Pike Spikes Rumor

When rumors fly, they apparently go on supersonic wings, and let the "booms" fall where they may. In the case of false rumors, truth, or even the time to search for it, is evidently an impediment and something to be avoided.

A recent but tenacious rumor about a House Bill (number 5710) regarding Social Security benefits has been plaguing the Lab as well as most of Long Island.

The concern of some people had reached the point where Laboratory bulletin boards were used to post a notice urging everyone who saw it to write to Senators J.K. Javits and R.F. Kennedy, and express opposition to passage of the Bill in the Senate. The notice stated that the Bill had already passed in the House.

While the Lab heartily endorses individual interest in what is going on in the world, it is sometimes disheartening to see how quickly some people latch onto rumors without making any effort to get at the truth. The facts about House Bill 5710 are printed below. They were sent to the *Bulletin Board* by Congressman Otis G. Pike.

Another disheartening aspect of this particular situation is that it again represents a mis-use of Laboratory bulletin boards. Employees are reminded that the Lab bulletin boards are to be used for items of BNL related interest, and not for individual or personal causes, either pro or con. To allow use of bulletin boards for personal interests would open up a Pandora's box that would soon render them almost useless for Laboratory business.

The following is a complete quotation of Congressman Pike's communication of May 23rd which was sent to news media.

A bunch of nuts are running about the East Coast of the United States (and the West Coast, too, for all I know) scaring the devil out of the people who contribute to, or get payments from, the Social Security System. Anonymously, which is a familiar pattern with nuts, they are circulating literature saying the following:

"There is a Bill Before Congress Now That Would Destroy The Social Security Act and Channel That Money You have Paid And Will Pay In The Future Into Welfare Programs With the Administrator Empowered To Determine What Retirement Benefit - If Any - You Should Receive . . .

"If In His Opinion - You Did Not Need It - He Would Reduce The Amount - Or Deny You Entirely."

After more of the above, the reader is advised to write now to his Congressman opposing House Bill 5710 because "only a flood of mail from all over the country will stop this outright steal . . . Act Now - Don't Delay - House Bill 5710."

The mail has not been a flood, but it's been more than a trickle, for an awful lot of good people have quite properly been worried. In an effort to slow the trickle to a drip, here are the dull facts:

- (1) There is no House Bill 5710.
- (2) There was a House Bill 5710 over a year ago, but it didn't do any of the things the nuts are saying it did. It increased Social Security benefits.
- (3) The House Ways and Means Committee held lengthy hearings on the bill and amended

New Lab Phone Books Distributed Friday

Many telephones still have stickers on them listing the old emergency numbers. Please remove these stickers or black out the extension numbers. Remember, the new emergency numbers are 333, 444, and 555.

it. They amended it enough to give it a new number, H.R. 12080. It still didn't do any of those things; it increased Social Security benefits.

(4) It's a little late to write your Congressman, for it passed the House on August 17, 1967.

(5) It's a little late to write your Senator, for it passed the Senate on November 22, 1967.

(6) It's even too late to write the President - he signed it on January 2, 1968. It still didn't do anything the nuts said it did, just increased Social Security Benefits.

(7) If you see any nuts circulating these notices, call for the little men in the white uniforms. Tell them to bring one of those white jackets with the long sleeves that tie in the back.

Employees are also reminded that the Personnel Office sent to every employee a pamphlet called "Your New Social Security and Medicare Fact Sheet," incorporating all of the latest changes effective in 1968. This pamphlet presents the factual results of the same Social Security amendments about which all the fuss and false rumors were concerned with.

Be honest now - did you read it? You may not think it is the world's greatest masterpiece of literature, and to some it may forever be a mystery story, but it is worth reading. It's your future they are talking about.

Smoke Signals Rising

Commencing on or about June First cigarettes from on-site vending machines will cost 45 cents per pack.

The last price increase was in August of 1965 when cigarettes went from 35 cents to 40 cents per pack. Both that increase and the present one were precipitated by tax increases. Other factors involved are steady increases in labor and equipment costs which have taken their toll in the local vending operation.

The proceeds of the 5 cent increase will be shared by New York State, the vending company and BERA.

555 - Medical Emergency

The Laboratory Police Headquarters will become the communications focal point of an improved and expanded emergency telephone and radio network, linking Laboratory emergency forces, as well as off-site emergency agencies. The Police Emergency number -444- should be utilized for any non-fire non-medical emergency. In addition to receiving all 444 calls, Police Headquarters will monitor both 333-Fire Emergency and 555-Medical Emergency. Any questions concerning the new BNL Hot Lines should be referred to Mr. E. J. Burke, Head, Plant Protection and Security Division.
