



## Affirmative Action Conference at BNL 12 AEC Labs Attend

The two-day Affirmative Action Conference held at Brookhaven National Laboratory ended last Friday afternoon with a round table discussion among the 39 participants from 12 AEC laboratories.

The conference was the first one on affirmative action held by the major AEC research-oriented contractors. The purpose, as stated in the invitation to the participants from the conference chairman, Joseph S. Washburne, BNL Personnel Manager, was: "to generate discussion on affirmative action programs, their problems, the solutions, and the innovative techniques used to solve them."

The conference opened on Thursday morning with a welcome from Dr. R.C. Anderson, Assistant Director of BNL, who also gave a descriptive report on the Brookhaven Semester Program. After a day of formal reports, the participants were all invited to an old fashioned Long Island clambake held at the Recreation Building in the Apartment Area.

Friday morning was devoted to a round table discussion which was moderated by Joseph Washburne, and extended beyond the conference closing hour.

Marion Bowden, Equal Opportunity Assistant to the AEC General Manager, spoke on Thursday about AEC's plans for the future. After the conference he commented: "This conference was a deliberate grouping of laboratories because of the unique problems of each of them. It was the first time that a free and frank discussion between the laboratories was held where the AEC had representation from the General Manager's office and the Division of Labor Relations. The main responsibility for affirmative action lies with these two offices."

"Several questions were raised during the conference that could be readily answered, and the answers will strengthen the affirmative action effort. Performance of the program in the AEC as a whole is not at all satisfactory, and not as much has been done as has been desired by the Commission."

"As a result of this conference, however, there was a new level of awareness and a commitment to resolve the problems of hiring, training, upgrading and open housing for the minority groups."

"The open and candid discussion and the identification of problems as brought out in this conference will help towards their solutions."

George Bryant, Chairman of the BNL Affirmative Action Advisory Committee, said that "BNL had a lot of foresight in convening this conference. A lot of valuable things were brought out during the discussions. It is obvious that BNL is in the forefront in affirmative action among the laboratories."

"As a result of the conference, there will be no great changes in the way the BNL committee operates, but there will be a broadening of some aspects of the program. In the past the main problem at BNL was the lack of numbers of black people and the categories in which they were hired. We are now making much progress in these areas."

"Being able to identify and correct problems before they became serious has been one of the great strengths of the BNL program. The impetus for affirmative action came from the Director of BNL, not from the minority groups, so we have been able to anticipate grapes and take corrective measures before large problems have developed."

At the conclusion of the conference, Personnel Manager Joseph S. Washburne said, "I am gratified that each of the participants has been involved in uninhibited discussion that will lead to increased learning and mutual assistance and the improvement of all AEC laboratory affirmative action programs."

## W. Catacosinos Leaves After 13 Years At Lab

"Life begins at forty" is a popular expression that very few people really believe in. In the case of 39-year old Dr. William J. Catacosinos, there is no doubt about the truism of this statement. Dr. Catacosinos, after a thirteen-year career at Brookhaven National Laboratory, during which time he became Assistant Director, is leaving to start a new career as president of a computer company.

Known as "Bill Cat" to his friends, he joined the staff of BNL in 1956 after service as a naval officer starting in 1953. His first appointment at BNL was Administrative Officer on the AGS Project. In 1959 he was made Deputy Construction Manager of the HFBR. In 1960 he was appointed to the BNL Business Office, and in 1962 he became Assistant Business Manager, and later Business Manager.



During these years, Dr. Catacosinos was working toward his PhD in Business Administration, and was granted his doctorate by New York University in 1962. In 1964 he was appointed Assistant Director for Business Management and Business Administration, the position he will be leaving on July 31.

In addition to his duties at BNL, Dr. Catacosinos was on the AEC General Managers Contractor Procurement Study Group, and has maintained outside interests ranging from teaching at NYU's Graduate School to community service as a Director of the Suffolk Division of the American Cancer Society, and membership on the Industrial Commission of the Town of Brookhaven. He is also a member of the executive board of the Suffolk County Council of the Boy Scouts of America, and of Long Island University's School of Science and Engineering.

