



Lab Pays Homage to Civil Rights Leader Funeral Services Broadcast In Theater



Approximately 750 members of the BNL staff gathered in the theater on Tuesday morning to hear Isaac Cole of the Physics Department deliver a eulogy to the late Dr. Martin Luther King, and listen to the broadcast of the funeral services from Atlanta, Georgia.

Dr. Maurice Goldhaber, Director of BNL, introduced Mr. Cole, with these words:

"A tragic event has brought us together. We are here to honor the memory of a man who preached love in a world which knows too much hatred. All thinking men know that we are at the crossroads. All men of good will feel deeply that he must make this moment a turning point for the better. We at Brookhaven are fortunate to have such a man of good will. Mr. Isaac Cole of the Physics Department has not forgotten the plight of his less fortunate brethren. He will now say a few words in memory of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., and then we shall listen to the funeral ceremonies at Atlanta."

Mr. Cole then came to the podium and delivered the following eulogy after reading *A Psalm of Life* by Henry Wadsworth Longfellow.

Today we are gathered to pay tribute to a great man and a great leader. A man who was the victim of the hatred and violence he preached against. Though he died violently, he would caution us against retaliation. He would rather say love your enemies, bless them that curse you, do good to them that hate you, and pray for them that spitefully use you and persecute you. He would say the answer to hate is love, to injustice-justice, to war-peace, to resolution-commitment. The commitment Dr. Martin Luther King challenges us with today and tomorrow is to go forth from this

time and place continuing the work he so nobly served. There are things this nation, the state and the Laboratory can and must do, not only as a symbol to this great man, but for 22 million black men and 180 million whites who are enslaved to a system which pits man against man, race against race, nation against nation.

Dr. King stated on a number of occasions: "There can be no peace without justice. War and injustice breeds violence and hatred. Why then can't we stop the war in Viet Nam and racial injustice in America, and start now to bring peace and brotherhood to the world."

I Have A Dream

I can think of no greater words to show the challenge we are confronted with today than to recall the words he spoke so eloquently in August 1963. "I have a dream that one day on the red hills of Georgia, the sons of slaves and the sons of former slave owners will be able to sit down together at the table of brotherhood. I have a dream that one day even the state of Mississippi, a state sweltering in the heat of injustice, sweltering with the heat of oppression, will be transformed into an oasis of freedom and justice. I have a dream that my four children will one day live in a nation where they will not judge by the color of their skin, but by the content of their character. I have a dream that one day in Alabama, right there is Alabama, little black boys and little black girls will be able to join hands with little white boys and little white girls as sisters and brothers. I have a dream that one day every valley shall be exalted, every hill and mountain shall be made low, the rough places be made plane, and the crooked places be made straight, and the glory of the Lord

We Shall Overcome

Brookhaven Hosts Industrial And Academic Reactor Meeting

Brookhaven National Laboratory was host to an international meeting on Industrial Needs and Academic Research in Reactor Kinetics on Monday and Tuesday, April 8 and 9. The meeting was sponsored by the USAEC Division of Reactor Technology. Approximately sixty people attended.

Dr. E.P. Wigner, Nobel prize winner for Physics in 1963 for his work on the theory of atomic nuclei and elementary particles, was the guest speaker at the conference dinner on Monday evening.

A total of twenty papers dealing with reactor kinetics were presented, including one from Canada, two from West Germany, and one from France. At 2:30 p.m. on Tuesday, there was a general panel discussion just prior to the close of the meeting.

The meeting not only covered the industrial and academic reactor areas, but included a number of papers dealing with the experience of specific types of reactors, such as the pressurized water, boiling water, liquid metal fast breeder, and gas cooled reactors.

North Tract Fire Fought By BNL

A brush fire that started on the North Tract of BNL, and was driven by heavy winds, to the vicinity of Lake Panamoka last week, was extinguished after a four-hour battle by Lab firemen, local volunteer fire departments, and a crew of men from the Lab's Plant Engineering and Planning Division. 4-556-68



The fire, originally reported by the Ridge Fire Department, was probably caused by a cigarette thrown from a moving car along Route 25 near the southeast corner of the North Tract of BNL. Engines #1 and #2 responded to the alarm with Captain McFadden and firemen Texeira, Safranek, Yost, Scott, Painter and DiPietro. On the second shift were Assistant Chief Kinney and firemen Farrell, McKenna, Medeck, Werner, Gottfried and Doran.

