



Dr. Cronkite To Discuss Tissue Transplant On TV

Research Report, a weekly half-hour NBC-TV program that features some of the latest research going on in the medical world, will present Dr. E.P. Cronkite on the subject of Transplantation Research.

Dr. Cronkite, Chairman of the Medical Department here at BNL, will be on the air on Channel 4 this Saturday, May 17, from 1:00 to 1:30 PM. Dr. Frank Fields is the host for this program series which has been aired over NBC for the past several years.

In the program, Dr. Cronkite will discuss the problems of tissue transplants, how the recipient identifies a tissue as friend or foe, the sequence of events that then follow such an identification, and the possible methods of overcoming any adverse effects and rejection by the body. Included in his presentation will be the work being done at BNL with Extracorporeal Irradiation of the Blood (ECIB) and Extracorporeal Irradiation of the Lymph (ECIL), a process where both body fluids are irradiated externally to the body and returned to the body after the unwanted cells are killed, without harm to the body.

Anybody who thinks TV is a cinch should talk to either Dr. Cronkite or Norb Dernbach, Public Relations Officer, who left the comfort of their homes at 5:00 AM to travel to the NEC studios where the program was put on tape prior to this Saturday's scheduled airing time.

AUI Trustee Named Donner Professor

AUI trustee Vernon W. Hughes has been named Donner Professor of Physics at Yale University. The Donner Chair was established in 1958 by a grant from the Donner Foundation of Philadelphia to endow a leading professorship in science.

Professor Hughes received his BA from Columbia in 1941, and his MS from Cali-




fornia Institute of Technology in 1942. He received his PhD in Physics from Columbia in 1950. An Instructor and Lecturer in Physics at Columbia from 1949 to 1952, he then went to the University of Pennsylvania as an Assistant Professor of Physics. In 1954 he was appointed to the same rank at Yale. He was promoted to Associate Professor in 1957 and to full Professor of Physics in 1960. He was appointed Associate Chairman of the Department of Physics, and served as Chairman from 1961 to 1967.

As discoverer of the muonium atom, an isotope of hydrogen, he was elected to the National Academy of Sciences in 1967 in recognition of his distinguished and continuing achievements in original research. He has been a consultant to LASL, ORNL, the NASA Institute for Space Studies, and IBM.

He is a member of the Naval Research Advisory Committee, and since 1961 has belonged to the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. He is also a member of the American Physical Society, and at one time served as Chairman of its Division of Electron and Atomic Physics.

Cotzias To Receive Humanitarian Award

Dr. George C. Cotzias of BNL's Medical Research Center will be one of two recipients to be awarded the Smithtown Parkinson Therapy Center's annual Humanitarian Award. The Center, now in its second year, will hold a dinner at Frevola's in Smithtown on Friday, May 16, to honor Dr. Cotzias and Dr. Alba Augusta of the Goldwater Memorial Hospital and Methodist Hospital on Welfare Island.

Supervisor John Klein will serve as Master of Ceremonies, and the Rev. John Bardsley of the Methodist Church of Smithtown will make the award presentations through one of the Center's patients.

Approximately 200 persons are expected to attend Friday night's dinner. Also on the program is a motion picture showing the work conducted at the Center, and a presentation of certificates to several patients and to volunteer workers who have completed their therapy training course.

May Is The Month For TIAA - CREF Changes

Every year, during the month of May, participants in the A.U.I. Retirement Plan may request that the apportionment of their contributions between TIAA and CREF be changed. Such changes apply to contributions made by the Laboratory as well as those made by the employee and are effective the July 1st following the change request.

Participants who have previously applied all contributions to TIAA, the fixed annuity program, may apply as much as 75% of subsequent contributions to CREF, the variable annuity program. Conversely, participants may also reduce or terminate contributions to CREF and increase their TIAA contributions accordingly. Any such changes will affect only future contributions and will have no bearing on accumulations in either TIAA or CREF up to the effective date of the change.

Emergency Signals

Look Before You Answer

If your phone rings, check the mirror before you answer it. AT&T is now having Westinghouse test out their new Picturephone, and plan to promote commercially within the next two years.

Westinghouse is supposed to find all the technical bugs in the system, but it also seems to be finding out a good deal about human nature. There's been an outburst of vanity among the Westinghouse officials, with tie-straightening and mirror-checking when the phone rings. Practical jokers have been showing up - putting other people's pictures in front of cameras to confuse the callers. The Picturephone consists of a 5 1/2"x5" screen TV set on a pedestal, connected by wires to a small control phone and a regular telephone hand set. A camera is built into the set on the pedestal. The user can switch to a loudspeaker and microphone built into the control panel or, for more privacy he can talk into the telephone hand set. A zoom lens on the camera can take in most of an office making it possible for several people to participate in conference calls.

So practice sitting up straight at your desk, find a hiding place for your coffee cup, and straighten up the office - it could happen here.

3% Bank Loans Available for College Students

If you are attending college part-time, or have children who will be attending a college or university this fall, then you may be eligible for a "money bargain." It is amazing to observe how carefully some BNL employees shop at the local supermarket but will ignore a bargain when it comes time to borrow money.

How many of you have gone out and borrowed \$1,000 from our on-site bank branch to help finance your child's education? Let me cite a typical example of a BNL employee borrowing \$1,000 a year for four years to finance a child's undergraduate education and repaying at the rate of \$1,000 a year after graduation.

If you apply for a loan and fail to specify - Student Loan Program Administered by the New York Higher Education Assistance Corporation (NYHEAC), you will pay the personal loan rate of 4 1/2% discounted. This is the current loan rate at Peoples National Bank (PNB) for BNL payroll deduction personal loans.

Figuring the Student Loan Program on a comparable basis to the PNB personal loan, the true interest cost savings over the life of the loan is \$1580. This savings comes about because the 4 1/2% discounted rate applies over the total life of the loan and is equivalent to 9.4% principle interest whereas the student loan rate is 3% simple interest and applies for the time period beginning after graduation (under the Student Loan Program the first four years are interest free). It is the closest thing to not having to pay interest at all.

Student loan applications for the fall semester may be filed beginning July 1, 1969. Applications and brochures are available at the on-site branch of Peoples Bank. Any questions regarding the application form, i.e., eligibility, how much you can borrow, how long a period, documentary proof needed, etc. should be directed to Mr. Frank Szemko, Assistant Cashier, The Peoples National Bank, Patchogue (GR5-4700). Mr Szemko will review your application so that you will receive an early loan commitment.

Under the provisions of the Higher Education Act, a loan will not be denied a student because of family (husband & wife) income or lack of need if his adjusted family income (NYS taxable income) is less than \$15,000 a year.

Many BNL employees are faced with the financial burden of supporting two or more college students at the same time. This need or other personal circumstances may qualify those with family income over \$15,000.

The only way to determine whether you are eligible for this loan is to file an application.