On August 1, he will become the president of Applied Digital Data Systems, Inc. in Hauppauge. This company is engaged in the design, development and production of computer communications systems for all types of applications.

"The most valued experience while at Brookhaven," said Dr. Catacosinos, "was the opportunity of working with a fine group of people. Almost everyone with whom I came in contact made me feel proud to be associated at BNL."

BNL's Director, Dr. Goldhaber, stated that, "We are very appreciative of Bill's many fine achievements for BNL, and we wish him the best of success in his new venture."

## St. Swithin - WHY?


Does the world seem grey and wet? Do you have the feeling that there's been more than just a little precipitation? Have you mildewed yet?

**Computer Art Is On Display**

Art is art and science is science but the twain will meet in a unique exhibition to be presented by BERA in Berkner Hall starting on August 4.

The show, entitled "Elegant Output," is a result of a suggestion by Margaret Hind and Joshua Kopp of the Applied Mathematics Department. It comprises output produced for scientific purposes during the normal operation of computers at BNL which is distinguished by its aesthetic quality. The selection of the works to be shown and their preparation for exhibition was performed by the BERA Art Committee.

Virtually all departments of the Laboratory are represented in the exhibition, the variety of aesthetic effects reflecting the variety of subjects, intents and technical procedures involved. In some cases, the effects result from relatively direct representations of physical processes, either those observed in an actual experiment or analytical representations of such phenomena. In other cases, aesthetic quality is found in the output from purely mathematical explorations. For every work shown, a brief explanation is provided of its significance and the computer procedures used to produce it.

Among the computer "hardware" used to produce work in the show are CAL-COMP plotter and CRT output from tapes generated on the CDC 6600 and the IBM 7094 computers, and photographs of a color point-plotting display developed at BNL and connected to an SDS 920 computer.

From one viewpoint the show demonstrates the remarkable graphical versatility of the computers (and, of course, their users) at Brookhaven. From another point of view it provides a basis for speculation as to some of the links between science and art. The fact that purely scientific representations can also be aesthetically pleasing is a circumstance worth displaying and worth contemplating.

The exhibition is being presented in the large meeting room in Berkner Hall, next to the cafeteria. It will run from Monday, August 4, through Thursday, August 14, and will be open during the week from 11 a.m. to 8 p.m.

**Bees Killed in Ridge Victims of Insecticide**

Insecticides, not radiation was the killer of several hundred thousand bees from hives located in Ridge. First reports in newspapers and radio said that the owner of the bees suspected that radiation from BNL was the cause of death.

The Suffolk County Health Department and the New York State Agricultural Station at Cornell examined the dead bees and made the preliminary conclusion that they had become the victims of an insecticide called Sevin, commonly used in this area to spray corn and beans.

Sevin, a carbamate compound, is particularly toxic to bees, but is safe to use as a crop spray. The bees generally travel several miles from their hive to gather nectar, so the owner was advised to look for fields sprayed with Sevin within that range. Brookhaven Laboratory does not use Sevin on any of its crops.

**Young Scavengers In A Hunt**

**Dollars and Sense**

**Truth-in-Lending - Finance Charge and Annual Percentage Rate**

How much is it costing you to purchase on credit? How much are your finance charges and what rate of interest will you pay? The answers to these questions are part of the disclosure requirements of the Truth-in-Lending law.

The finance charge includes all items the consumer must pay in order to obtain credit. Some examples of these charges are:

- Interest
- Loan fee
- Lender's fee
- Time Price differential
- Amount paid as discount
- Service, transaction or carrying charge
- Points
- Premium for credit or life insurance if part of credit terms

The annual percentage rate is the cost of credit stated in percentage terms. The regulations do not state any minimum or maximum charge, however, they do require the rate be stated to the nearest 1/4 of 1%.

Remember, Truth-in Lending does not tell the retailer how much he can charge, it simply tells him he must inform you, the consumer, how much it will cost you.

**Kids in the Pool Have a Crazy Time**




