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United Fund Serves Suffolk Agencies

Youth agencies, family and individual agencies, mental health associations, and national federations - these are broad category names for the 62 health, rehabilitation and character-building organizations, which along with 19 non-profit hospitals, make up the United Fund of Long Island.

Some of these agencies are international in scope, and United Fund aid is given through their central offices. This group would include the American Social Health Association, International Social Service, Travelers Aid Association, U.S.O., and United Seamen's Service.

Still, a host of other "national" agencies serve the Nassau-Suffolk region through local branches. Included in this group are: Red Cross, and Salvation Army; Arthritis, Diabetes and Kidney Foundations; Family Service and Mental Health Association; Legal Aid Society; Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and Camp Fire Girls; Catholic, Jewish and Lutheran Services and Charities; and the Y's serving Long Island.

But there are many local agencies in each county which serve Long Islanders in many ways . . . and whose functions are vital to the welfare of the region.

Locally-administered United Fund of Long Island agencies in Suffolk County providing the community with vital services needed in this fast-growing area are: **Camp Pa-Qua-Tuck** in East Moriches is a summer camp for children with similar physical handicaps and social adjustment problems, administered by the Moriches Rotary Club.

Skills Unlimited, located in East Islip, is a non-profit workshop for the training, employment, and placement of the disabled. Here, the handicapped person who might otherwise be unemployable is given meaningful training and encouragement to develop skills which are needed in Long Island industry. Many major companies in the Nassau-Suffolk region use Skills Unlimited as a sub-contractor.

A comprehensive program for the rehabilitation of physically handicapped children and adults is offered at the **Suffolk Rehabilitation Center For The Physically Handicapped**. The Commack agency provides speech and hearing diagnosis, evaluation and treatment, as well as a Readiness School and Day-Training-Day Care program for handicapped pre-school children.

The **Suffolk Community Council** is also an affiliate of the United Fund of Long Island. This is the planning and coordinating board of Suffolk which seeks to improve the health and welfare services in the county. The **Health Sciences Center** at Stony Brook is involved in planning the facilities which will best meet the health needs of the Long Island community.

Add these Suffolk agencies to the 10 non-profit hospitals in the county which receive community service aid from the United Fund, and you can readily see that when you pledge Fair Share for the United Fund of Long Island you help all . . . all at once!

After an initial check-in at the Reception desk in the Conference Center, a visit to the Lunar Sample display in the Chemistry building was the first order of business. Although it was not obvious to the casual visitor, actual experiments on the lunar sample were in progress most of the day.

After Chemistry, the Physics Exhibit was a convenient stop on the way to the gymnasium, where the Radio Club, Biology, Health Physics, Medical, Instrumentation, Meteorology and the Scientific Answer Men had exhibits to view.

Bus tours left from the Gym at regular intervals, going to Applied Math, the Tandem Van de Graaff, HIRDL, the AGS, and the Graphite Reactor.

The Tandem Van de Graaff, opened for the first and last time for Visitor's Days, provided a colorful and active exhibit. One of the containment tanks, opened for an interior view, was promptly dubbed the "Yellow Submarine" by the students.

All of the Tandem personnel on duty Saturday, wore blue nylon jump suits which were described by at least one of the visitors as "real groovy!"

The "groovy" clothes worn at the Tandem exhibit were not the only style showings of the day. Maxi coats and mini dresses were very much in evidence, as were hair styles that made it difficult to tell some of the boys from the girls.





Two other patents granted to the AEC on September 19, 1969 were No. 3,466,499 for "Cancellation of External Magnetic Fields by Inner and Outer Cylindrical Current Sheets" by Richard A. Beth (Accelerator); and No. 3,466,554 for "Accelerator Apparatus and Method of Shaping Cavity Fields" by Salvatore T. Giordano (Accelerator).

Mrs. Gertrude Goldhaber (Physics) gave a colloquium at Princeton University on October 16. The colloquium was entitled "Elasticity of Nuclei."

Dr. Walton Shreeve (Medical) recently attended a meeting on obesity held in Bethesda, Maryland. The meeting was sponsored by the International Sugar Research Foundation.

Graham Campbell (Applied Math) recently returned from a visit to CERN, Switzerland, and to the University of Bologna and Universita Ingegneria, Rome. The purpose of the tour was to look over computer installations.

John Leslie Beeby of Harwell will visit at the Laboratory on October 24 for discussions on spin systems and alloy theories.

