 jobs that Brookhaven will offer next summer. According to Arden Neber, Office of Scientific Personnel, applications must be mailed to BNL before February 1 to be considered for the 1968 summer program.

During the 1967 summer program, 120 students were selected from more than 500 who applied. The students came from as far away as Portland, Oregon, and as near as Rocky Point, Long Island. Last year there was one married couple where both were participants in the summer program. The husband worked in Physics and the wife in Biology.

During the summer, the students built a float for the 175th Anniversary of the Founding of Riverhead Town. The float featured three girls in swim suits labeled Miss Neutron, Miss Proton, and Miss Electron. As the float travelled along the pa-

rade route, the girls threw out ping-pong balls advertising "Atoms for Peace" to the crowd.

The program for summer students is sponsored by the AEC Division of Nuclear Education and Training, and is open to citizens of the United States at least 18 years of age who will have completed three years of undergraduate work by June of 1968. Applicants should have the equivalent of a B average or better, or rank in the top 20% in their class. Preference is given to those who are interested in research or teaching and whose field of research coincides with that in progress at the Laboratory.

## Atomic Age Now In Twenty-fifth Year

### First Atomic Pile Built Under Stagg Field Stands

Less than a year after Pearl Harbor an event occurred, earth-shaking in its significance but only mentioned in whispers by a very select group.

On December 2, 1942, a team of scientists under the late Dr. Enrico Fermi achieved for the first time a self-sustained controlled nuclear chain reaction. This Saturday, a group of scientists who were involved in the building of the first atomic pile at the University of Chicago, will meet to dedicate a sculpture commemorating the event.

Dr. David Gurinsky, head of the Metallurgy Division of NED, was one of the scientists on the Manhattan Project during the building of the first pile. Gurinsky worked in the Metallurgy Lab on methods of fabricating uranium. "In those days uranium was a sort of scientific curiosity," he said. "I was surprised at my assignment, but we were all so security conscious that we never discussed our jobs very much."

The Metallurgy Lab was located under the north stands of Stagg Field. In the squash court under the west stand, a group headed by Fermi was constructing CP-1, the first atomic pile.

Gurinsky recalls attending a colloquium a few days before the pile went critical. "I remember wondering if the pile would reach the ceiling before it went critical. I had seen some of the fuel and the graphite, and had a general idea of what they were doing, but all of the projects were so compartmentalized that there was not much chance to know about the other groups working at Stagg Field. I can't honestly say that I remember when the pile went critical, because we were just too busy with our own phase of the work."

Late in the afternoon on Wednesday, December 2, a scientist in Fermi's group withdrew the cadmium-plated control rod of the reactor and started the first self-sustaining nuclear chain reaction. The scientists present were jubilant in a restrained way, but marked the momentous event by opening a bottle of Chianti supplied by Eugene Wigner. Dr. Arthur Compton was one of the first to leave in order to make a phone call to James Conant telling him of the group's success.

After being hired as a research associate for the Manhattan Project, Gurinsky went to Chicago with his wife. The Hotel Mirimar was their first home in Chicago, but later they moved to an apartment near the shore. In 1944 Gurinsky was transferred to Los Alamos, and in 1947 he joined the staff of the newly-formed Brookhaven National Laboratory.

Without question the start-up of the first pile was the most significant event in the history of atomic energy. Gurinsky rates the building of the BNL Cosmotron as another most significant event in this history. "When the Cosmotron was first proposed, several scientists thought we were dreamers at Brookhaven to even consider a 3-BeV machine," said Gurinsky.

In the quarter century since 1942, nuclear energy has retained an important though steadily diminishing military phase, but no force as powerful and potentially useful as nuclear energy could be long confined to one destiny. Today nuclear energy lights cities, tracks down and destroys disease, sterilizes medical supplies, powers ships and preserves food. In the short 25 years since CP-1, it has come to serve man in nearly every phase of life.

