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## AUI Lecturer Calls For Greater Political Effort By Scientists

Daniel S. Greenberg, News Editor of Science Magazine told a capacity crowd of 900 in the BNL theater last Tuesday night that scientists should become more involved in the politics of science.

"It doesn't make any difference whether they become involved as individuals or in groups, but they should be involved," he said. The tall, slim science writer indicated that the honeymoon between the politician and the scientist is now over, and that the scientist must now become involved on either a national or a local level to get his needs across to the man that controls the "pork-barrel" of appropriations.

In a three-quarter-hour presentation before the assembled audience at Brookhaven, Greenberg described himself as a writer who, having to fill some pages 52

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weeks a year, was like a member of the meat packing industry, never throwing anything away. He remarked that his book, *The Politics of Science*, was available on some laboratory bookshelves, probably in the section labeled "children's books."

Greenberg traced the course of government spending for science from the start of World War II to the early 1950's. At that time, the government supported any science program with a military label. Money was easy to come by, and projects like the Manhattan District and other similar ones were well funded. "The balance has now shifted," he said, "and now science must justify the need for funds in any new budget."

"After World War II a great many fictions developed about science and its relationship with higher education. This was a period when the congress felt that federal money should not go for educational purposes. Science was conducted at the universities and a great deal of money was sent to them for the support of research activities, when a great deal of this money was, in fact, used for supporting the edu-

cational processes. During this period, from 1945 to 1955, institutional building went on in a haphazard, disorganized fashion."

In 1956, Charles E. Wilson, the secretary of Defense said that "Research is what you do when you don't know what you are doing." He suggested that the Department of Defense cut back on its support of academic science.

Greenberg went on to explain how money for research projects was procured in Washington by complicated mechanisms that he described as "pork barrel politics." He detailed how some federal projects had been split up in order to satisfy several politicians who had an interest in various parts of this country. At first, said Greenberg, the scientific community thought that the 200 BeV project should go to California because of the initial study done by Lawrence Radiation Labs.

The "pork barrel" type of politics then reached full blast, and before anyone was aware of it, the choice of a site became a national sweepstakes. It even, according to Greenberg, got to such ridiculous extremes that someone suggested that a place was needed where physicists could send their little girls for ballet lessons. Eventually the site choice was narrowed to 128 locations, in the face of a lot of political backlash.

The National Academy of Science was brought in to narrow the field, and the AEC gave them 85 sites to choose from. Six sites were finally chosen, but immediately both the east and the west coasts were eliminated. Ann Arbor and Weston were left. Weston was finally chosen because it was nearer to O'Hare Airport. This, claims Greenberg, is typical of the "pork barrel politics" of science.

Presently there is a new interest in the utility of science, that is not to be deplored. The public should get what it pays for. One area, however, should be left alone, and that is basic research.

Greenberg described the present political situation as being "A fatal situation that is becoming really serious. Scientists should undertake to tell the public what basic research is all about, and should start by telling the scientific community itself." Greenberg offered no "push button solution" to the problem at hand, but suggested that perhaps even an articulate letter to a congressman would be of some help. "There is no quick way to solve the problem, but I am sure that congress will pay attention to any well-ordered comment," he said.

At the conclusion of Greenberg's talk, Dr. George Cotzias, Chairman of the Lecture Committee, accepted questions from the audience. After several questions had been answered by Greenberg, the Lecture ended and the audience adjourned to the Center for a reception where many had an opportunity to confer with Greenberg in an informal manner.

This was the sixth AUI Distinguished lecture of a series devoted to bringing to

#### Breathless

Directed by Jean-Luc Godard, this screenplay is based on a story by Francios Truffaut, starring Jean-Paul Belmondo and Jean Seberg.
