## Humanities and Science Sustained By Illusions

As a man of letters, André Maurois was well qualified to speak on the association of the humanities and science. "Illusions of the human mind, from perception to dreams, from sentiment to intelligence, from politics to science itself," is the basic theme which Maurois developed in his manuscript prepared for the Pegram Lectures at Brookhaven.

André Maurois, one of the world's great Men of Letters, died late in 1967 at the age of 82. He was famous as a biographer, a novelist, essayist and historian. Although a citizen of France, he was a knight of the British Empire, and held many honorary degrees from universities outside of France, including Princeton in the United States.

His last manuscript, written expressly for the Pegram Lectures Series and completed shortly before his death, was for-

## Parkinsonism Breakthrough

On May 7, BNL's Dr. George C. Cotzias announced to the American Association of Physicians at a meeting in Atlantic City the dramatic and encouraging results of the L-Dopa treatment of Parkinson's disease.

A previous report in September 1967 described the treatment of 12 patients at the BNL Medical Research Center. This week's report describes treatment of 25 patients at the Center over periods of from 4 to 22 months, and the striking results obtained.

In every case, the symptoms of poor muscle control, rigidity, and tremor were alleviated, to a greater or lesser degree. There was striking and sustained relief in moderately advanced cases, and a total absence of symptoms in some mild cases. Severe or operated cases appeared to benefit less by the treatment. Those individuals evincing listlessness showed "an awakening effect." On withdrawal of the L-Dopa, the Parkinsonian symptoms reappeared.

Parkinsonians show a deficiency of dark pigment (melanin) and biogenic amines in the nerve center of the brain. Early efforts at BNL, using neutron activation analysis, led

the researchers to the use of L-Dopa in an effort to correct the melanin deficiency. Dopa is a biologically active form of dihydroxyphenylalanine, an amino acid and a precursor of melanin.

Some years ago a relationship between Parkinsonism and manganese poisoning was suspected. As a result, L-Dopa was administered to two young Chilean ex-miners suffering from manganese poisoning. There was marked relief from their longstanding crippling rigidity. A cooperative program between BNL and Catholic University in Santiago, Chile, began in 1964. Dr. Cotzias and Dr. Ismael Mena of Catholic University began collaborating on the basis that both Parkinsonism and manganese poisoning are illnesses that attack the central nervous system of the body. Results to date on treatment of manganese poisoning with L-Dopa have been most favorable, but further investigation is necessary before there will be conclusive evidence.

The Brookhaven team of researchers includes Dr. Cotzias, Dr. Paul S. Papavasiliou, Dr. Rosemary Gellene, and R.B. Aronson all of the Medical Research Center.

ducer and Ron Peierls does the direction as well as some of the acting chores. Piano and organ music is by David Seewald, assisted by Allan O'Connor with percussion instruments.

After the prologue, things move very fast indeed, with Facade. The druid priests at "Stonehank" have their own problems in building, much the same as the later-day engineers at Yaphank. The master builders of Egypt, Greece and Rome are all involved in a way that is a delight to see.

The Dark Ages and the Middle Ages are memorialized with some "tongue-in-the-cheek" treatment that has a devilish similarity to present day practise.

Facade is no respecter of title or position, as the senior scientist and the Lab administrator are equal targets for the witty lampooning of the authors. But in the

end, it is the computer that triumphs in a way that rings the final curtain down to resounding gales of laughter.

Brookhaven's coming of age is celebrated in song and dance in a way that will be long remembered. Facade will become, in itself, a part of the history of BNL. Dr. Maurice Goldhaber, Lab Director, says in the preface to the souvenir program, "We have great plans for a golden future. We have great plans to continue to push back the frontiers in the world of physics and chemistry, the life sciences, engineering, instrumentation, etc. We reach out to the world with high hearts. World, watch out! BNL has officially come of age. May we always remain young at heart, like our theater group."

Come to the theater and see Facade. Throw off the cares of the day, and laugh a bit at this hilarious view of the past, the present and the future of BNL.

**Food Irradiator Used In Attempt to Eradicate Sweet Potato Weevils**

The AEC's truck-mounted cesium irradiator, now touring the country to demonstrate food preservation by irradiation, will be used in Louisiana to irradiate 10,000 pounds of weevil-infested sweet potatoes in an insect eradication project.

The project, which began May 6 at Louisiana State University at Baton Rouge, is to demonstrate the use of radiation to sterilize sweet potato weevils to reduce the field population of the insect. Weevil damage is a longstanding problem of sweet potato growers in Louisiana, Alabama, Mississippi, Georgia, Florida and North and South Carolina.

Research has shown that irradiation of infested sweet potatoes with 18,000 rads of gamma rays kills less than one percent of the weevil larva but leaves the larva sterile. In the LSU project, the sterile weevils will be used to saturate the university farm sweet potato fields as bait for natural populations of the pest. A nine-to-one ratio of sterile male adults will be used. Irradiated weevils compete favorably with non-sterile weevils in the mating process. This results in an increase in nonfertile egg production and a decrease in weevil population.

Several million sterile adult weevils are expected to be produced from the one week operation of the portable cesium irradiator.

Researchers hope to discover whether this method of insect control, if used on a wide scale, could be effective in eradicating or at least decreasing the weevil population. Distribution of sterile insects could be made to sweet potato farmers and others.

The weevil irradiation technique is similar to that used successfully in southeastern United States in 1958 and 1959 to eradicate the screwworm fly which infected livestock. Flies were grown to pupal stage, irradiated, permitted to mature and then released from airplanes. Fifty million sterile flies were released weekly and the number of eggs that hatched rapidly decreased to zero. In 18 months the insect was eliminated in the area. A similar program is being conducted in southwestern U.S. by the Department of Agriculture in an attempt to control the screwworm fly in that part of the country. As part of the southwestern project, screwworm pupa are being shipped to LSU by the U.S. Department of Agriculture Research Station at Mission, Texas, for irradiation in the portable cesium unit.

The portable irradiator, which has a source of 170,000 curies of doubly encapsulated cesium-137, was loaded and tested at BNL. It recently completed a six-month tour of the state of Washington. The irradiator's cross-country tour, which is expected to last at least two years, began last August in Massachusetts after leaving BNL. It will return to the West Coast later this month. There are nine other irradiators of various types being operated in this country by the AEC in support of its food program.

The 18-ton unit, operated under AEC contract by Isotopes, Inc., of Westwood, New Jersey, has visited a large number of private food firms and institutions to demonstrate the benefits and commercial potential of food preservation by irradiation.

Products which have been test-demonstrated in the device include various fish, fruits, and vegetables and seeds. In the state of Washington the program involved principally the irradiation of potatoes for sprout control and wheat and wheat flour for insect disinfection.