Joseph Yourno (Biology) recently gave a seminar at Cornell entitled "Subunit Structure of Histidinol Dehydrogenase."



**More People Joining Tuition Refund Plan**

In July of this year, the Laboratory introduced its revised Tuition Refund Policy. Already there has been a marked increase in the number of employees participating in the plan. Current figures indicate a total enrollment of 213 individuals receiving educational benefits at the undergraduate, graduate, or correspondence school levels.

For those who have been waiting to return to school, but "just haven't had the time or the money," the Laboratory can call your bluff - certainly in regard to money and, in some instances, even time.

The 75% tuition reimbursement which is provided for undergraduate level courses has a feature which allows reimbursement for the remaining 25% after completion of the baccalaureate degree within five years of enrollment in the plan. Graduate level courses are reimbursed for 100% of actual cost.

If time is not available for travel or for class schedules, specifically approved correspondence courses may be taken and reimbursed for 75% of their cost. To date, the Refund Committee has approved most correspondence courses given by RCA and the Capital Radio and Electronics Institute. Courses given by International Correspondence Schools may also receive approval and, employees who are interested should make their requests known so that they may be reviewed and acted upon by the committee.

According to Peter Paige, Assistant Personnel Manager, "With the introduction of the new Refund Policy, the time-money alibi is already beginning to look like a thing of the past. If you haven't already done so, why don't you hop on the Tuition Refund Bandwagon and keep up with the times? You have nothing to lose and certainly everything to gain."

**Next ANS Meeting To Feature IAEA Leader**

The December meeting of the American Nuclear Society will be held on Wednesday, December 6, at Rosoff's Restaurant on W 43 Street, New York. The speaker will be Dr. Sigvard Eklund, Director General of the International Atomic Energy Agency.

Eklund, who will be in this country to report to the United Nations General Assembly, will give a special report to the ANS members on "The Activities and Program of the IAEA." Dr. Eklund, an author and a scientist, served as Secretary General of the 2nd UN Conference on Peaceful Uses of Atomic Energy at Vienna in 1958. In 1961 he attained his present position in the IAEA. He is a member of the Swedish Academy of Engineering and Science and of the Swedish AEC.

This first Wednesday meeting which is open to members and non-members of the ANS will start at 12:15 p.m. The executive Committee will meet at 11 a.m., also on December 6.

**Medical Insurance For College Students**

Children of full-time regular employees are covered for medical insurance benefits under the employee's family medical plan until the December 31st following their 19th birthday.

Their coverage may be extended beyond that date if they are not married and are attending school on a full-time basis. This may be done by applying for student medical coverage for each eligible child.

Application for student medical coverage should be made at Personnel Services within 90 days from the date the child becomes eligible. The premium for this extended coverage is an additional \$.57 per week or \$2.47 per month.

Employees whose children are no longer eligible for student medical coverage should notify Personnel Services immediately.

**Value of Studded Tires Questionable**

After the first frost, motorists begin thinking seriously of preparing their cars for the winter season that is imminent. Recently, there has been an innovation to replace the traditional snow tire for protection against winter snow and ice - the studded tire. To motorists who are considering this means of protection, the following findings of several Federal agencies and other organizations associated with traffic safety may prove enlightening.

There is little support for general approval of studded tires, which are now illegal in 41 states and D.C. Studded tires are considered effective only on glare ice; they have no effect in soft snow. Not only are studs reported to increase stopping distance on many types of dry road surface, but are also reported to be conducive to skidding.

It appears that installation is a decisive factor in the performance of studs, as it has been found that studs may become missiles when poorly installed or when installed with rotation in different direction than when originally mounted. Consequently, some insurance companies are considering increasing the premiums when studded tires are used on an insured vehicle.

It is interesting to note that in New York City and many other locations snow emergency regulations require either snow tires or chains and do not recognize regular tires with studs.

In view of the fact that the cost of studded tires is considerably higher than that of snow tires, motorists should weigh carefully the above mentioned facts before deciding which form of protection to use.
