




State of the Lab Message Delivered



Dr. Goldhaber Up-Dates Employees On Recent Developments - Future Prospects

Dr. Maurice Goldhaber, Director of Brookhaven National Laboratory spoke to all employees on Tuesday in order to bring everyone up to date on past developments and future prospects of Brookhaven. In order for all employees to hear his message, Dr. Goldhaber spoke to a capacity crowd in the Theater at three different times during the day. His report covered areas of finance and personnel as well as future prospects.

In the area of personnel changes, Dr. Goldhaber announced that Rodney Cool, Associate Director for High Energy Physics, is leaving the Laboratory to accept a position as Professor of Physics at Rocke-

such excellent use of the facility. We owe to Ken and Rod a tremendous debt, and would like to give them a vote of thanks."

Dr. Goldhaber then mentioned the retirement of Assistant Director Sam Tucker, who has done so much for the Lab in the past years. "Sam Tucker's presence and calm approach to problems will be sorely missed," said Dr. Goldhaber.

Dr. Leland Haworth, former BNL Director who recently retired as head of the National Science Foundation, was welcomed by Dr. Goldhaber as a former staff member who "decided that there is no better place than home!"

In speaking about the future for Brookhaven Lab., Dr. Goldhaber mentioned that even with the opening of the National Accelerator Laboratory, there will be a tremendous need for Brookhaven to carry out a large part of the kind of high energy research which universities would like to do. Dr. Goldhaber said that the High Energy Physics Advisory Committee to the AEC had recommended that the budget for the AGS be increased in the coming fiscal year, which it was.

Dr. Goldhaber pointed out that at Brookhaven we have some of the world's

same percentage as was authorized last year.

Dr. Goldhaber told of a proposal to the National Science Foundation for the establishment of a center for studies on structural biochemistry. Another proposal under development is for a center for environmental sciences. Present environmental and environmentally related research programs would form a nucleus for the establishment of such a center.

feller University. Dr. Cool will join the University at the start of the academic year in the fall. His successor will be Dr. Ronald Rau, Chairman of the Physics Department, who will become Associate Director for High Energy Physics in October. A new Chairman of the Physics Department will be announced at a later date.

Dr. Kenneth Green, will relinquish the chairmanship of the Accelerator Department this summer, and will be succeeded by Dr. Fred Mills, a professor of Physics at the University of Wisconsin, and a well-known accelerator expert.

According to Dr. Goldhaber, "We are fortunate that Dr. Green, with his great experience and technical inventiveness, will continue as a highly regarded Senior Scientist in the Accelerator Department. The high energy community owes a tremendous debt to Ken Green and Rod Cool for what they have done. Ken, by his vital contributions in producing what is still the world's most successful high energy accelerator to date, and Rod for developing the methods and procedures by which the high energy community at large could make

foremost tools for research, including the HFBR, the Tandem Van de Graaff, and the AGS. When the AGS modification is completed at the end of next year, it will be the most intense high energy machine available.

In speaking about the budget for the coming fiscal year, Dr. Goldhaber showed that while the overall budget is down, gains have been made in other departments to offset some of the loss in Applied Science. The 1971 budget permits increases in salary for the staff of approximately the

94th BNL Lecture On Pulse Radiolysis

Harold A. Schwarz of the Chemistry Department will deliver the 94th BNL Lecture on Wednesday, June 17, at 8 p.m. in Berkner Hall. Dr. Schwarz, who will be introduced by Dr. A.O. Allen, will talk on "Pulse Radiolysis."

The technique of pulse radiolysis is designed to allow observation of very reactive ions, free radicals and excited state of molecules. The species are produced by subjecting a sample to a short, intense pulse of radiation from an electron accelerator. The observation may be made in a number of ways, but the most commonly used method is the measurement of light absorption by the species. The time resolution of the technique can be as long as seconds or as short as 10 picoseconds.

Pulse radiolysis provides confirmation of the existence of reaction intermediates. It is the only source of information about the reaction kinetics and lifetime for some species.

Harold A. Schwarz was born in Nebraska. He received his B.A. from the

Municipal University of Omaha, and his Ph.D. in Chemistry from the University of Notre Dame.

Dr. Schwarz joined the staff of Brookhaven National Laboratory in 1951. From 1951-59 he served as associate chemist, and from 1959-66 as Chemist. He is currently a Senior Chemist at the Laboratory.

Dr. Schwarz is a member of the American Chemical Society and the Radiation Research Society. His primary interest lies in the fields of radiation and photochemistry.

Dr. Schwarz was married in 1953 and has four children; he and his family reside in Bellport, Long Island.

The lecture will be presented in Berkner Hall at 8 p.m. on Wednesday. A buffet supper will be served at the Brookhaven Center before the lecture starting at 6 p.m. Reservations should be made in advance by calling Ext. 2283 before 5 p.m. Refreshments will be available in the lobby of Berkner Hall immediately after the lecture.

Expressway Opens - At Long Last!

What has been described as "the world's longest parking lot" has now been extended to the very gates of BNL.

As of Tuesday afternoon, the Long Island Expressway has been opened for traffic from its former ending at the Patchogue-Holbrook Road, to Exit 65 at Horseblock Road. The opening of this six-mile stretch now makes possible (traffic willing) and uninterrupted, high speed journey, from Calverton to the Queens Mid-Town tunnel.

The opening of this last link of the Expressway will allow BNL employees to ride from the Lab to Patchogue and South Shore points with considerably less traffic than previously encountered.

Dr. Howard Levy To Speak At BNL

What is the role of individual moral responsibility in the conduct of national and international affairs? Dr. Howard Levy will speak on his personal views and experiences in a talk on "Medical Ethics and War" at the Brookhaven Center on Thursday, June 18, at 8:30 p.m.

Dr. Levy received his M.D. degree at the Downstate Medical Center and completed his residency in dermatology at the New York University Medical Center. During his military service he was sentenced by a court martial to three years imprisonment for refusing to instruct Vietnam-bound Special Forces trainees in medical techniques. Following his release last fall from the Federal Penitentiary in Lewisburg, Pennsylvania, after two and one-half years in prison, Dr. Levy joined the Health Policy Advisory Center, where he is now employed.

Prior to his court martial at Fort Jackson in South Carolina, Dr. Levy worked intensively with the Southern Christian Leadership Conference and other civil rights groups on voter registration.

This non-official talk is sponsored by the Vietnam Moratorium Committee and is open to all laboratory employees. Families and personal friends may accompany staff members on this occasion.

Concert Series For 1970-71

The BERA Concert Series for 1970-71 will be highlighted by some of the most illustrious names in the world of music. Eleanor Steber, prima donna of the Metropolitan Opera for over two decades, will open the series on Thursday, October 15. Eleanor Steber holds a unique position in the music world today. She is a star of six fields - opera, concerts, radio, television, records, and musical comedy. She has sung more than 50 leading roles and holds the honor of having sung more "firsts" at the Metropolitan than anyone else in the opera company. One of the outstanding concert artists of our time, she will present a song recital of unusual interest.

Ronald Roseman, one of the leading oboists in the country, will present a solo oboe recital on Tuesday, November 10. Ronald Roseman has established his reputation here and abroad as an oboe virtuoso and teacher.