From the Grounds Maintenance group, 43 men, using indian tanks and a bulldozer, fought the fire from Tarkill Road through the woods south to Jericho Turnpike. The bulldozer cut a break around the fire from Routh 25 to Tarkill Road, and the fire was brought under control and finally extinguished. The BNL firemen continued to patrol the area hourly during the night.

JCAE Reports Out AEC Authorization Bill

The Joint Congressional Committee on Atomic Energy reported out a bill to authorize a \$2.6 billion budget for the Atomic Energy Commission for Fiscal Year 1969, which begins on July 1, 1968.

Military spending in atomic energy was not cut by Congress. Instead, the Navy's reactor propulsion program was increased by \$8.5 million.

Non-defense budgets were cut by a total of \$293 million. The major item was the 200 GeV accelerator at Weston, Illinois, for which only \$25 million was authorized out of \$242.7 million requested. It is believed this sum will allow the Weston accelerator schedule to be maintained through FY'69. Hence, the Weston accelerator accounts for \$217.7 million of the \$293 million cut from the budget.

The remaining \$75.3 million cut from the budget will be borne by all of the other AEC non-military programs throughout the many laboratories and other research facilities.

Reductions in Construction

The major reductions have been in the area of construction authorizations. Only one Brookhaven project was included in this category; a proposal to modify the Central Steam Plan to conform to air pollution regulations established for "Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas." The Committee did not authorize the project in as much as the AEC had advised the Department of Health, Education and Welfare that the stack emissions at Brookhaven do not contribute to air pollution in New York City. Several other construction projects around the country have been deferred.

The annual operating budget (exclusive of construction and capital equipment) at Brookhaven National Laboratory is \$48 million, out of which some \$37 million is payroll and related fringe benefits. A more detailed study of the budget, and in particular the funds to be allocated out of those authorized, will have to be made before it is known exactly how, if at all, BNL might be affected. However, in general, is believed that the major effect at BNL will be that most programs will not expand or grow as much as originally anticipated, but rather that the level of activity will remain essentially the same in fiscal 1969 as it is in the current fiscal year. The AEC funds 38 major research activities at BNL.

Further Steps

Steps yet to be accomplished before BNL receives any money include the following:

1. An authorization bill to be passed by both houses and signed by President Johnson;
2. A bill then must be approved by the House and Senate for appropriation of the funds already authorized;
3. After the appropriation bill becomes law, funds are then allocated by the Bureau of the Budget;
4. After allocation by the Bureau of the Budget, BNL then receives its funds from the AEC reflecting in detail the research program for FY'69.

Annual Inspection For Naval Reserve Company

The Annual Inspection of Naval Reserve Research Company, 3-9 was held at the Brookhaven Center on Wednesday, April 3. Before the inspection, the approximately 100 people who attended listened to a lecture by Rear Admiral Robert Conard, a BNL staff member, who reported on "Late Radiation Effects in Marshallese Islanders."

Dr. Conard has been associated since 1954 with the study of the people of Rongelap Atoll who were accidentally

exposed to fallout during an early atom bomb test.

Captain Searle, USNR was the inspecting officer representing the Commander of the Third Naval District. He was assisted by Commander Aulick, USN, of the Office of Naval Research, Boston. Captain Victor Bond, Associate Director of BNL is the commanding officer of the unit. Last year the Research Company 3-9 was judged first in the Third Naval District at the Annual Inspection.

Let us work not for the sake of working, but for making life richer and fuller. Let our work lead to new discoveries in the arts, sciences and in human understanding. Enjoy your work, for you are working for goals far larger than yourself, for ours is a privilege of living in a glorious age where dreams, thoughts and labors can now usher in a new era of history which might well be the grandest and most majestic period in the march of mankind along the path of human progress.

