



Environmental Affairs Office Established By AEC

The Atomic Energy Commission today announced the establishment of an Office of Environmental Affairs to insure that its operations and responsibilities are responsive to environmental challenges the nation now faces. The Office will report directly to the General Manager.

Joseph J. Dinunno will head the new office which will provide advice and assistance to the General Manager and his staff on all AEC related environmental matters. It also will serve as a focal point for contacts with outside organizations on environmental matters and will assist in achieving coordination, consistency and compatibility among these activities.

For the past nine months, Mr. Dinunno has been serving as Assistant to the General Manager for Environmental Affairs. Previously he had been the AEC's Scientific Representative in Paris.

C.L. Henderson, Assistant Director of Regulation for Administration, will serve within the AEC's separate regulatory arm as coordinator on policy matters, procedures and problem areas concerning the impact of AEC-licensed facilities on the environment.

74 Summer Students Liven Up BNL Scene

The annual contingent of summer students, somewhat reduced in number this year, but as bright and snappy as ever, have started their research activities in the scientific departments of the Laboratory. Seventy-four juniors and seniors from 61 different universities came by plane, train and car, many from the East, but some from as far as Wisconsin State, Georgia Tech, Gonzaga University, U. of Chicago and Grambling College. Some appointees had to cancel at the last moment because they were drafted and one student was lost to the Peace Corps. Women's Lib. will be happy to know that girls represent about a quarter of the incoming students and the number increases every year.

The Summer Student Program is supported by the Division of Nuclear Education and Training of the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission. Applicants must have a B average or better, and are selected on the basis of references and transcripts and from those whose choice of field coincides with current research here.

L-Dopa Released For General Use

Parkinson's disease sufferers got good news last week when the Food and Drug Administration announced that L-Dopa would become available for general prescription use.

For several years the drug has been clinically tested at Brookhaven National Laboratory in the Medical Research Center by a team led by Dr. George Cotzias. Many patients from all walks of life, and in different stages of the disease have been treated at Brookhaven, some as hospital patients, and some as out-patients.

During the past two years, whenever any news reports about successful use of the drug have been circulated, the Medical Department has been deluged with letters, phone calls, and personal visits from people who either wanted to be treated with the drug, or who had a relative or friend who wanted the treatment. All requests were acknowledged, but only a small percentage of those applying have been able to be treated at BNL.

As a result of his work with L-Dopa, Dr. Cotzias has been interviewed many times on radio and television programs, has delivered numerous lectures on the subject, and has been given several awards for his work with Parkinson's sufferers. In November of 1969, Dr. Cotzias was named winner of the Albert Lasker Award for clinical medical research.

In commenting on the release of L-Dopa Dr. Cotzias said, "We are happy and gratified that Dr. Edwards and the Food and Drug Administration have released L-Dopa for general use by physicians. We at Brookhaven firmly believe that if physicians administer L-Dopa in the very slowly increasing daily amounts which we have recommended, a great many Parkinson's disease patients will achieve sufficient benefits to once again become self-reliant individuals."

The medical team working with L-Dopa at Brookhaven is headed by Dr. Cotzias and includes Dr. Paul Papavasiliou, Dr. Andreas Steck, Dr. Simone Duby, Samuel T. Miller, Alexander Nicholson, Lily Tang, Kathleen Burke Kinsch, Kazuko Horiuchi, and Margaret Bell, all of BNL, as well as Dr. James Ginos of the Mt. Sinai School of Medicine. The group also collaborates with scientists under Dr. Ismael Mena of the Catholic University at Santiago, Chile, where L-Dopa is being used to successfully treat manganese poisoning in a program identical to that used for Parkinson's disease.

Sound Water Is Lab For Biology Students

Students in the Marine Biology Laboratory class at the State University of New York at Stony Brook are getting an opportunity to work in one of the world's largest laboratories — Long Island Sound.

The class, taught by Dr. George Williams, Professor of Biological Sciences, includes a "hip boot expedition" to Mt. Sinai Harbor and boat trips to several areas of the Sound.

Heavy emphasis is placed on field work in the class. "This is the way the biologist interested in nature does it," said Dr. Williams. "He gathers the information where it's produced."

Students will study the salinity gradient in an area of Mt. Sinai Harbor where a fresh water stream terminates and collect aquatic organisms from stone jetties in the harbor. "The only work to be done in the classroom will be that directly related to what is learned on the field trips," Dr. Williams said. On another voyage aboard the "Mic-Mac," a 40-foot vessel belonging to the Marine Sciences Research Center at the University, students will take bottom and water samples in Port Jefferson Harbor.

Dr. Williams feels the proximity of Long Island Sound to a great urban center such as New York City is a unique feature. "The pollution gradient in the Sound is directly related to distance from the city," he said. "Pollution varies from next to nothing on the east end to almost total pollution near the East River."

Studies undertaken by fellow scientists at the Marine Sciences Research Center in Stony Brook are "strongly oriented" toward practical application in stopping the spread of pollution, according to Dr. Williams, who is currently engaged in a study of thermal pollution in the Sound.
