

Need National Violence Limit Says Yarmolinsky

Professor Adam Yarmolinsky, Seventh AUI Lecturer, called last Thursday evening for a recognition of the limitations of violence both at home and abroad. He said that we, as a nation, have an obligation to accomplish our ends with the least use of force "... that our energy, imagination and compassion can achieve."

Yarmolinsky, the first lecturer in the newly-opened Berkner Hall, spoke to an audience of more than 200 last Thursday at BNL. Dr. R.C. Anderson, Assistant Director, Office of Scientific Personnel, marked the occasion of this first lecture by honoring Dr. Norris Glasoe "... because he was so instrumental in making this conference center, and Berkner Hall as attractive as it is."

Substituting for Dr. O.E. Dwyer, Dr. Anderson introduced Professor Yarmolinsky to the Lecture audience that included in its honored guests Dr. K. Hartzell, Chief Administrative Officer of Stony Brook University.

Professor Yarmolinsky, an articulate speaker, opened his discourse by reminiscing about his first experience at Camp Upton in 1943 in "a personal exploration of the limits of violence." He contrasted the tents of the war years with the buildings of the present Lab site.

Yarmolinsky pointed out the distinction between force and violence, and defined force as "the exercise of energy directly to inhibit action you want to prevent by interposing a physical obstacle. Violence is the use of force to inflict punishment to the point where the person to whom violence is directed desists."

He went on to detail examples of violence in the United States such as the Pullman strike, the Ford strikes, Watts, Chicago and Patterson. He pointed out that we are the only nation to have set off a nuclear weapon in anger, and that we have dropped more tons of conventional explosives in South Vietnam than all the tonnage dropped during World War II. He said that we have responded to Black violence with an overwhelming display of force, and "indeed have many times provoked this violence by overuse of force."

However, we have not as a nation lost sight of the limits of violence. Yarmolinsky cited our change in attitude towards nuclear force, from massive retaliation to flexible response. He pointed to the action of the "Green Berets" in Vietnam, and their policy of going back towards man-to-man combat.

Yarmolinsky went on to say that there have been several lessons learned about violence. Violence cannot of itself solve problems of slums and ghettos, nor can it resolve the problems we face in Vietnam. Paradoxically, the stronger a nation, the greater restraint it must exercise in the use of force. Restraint must be exercised to prove that the forces of law and order are not a threat but a source of protection.

"The art of government," said Yarmolinsky, "consists of solving problems, not suppressing them. Government must maintain or re-establish a dialog between Black and White; between young people and their elders; the public servant and those he serves. American government must recognize in the limitations of the use of violent force at home and abroad, an obligation to accomplish its ends with the least use of force."

During a discussion period that followed Yarmolinsky's speech, he commented that there is a great gap between the "leaders and the followers," the problem being to get the followers closer to the ideas and goals of the leaders.

After the lecture the audience and the speaker met in the lobby of the Conference Center for a light libation and informal discussions with Professor Yarmolinsky.

Old Lecture Hall Closed Nov. 7th

The Lecture Hall at 36 Brookhaven Avenue has been closed since November 7th, and will no longer be used for lectures or movies. As soon as seats and equipment can be removed, the building will be converted to a storage warehouse for AGS equipment.

During Camp Upton days, the Lecture Hall was used as a War Department Theatre for showing training films and occasional Health films of the type remembered by all ex-GI's. Under BNL management it was used as a lecture hall until 1952, when improvements were made to make it possible to again be used for film showings.

The most outstanding use of the Lecture Hall was during the years when the Chemistry Department made it their headquarters during visitors' days. According to one old-timer, the Chemistry Show was a half-hour extravaganza produced by Blair Munhoffen, starring Garman Harbottle, and featuring a cast of many members of the Chemistry Department.

In recent years the Lecture Hall has been used for BNL Lectures and supervisory seminars as well as the Thursday movies sponsored by the BERA Film Study Group.

Sleeping Giant Awakes

The giant up on the hill was awakened from its deep sleep on Monday, November 11. The control rods were slowly pulled out and at 11:15 a.m. the BGRR went critical. By 3 p.m. it reached a power of 7½ megawatts. At 4:30 p.m. that afternoon it was shut down for the day.

The trial run was smooth, with no operational difficulties encountered. So on Wednesday, the BGRR was again running at low power. Today the Radiation Division is inserting capsules and wires which will measure the flux and pile background dose in the first experiment of the chemonuclear loop. The loop will be operated on Friday, and then the reactor will again be shut down.