Army Major Robert J. Burke, son of Edward J. Burke (Security) received his second award of the Silver Star on September 12, 1969. He holds the Legion of Merit, the Distinguished Flying Cross, eight awards of the Bronze Star Medal, ten awards of the Air Medal, two awards of the Army Commendation Medal, three awards of the Vietnamese Gallantry cross with palm, and two awards of the Purple Heart. He has been in the army for almost nine years.

Kimball Named AUI Chairman

At the Annual Meeting of Associated Universities, Inc., held at the National Radio Astronomy Observatory in Green Bank, West Virginia last week, Allyn W. Kimball was elected Chairman of the Board of Trustees.

Kimball, Dean of the Faculty of Arts and Sciences at Johns Hopkins University, was elected to a two-year term to replace Franklin A. Long, of Cornell University, who continues as a University Trustee.

Re-elected to the Board as University Trustees were: Boyce D. McDaniel, Cornell; William A. Sweet, Harvard; and Carl C. Chambers, University of Pennsylvania.

Chosen to be University Trustees were: Saul Roseman, Johns Hopkins University; Walter A. Rosenblith, and Francis E. Low, MIT.

Elected Trustees at Large for three year terms were: George B. Field, Berkeley; and one of the original members of the Board of Trustees, I.I. Rabi. For a one year term, was Robert F. Bacher, Cal Tech.

Members of the Executive Committee will be: Allyn W. Kimball and Gerald F. Tape, ex officio; Joseph C. Elgin, Herbert Friedman, Franklin A. Long, Boyce McDaniel, and William H. Sweet.

Officers of the corporation are: Gerald F. Tape, President; Lewis R. Burchill, Treasurer and Controller; Charles F. Dunbar, Secretary; and N. Peter Rathvon, Jr., Assistant Secretary.

In addition to the election of officers, the Board reviewed reports of the Visiting Committees, and discussed new committee assignments and numerous other matters.

Columbia Fellows Coming To BNL

On October 30 and 31, the Fellows of Columbia University's Advanced Science Writing Program will visit at the Laboratory.

The purpose of Columbia's Program is to assist in developing better public understanding of science and technology through helping raise the quality and increase the quantity of reporting in all the mass media. Part of the Program includes field seminars which take the Fellows to other university, industrial and government research and development centers for one- to four-day explorations of current work and facilities. These seminars not only give a broad picture of American research and development, but help develop background and sources of information which the Fellows maintain when they resume their professional careers.

Brookhaven Laboratory has hosted the Fellows every year since the Program began. During their visit here next week, the participating Fellows will see the major facilities of the Laboratory and will hear discussions on the various scientific programs in progress at the Laboratory, with a view to increasing the Fellows' ability to do a better job of reporting and interpreting developments in science and technology.

The official attendance for High School Visitor's Day was 4,943 students and teachers from 163 high schools, 36 junior high schools representing the states of New York, New Jersey, Connecticut and Pennsylvania.

This Saturday will be Visitor's Day for the general public. Last year 6,250 people came to visit on the last Saturday in October. This year, with the moon rocks being on display, it is expected that if the weather is good, a new record for attendance will be established.

November 17 will be an important day for BNL artists as well as for all art-lovers, since that is the date of the opening of the Fourth BERA Members Art Exhibition. The Art Committee, in anticipation of a large entry, is restricting the number of works submitted to a maximum of two per medium from each artist. We call it "Slo-Break", and that's just what it is. Our rules do not permit the fast break practices which require continuous running at top speed. When a team gains possession of the ball in the back court, it must take four seconds before advancing the ball. So you don't have to be a speedster or a youngster to join the league.

Our season this year will start on November 13th and will conclude with refreshments at our Championship Game in March. Teams play on Thursday night each week. We try to schedule all the games on the same day each week to avoid conflict with other BERA leagues.



BERA provides the game equipment, pays our officiating bills and presents awards to the winners. As a result we are able to keep the entry fee to a few dollars per man which pays for things like uniform shirts. Our referees are members of a local basketball officials' association so that the games are conducted in a professional manner.

The games are played in our Gymnasium at 3 Center Street, which features a playing court 42 feet wide and 93 feet long. Several additional hoops are available for practice.

Many departments have teams in the league, but if your area does not sponsor a team, arrangements can be made to see that all can enjoy the sport.
