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Lecture By Sayre On Science And Art

Dr. Edward Sayre, BNL Senior Chemist and Adjunct Professor of Fine Arts at the NYU Institute of Fine Arts, will lecture on "Science and Art" at the Art Barn Lecture Series, on Tuesday, November 17 at 8 p.m. at the Unitarian Fellowship in East Setauket.

Dr. Sayre, who has been doing research in physical chemistry at Brookhaven since 1952, first became interested in applying neutron activation analysis techniques to the study of archeological objects in 1952. He was supplied with archeological finds from the Princeton Institute for Advanced Study.

In language the layman can understand, Dr. Sayre will discuss the types of information developed concerning the structure of works of art, and artists' techniques.

After receiving his BS from Iowa State University, Dr. Sayre pursued graduate studies at Columbia University. His studies were interrupted by World War II, during which he worked on the Manhattan Project. In 1960, Dr. Sayre helped establish the Conservation Center of the Institute of Fine Arts at NYU. Work there has been concerned with understanding the deterioration process of art objects. Ways have been developed to consolidate deteriorated areas and protect them from environmental conditions.

At the time of the Florentine floods, Dr. Sayre was one of a team of experts which traveled to Florence, Italy and was instrumental in saving art damaged in that disaster.

Dr. Sayre's talk will be illustrated by slides. The lecture at the Unitarian Fellowship, Rte. 25A and Bayview Avenue, E. Setauket, is free to Art Barn members and \$1.00 to the general public.

Beware Of Friday


Black cats, spilled salt, walking under ladders and all other omens of bad luck should be carefully avoided this Friday, November 13.

Squirrel Finds A Home In Dosimetry Laboratory


For the past few weeks it was sort of fun for the scientists in Instrumentation and Health Physics to have a squirrel visit them in the basement of the building on Technology Street.

But then the squirrel disappeared and was next seen in the dosimetry lab on the main floor of the building. How he (or she) got up the stairs and through the fire doors is still to be explained, but nevertheless, even if they are cute, squirrels are not welcomed into dosimetry labs.

After the first few beakers were smashed and the first instrument was recalibrated by the rodent, it was decided to find the animal another home. Traps were borrowed and baited, and the lab was closed to wait for the trap to be sprung.

But the squirrel had other ideas. Candy is dandy, and if a squirrel is careful, the bait can be removed without springing the trap. In this case, the squirrel made a home in an empty cardboard box on top

The dosimetry lab is back to normal, but the speculation still goes on. Will the squirrel return to the place where all those nice people fed him candy bars and peanut butter, or will he be content to stay out in the woods with others of his kind?

Time will tell.

Southampton University vs BNL

On Saturday, October 10 the BNL Soccer Team visited Southampton where in a fast and entertaining game they were defeated by the odd goal in five. BNL was without its regular goalkeeper due to sickness and was forced to substitute a man who had never played goal before. However, the team started strongly with outside left Preece giving the home defense a lot of trouble. A free kick by Preece was headed in by Batchelor but the referee adjudged a player offside and the goal was disallowed. Shortly afterwards Southampton was awarded a free kick just outside the penalty area and their center forward lobbed the ball over the defensive wall into the net. This goal stirred BNL to greater efforts and they were soon level when a long-range shot by Preece caught the Southampton goalkeeper unawares. BNL kept up the pressure and shortly before half-time Boyum scored a good goal from close range.

The second half started with the Southampton team attacking strongly and the BNL goalkeeper made a number of good saves before another Southampton free kick was forced through the BNL defense for the inside left to score a close range goal which the BNL defenders thought to be offside. This goal stung the BNL team into action and the Southampton goalkeeper was forced to make several saves. Play moved rapidly from end to end and then two minutes from time Southampton was awarded a corner which was headed home by their inside left. BNL fought back strongly after this setback and as the final whistle blew were pounding the Southampton goal in an all out but unavailing effort to score. Thus a fine game ended in victory for the home team which included an all-American player at center forward.

BNL 3 - Grumman Aircraft 0

Playing in its new green uniforms, the BNL Team looked as though it had come to Bethpage on business. In control for most of the match, the team looked very strong and confident throughout the game, and 10 minutes from the starting whistle Cox at center forward collected a loose ball and from 15 yards rifled a hard shot past the Grumman goalkeeper. The Grumman defense had trouble containing Preece who at left wing put a series of terrific crosses across the mouth of the Grumman goal, intercepted by Boyum and Cox they kept the Grumman defense very busy. Cox heading one just under the bar resulted in a great save by the Grumman goalkeeper.

The second half started much like the first. Preece, after a display of dazzling footwork, fired a tremendous shot and hit the back of the net from twenty yards. With 30 minutes left in the game and two goals in the bag, the BNL attack never slackened. With the Grumman players thrown back in their own half of the field, Cox took a pass from Boyum some 30 yards from goal and lofted the ball high towards the target. The Grumman goalkeeper came out to meet it and that was his blunder. The ball sailed over his head and into the net. Grumman was stunned but quickly regained their composure and bombarded the stone-wall BNL defense of Aggus, Fairchild, and Fewell, managing to break thru with two good shots that were saved at full stretch by John Keane who was playing his first game at goal for BNL.