This is the commitment he died for. This is the legacy he leaves with us the living. Let us in our own way carry his fight against war, injustice, hatred and bigotry. Let us begin now for the time will come when all work must cease, when darkness will come and no man can see. This is our hour of decision. The moment of truth is here now for America, the world and all of mankind. The loss of Dr. King was not only a loss to the cause of freedom, but to all mankind. At times like this we should search for a new meaning in life. We should search for new goals to conquer, new mountains to climb. Let us then search our hearts at this moment and see if a part of us, through our deeds or lack of deeds, actions or lack of actions, involvement or non-involvement, didn't also pull the trigger that took this man's life.

Let Freedom Ring

If there is one consolation we have in this hour of sorrow, it is that you can kill a man, but you can't kill an idea or an ideal. And so in closing, let me echo these words taken again from his famous March on Washington address:

"Let freedom ring from Stone Mountain of Georgia. Let freedom ring from Lookout Mountain in Tennessee. Let freedom ring from every hill and molehill in Mississippi. From every mountainside let freedom ring. And when this happens, when He allows freedom's ring, we will let it ring from every village and hamlet, every state and every city. We will be able to speed up the day when all of God's children, black men and white men, Jew and Gentile, Protestant and Catholic, will be able to join hands and sing in the words of the Negro spiritual 'Free at last. Free at last. Thank God Almighty, we are free at last.'"

At the conclusion of Mr. Cole's speech, the assembled people joined hands and sang "We Shall Overcome" as they waited for the broadcast to start.

Letters To The Editor

Dear Sir:

At the time of my writing this letter, some employees of the Lab are filing into the theatre to listen to the funeral services of The Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King. They are joining many millions of people throughout the land, yet what are they doing? Are they improving the lot of the poor? Will the poor Negro in Mississippi, Wyandanch, Riverhead, Flanders or Harlem, or the poor Indian in Arizona, New Mexico or South Dakota be any better off than last week or even tomorrow? No! We have continually given lip service to the problems of the poor: "Dr. King, oh he was a great man!" "What a tragic loss!" "What an untimely death." That's what you'll hear today, but what about tomorrow and the day after tomorrow? What about his desires and aspiration to help the poor, regardless of their racial or national origin? Has the day of mourning services, etc., changed anything? No!

It seems to me more appropriate if, instead of listening to a funeral service for an hour or so, we sacrificed one hour's pay for the poor or set up a fund to aid the unfortunate ones in our communities. However, that means we must do something. It is easier to sit and listen to a service; it doesn't cost any money, and it's a nice day for a walk to the theatre. While we sit in a "theatre of eulogy," the theatre of poverty continues its tragic drama.

How about it BNL? Why not a true sacrifice, particularly at this time of the year? Two thousand years ago a man died for all of us. Last week a man of the cloth died possibly as a result of his preaching for the poor, the Negro, the Memphis garbage collector, the Indian.

"On Tuesday, April 9, the funeral services for Dr. King will be broadcast in the theatre." On Tuesday, April 9, and every night there will still be broadcasting of the pleas of the poor. But who will be listening? God forgive us for not listening.

Palmer (I & HP) was named inventor of U.S. Patent No. 3,376,440 for Liquid Metal Piston MHD Generator.

Ivan The Terrible (Part II)

Part II of Eisenstein's only long color movie relates the downfall of the Tsar brought on by intrigues centered around the Livonian Wars and a newly strengthened Orthodox Church. Having officially declared the Volga River an integral part of Russia in 1556, Ivan encouraged his armies to annex land surrounding that State on all sides: The expeditions to Kazan and Astrakhan especially proved to be quite pyrrhic - victories were offset by vast economic expenditures and high casualties, resulting in a highly centralized Empire faced with a withering economy, depopulation, and a vastly weakened aristocracy. Ivan designated a part of the realm as crown land and established a praetorial guard for it (and him) and there boxed himself in until his death. Part I need not be seen to enjoy this masterpiece of Russian filmmaking. This film is the height of Eisenstein's genius.
