Brookhaven Host To Advisory Committee

Brookhaven National Laboratory played host last week to the fourteenth meeting of the Advisory Committee on Isotopes and Radiation Development to the AEC. Sessions for the two-day meeting were held in the North Room of the Brookhaven Center on Thursday and Friday, March 14 and 15.

The purpose of the committee is to advise the AEC on programs to encourage the development of wide-scale applications of radioisotopes and radiation, and to encourage the private production and distribution of radioisotopes. For the past 10 years, the committee has been chaired by John L. Kuranz, Vice President of Nuclear-Chicago Corp.

A highlight of last Thursday's meeting was the report of the committee's newest member, Commander Scott Carpenter, who explained the ocean exploration activities of the SeaLab group of the Navy.

The astronaut-turned-aquonaut spoke of a need for a nuclear-powered energy source that would free a diver from the present cumbersome umbilical that ties him to his underwater base.

After Carpenter's presentation, Dr. Henry Seigman, Deputy Director Gen-

eral of the International Atomic Energy Agency, reported on isotopes and radiation development throughout the world. According to Dr. Seligman, techniques of using radioisotopes as tracers and as sources are finding great use in the developing countries. Dr. Seligman's interest in the subject stems from his background as Director of the Division of Radioisotopes at Harwell, England, before he joined the IAEA.

At a reception and dinner on Thursday evening, a surprise guest was Dr. Gerald Tape, AEC Commissioner, and former Deputy Director of BNL and President of AUI. Dr. Tape presented an AEC Certificate of Commendation and a personal letter of commendation from AEC Chairman Glenn Seaborg to John Kuranz, retiring chairman of the Advisory Committee.

After being introduced by Dr. Maurice Goldhaber, Director of BNL, who welcomed the Advisory Committee to the Laboratory, Dr. Tape spoke of the devotion shown by John Kuranz during his ten years of service on the Advisory Committee as chairman. The Certificate of

Greenberg, Outspoken Editor, To Deliver Sixth AUI Distinguished Lecture Tuesday

"Let this be observed of scientists: Greater chauvinism, xenophobia, and evangelism hath no professional." Daniel S. Greenberg, AUI Distinguished Lecturer, makes this observation in his recently published book, *The Politics of Pure Science*.

"Greenberg regards the scientific community with an air of a man who has studied a strange tribe that is quite different from the rest of humanity, and he finds the members of the tribe terribly impressed by themselves," says Victor F. Weisskopf in his review of Greenberg's book in *Scientific American*.

In the Sixth AUI Lecture to be given on Tuesday, March 26, Greenberg's talk will deal with the ins and outs of science/politics in Washington, and processes and personalities that help influence who get what from the Federal Government for carrying out research activities.

"Scientists and Politicians: A View From the Press Box" will be a general review of the various mechanisms that were created after World War II for linking the Federal Treasury and the scientific enterprise.

Greenberg has pointed out many times recently that most of the senior scientists

and an increasing number of the younger ones must spend part or most of their time on the difficult, complicated and perhaps disagreeable task of getting money from the government. This activity is almost synonymous with "politics." The news section of *Science*, for which Greenberg is responsible, often carries reports on the political aspects of science. Greenberg is without a doubt an expert on the relationship between science and politics. He is at his best when reporting on some of the negative aspects of this relationship.

Greenberg has never been accused of being a dull speaker. Most of the time his audience is split between those who are in hearty agreement with what he says, and those who violently oppose his viewpoints.

Swedish Academy Chief To Visit Brookhaven

Mr. Hans G. Forsberg, Chief, Foreign Services Secretariat, Royal Swedish Academy of Engineering Sciences is in the United States participating in the International Visitor Program under the auspices of the State Department. During his 60-day stay he will be afforded the opportunity to visit various scientific agencies and universities to become familiar with American science, technology and science administration.

Forsberg is a well-informed scientist. He was lecturer on general and physical chemistry and research on isotope separation, extraction and isotope measurement and application; He has done laboratory research and contractual field work for Swedish industry concerning industrial use of radioisotopes at Stockholm Isotope Techniques Lab.