It is hoped that the BGRR will now be operated periodically, perhaps once a month, to allow for future loop experimentation.

The Brookhaven Graphite Reactor was put on a stand-by basis on June 10, 1968.



Insured Savings by Don Robbins

There is no longer any need to keep your savings in a mattress. Many of us may remember the "Bank Holidays" of the 30's but today the granddaddy of the AEC provides for our safety of savings via the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. (FDIC) and the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corp.

An individual's bank account is insured for \$15,000. This may be common knowledge, however, many people may have accounts in three different banks in order to be fully protected by depositors' insurance. There are many good reasons for doing business with more than one bank, but if the only consideration is deposit protection, this may not be necessary.

You may fully insure your deposits in the same bank (branches are considered the same bank) by opening accounts with different title combinations - for example:

- Husband has individual account \$15,000
- Wife has individual account 15,000
- Husband/wife have joint account 15,000

A revocable trust may be set up to fully insure even more money if the beneficiary is a spouse or a child.

- Husband (owner of account) with trustee declares wife beneficiary \$15,000
- Wife (owner of account) with trustee declares husband beneficiary 15,000

Let's look at a family with two children:

- Child A has individual account \$15,000
- Child B has individual account 15,000

In joint accounts an individual is limited to \$15,000 for all his accounts combined. Therefore, the combinations of joint accounts are limited. In addition to husband's and wife's joint account, we now can combine:

- Husband and Child A \$15,000
- Wife and Child B 15,000
- Child A and Child B 15,000

The additional revocable trust accounts with the children can provide this additional coverage:

- Husband with trustee names Child A \$15,000
- Wife with trustee names Child A 15,000
- Husband with trustee names Child B 15,000
- Wife with trustee names Child B 15,000

In addition to the \$75,000 of fully insured deposits for husband, and wife, a family of four may have an additional \$135,000 of insured deposits for a total of \$210,000.

The next regular Hospitality Committee Coffee will be held on November 25, in Apartment 1A, from 10 a.m. to 12 noon.



Festival Winds Perform Tuesday



The history of the *Festival Winds* begins in 1947 when its predecessor, the New Art Wind Quintet, was born. From that time through 1959, this distinguished ensemble performed over 500 concerts throughout the United States and Canada. In 1959, the original five members of the quintet decided to enlarge the ensemble and chose to call the new group *The Festival Winds*.

The Festival Winds are now comprised of the finest woodwind players in the United States. They have premiered many new and many old works; they have performed repeatedly on such distinguished series as that of the Library of Congress in Washington, D.C., at Lincoln Center's Philharmonic Hall in New York City, and other musical centers. The repertoire of the *Festival Winds* is unique. It encompasses music from the Baroque Era through today. All in all, the repertoire of the *Festival Winds* is unique among the performing groups from the United States and abroad and affords the public the opportunity to glimpse the wide scope of masterworks written for winds.

Four members of the *Festival Winds* will perform at Brookhaven on Tuesday, November 19: John Solum, flute; Melvin Kaplan, oboe; Charles Russo, clarinet; and Morris Newman, bassoon.

The program will include Mozart's Divertimento No. 3 in B-flat major for two clarinets and bassoon; Two Dances for flute and reeds by Handel; Eight Etudes and a Fantasy for flute, oboe, clarinet and bassoon by Carter; Vivaldi's Concerto in G Minor for flute, oboe, and bassoon; Charles Whittenberg's Study for Clarinet with Electronic Extensions; and Berger's Quartet in C Major for flute, oboe, clarinet and bassoon.

Season ticket holders will receive a bonus this year. An extra concert has been added to the Concert Series. Igor Kipnis, world renowned harpsichordist, will perform at Brookhaven on April 29, 1969. Kipnis has made numerous highly acclaimed recordings with major record companies, and has concertized widely. His radio program, "The Age of Baroque," is broadcast weekly on the New York Times radio station, WQXR.

Because of this additional concert, the season ticket is still a very worthwhile bargain. Season tickets are available at \$10 for adults and \$5 for children. Single tickets may be purchased for each concert at \$3 for adults, \$1.50 for children, and \$3.50 for non-employee guests. All concerts will be presented in Berkner Hall at 8:30 p.m.