On Wednesday, March 27, Forsberg will visit Brookhaven National Laboratory and will meet with Meyer Steinberg of the Nuclear Engineering Dept. to discuss radiation research and applications. After leaving BNL he will go to Oak Ridge, Los Alamos and the Stanford Linear Accelerator.

Printmaking Exhibit Open To Public View

The latest BERA Art Show, entitled *New Directions in Printmaking*, opened on Tuesday evening to a large and enthusiastic group of Brookhaven art buffs. Between sips of sherry they surveyed an exhibition devoted to "significant new work in original prints," and the consensus was that this is one of the most interesting shows to have been presented by the BERA Art Committee.

The strength of the exhibition resides both in its unity and its diversity. All the works shown are unified by technical excellence and a spirit of controlled experimentation. In their subject matter, artistic intent, and technique, however, they display a remarkable variety. The techniques represented are the most versatile of printmaking: lithography, collography, intaglio, etc., and the forms go from the chaste abstractions of Josef Albers and Ellsworth Kelly to the landscapes of Poleskie. The subjects of the representational works range irreverently from Lolita to the Mastic Coastline to the Death of Dillinger and back to the All American Girl.

The show, taking place at the Exhibit Hall on Brookhaven Avenue, will be open every weekday from 11:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. until March 28. It will also be open on the evenings of March 20, 26, and 28 from 7:30 until 8:30.

BNL Buying Methods Explained at Pentagon

Assistant Director William J. Catacosinos and Purchasing Division Assistant Manager W.A. Rogers attended a recent meeting at the Pentagon, Washington, D.C. The two men appeared at the request of a "Task Force" consisting of representatives of the Department of Defense, General Services Administration, Bureau of the Budget, and the AEC to review the BNL "Offer of Sale" approach in certain procurement areas.

This unique buying tool was devised at Brookhaven some 8 years ago to enable the Purchasing Division to increase its ability to reduce direct material costs and administrative cost. One of its features is that the offer is executed by the supplier without a commitment by Brookhaven at the time of the offer. It only commits BNL at the time an order is placed, when BNL will either earn a previously negotiated discount or will accumulate the dollars and earn a discount in the form of a rebate at the conclusion of the term of the Offer. This is an irrevocable offer for a period ranging from one to three years.

In August of 1967, Dr. Catacosinos and N.P. Rathvon, Associate Legal Counsel of BNL, appeared as witnesses on the same subject in a hearing of a subcommittee of the House of Representatives on "Better Management of Research Equipment, Procurement, and Utilization in Federal Laboratories." The "Task Force" was convened because of a directive to the Agencies by this Subcommittee under the direction of the Honorable Henry S. Reuss, Wisconsin.

Lawrence Award Winner A Former AUI Trustee

Dr. Val L. Fitch, Professor of Physics at Princeton University, was erroneously described as a Trustee of AUI in last week's *Bulletin Board*.


On October 19, 1967, Dr. Fitch had completed two three-year terms on the Board and at his own request was not re-nominated. His successor, designated in accordance with the By-Laws by President Goheen of Princeton University, is Dr. Milton G. White, Professor of Physics and Director of the Princeton-Penn Accelerator. Dr. White served as Chairman of the Cosmotron from 1948 to 1950.

At the same time, three other new members of the Board of Trustees were elected. They were: Dr. Carl C. Chambers, University of Pennsylvania; Dr. Herbert Friedman, US Naval Research Laboratory; and Dr. Charles H. Taylor, Provost of Yale University.

Dear Sir:

Most people at the Laboratory are appalled by racial discrimination in housing, yet we know that it exists in the area. One of the main reasons for its persistence is that real estate brokers refuse to show houses to qualified individuals from minority groups. A minister from the Bellport area recently asked six real estate brokers to pledge publicly that they would show houses on an open basis. All of them refused.

Certain brokers, however, have agreed to show houses throughout the area without regard to race, creed, color, or national origin. If people who are selling or renting houses would list them with such brokers, it would do much to remove the stain of racism from our community. The desirability of such action has recently been underscored by the report of the National Advisory Commission on Civil Disorder.

I shall be glad to supply the names of such brokers and any further information on this matter to anyone who desires it.


