Atomic Licensing Board Sets Second Prehearing

A second prehearing conference has been scheduled for April 27 at Rocky Point, Long Island by the Atomic Safety and Licensing Board which will later conduct a public hearing to consider the application of Long Island Lighting Company for a permit to build a nuclear power plant in that vicinity. The prehearing conference will begin at 10 a.m. on April 27 in the Joseph A. Edgar School Auditorium, Route 25-A, Rocky Point, Long Island, New York.

At the first prehearing conference on March 13, the Board granted the petition of the Lloyd Harbor Study Group of Long Island to intervene in the proceeding and set a new date of May 25 for the hearing.

The purposes of the second prehearing conference are to define the material and relevant issues with reference to Implementation of the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969; the Control of Releases of Radioactivity to the Environment; and Licensing of Production and Utilization Facilities.

Legal arguments may be presented as to the effect of these Commission actions upon the issues and evidence in this matter.

At the conference, the Board will rule upon Intervenor's Motion for a ruling on the effect of the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 on the jurisdictional responsibility of the Atomic Energy Commission, which was deferred by the Pre-Hearing Order.

That Time Again



The last Sunday in April marks the start of Daylight Saving Time. Officially, the time to change your clocks and clock radios is 0200 hours Sunday, or if you will, 2 a.m. Set all clocks ahead one hour and avoid coming in to Church an hour late on Sunday, or coming in to work an hour late on Monday. Daylight Saving time will end in the Fall on the last Sunday in October, when the clocks are set back again for Eastern Standard time.

Earth Day Hailed By Town and Lab

While there was no official celebration of Earth Day at Brookhaven Lab, staff members from many Departments and Divisions participated in programs in Brookhaven Town and elsewhere. Speakers and exhibits from the Lab carried the environmental awareness message far and wide.

While Wednesday, April 22, was declared "Earth Day," programs were held all through the week, and to Sunday, April 26. On April 15, Bellport High School led off with an Environmental Evening with Paul Craig and Dennis Puleston among the speakers.

Saturday, April 18, Environmental Awareness Day was celebrated at Smith Haven Mall with a display from BNL and Alden Hinckley as a speaker. Jules Elias was coordinator of the day-long event.

On Monday and Tuesday a symposium titled "Man and His Environment" was held at St. John's University in Jamaica. Among those listed as speakers were Associate Director Victor Bond, AEC Commissioner C.E. Larson, and Dr. John Totter, Director of the Division of Biology and Medicine of the AEC.

A three-day Suffolk Environmental Conference held at the Islip Arts Theatre of the Suffolk Community College will start on Thursday, April 23 with a program of short films all with an environmental theme. On Friday evening there will be a speaker and another film. On Saturday, April 25, speakers will lead discussions on local and national problems. Dr. Victor Bond will talk on "Radiation and Our Future Energy Requirements."

At Stony Brook University on April 24, 25, and 26, Environmental Action will sponsor three days of activities on the campus relating to pollution, population growth, and related problems.

The "Teach In" will start with a day-long clean-up of campus litter on Friday followed by an open air dance at 8:30 p.m. on the Earth and Space Sciences Building Plaza. The Smubbs, a musical group with popular songs on pollution, will entertain at the dance.

A series of ten public panel discussions on Saturday will examine power generation, population problems, industrial pollution, sewage treatment, pesticides, and educational, political and legal aspects of environmental control. Panel members include: Dr. Leonard Hamilton, Dr. William Higinbotham, Dr. Warren Winsche, Dr. Donald Schweitzer, and Professor Paul Craig, all of Brookhaven National Laboratory.

Visit To Small Virus Set For Next Tuesday

When viruses are mentioned, people tend to think of colds and fever. But viruses can also provide simple systems in which to learn about life's basic processes. Next Tuesday's Brookhaven Lecture, "A Visit to a Small Virus" by Bill Studier of the Biology Department, is all about a small bacterial virus, T7. T7 is simply a single molecule of DNA wrapped up in a protein coat. When the T7 DNA is introduced into a bacterial cell, the host is taken over for the synthesis of new T7 DNA and new T7 proteins and for the assembly of new virus particles. How does T7 DNA take over the bacterial cell? How does it direct the production of new T7 DNA and proteins? How are new T7 virus particles assembled? How do we go about answering these questions? Come to Berkner Hall at 8 p.m. on Tuesday, April 28, and find out!

Dr. F. William Studier was born in Iowa, and received his undergraduate education at Yale in New Haven. After completion of requirements for a bachelor's degree in biophysics in 1958, he went to the West Coast to qualify for his doctorate in biophysics at Caltech in 1962.

Before coming to Brookhaven in the fall of 1964, he did post doctoral work at Stanford. Since joining the staff at BNL he has done research on DNA physical chemistry, and the genetics and physiology of bacteriophage of T7. Dr. Studier is a member of the AAAS, the Biophysical Society, and the Genetics Society.

Dr. Studier and his wife Susan live in Stony Brook with their two children, Fred, 6 years old, and Carol, 4 years old.

The lecture will be presented in Berkner Hall at 8 p.m. on Tuesday. A buffet supper will be served at the Brookhaven Center before the lecture starting at 6 p.m. Reservations should be made in advance by calling Ext. 2283 before 5 p.m. Refreshments will be available in the lobby of Berkner Hall immediately after the lecture.


Luncheon Club Closing

Relief In Sight For Harried Secretaries

Being buried in a paper storm is no fun - especially during National Secretaries' Week. For the secretary who is sick and tired of standing in front of a copying machine for hours on end while work is piling up on her desk, help is at hand.

The Quick Copy Service Center can take over the copying chore, and can even collate, staple and stuff the copies in envelopes at less of a cost to the Lab, and usually in less time than it would take the secretary to do it herself.

"Quick Copy" operates on a 24-hour schedule of three shifts, and has three high speed automatic Xerox machines that feed, count, collate and staple copies at the rate of 3600 sheets an hour. Letters and programs that are to be mailed out can be automatically inserted in envelopes that are sealed and delivered to the Mail Room as soon as they are ready.

Best of all, Quick Copy does not make a charge to the secretary's account. The service is free! Quick Copy will pick up a rush job whenever you call - day or night - and will return it to you as soon as you need it.


There are 22 other copying machines on site besides those in Quick Copy, and these are used to produce in the course of a year about 2,500,000 copies which if stacked in a pile would reach to 2½ times the height of the Reactor stack. All of the copies from these machines cost an average of 3 cents more per copy than those produced on the Quick Copy machines. In these times of tight money Quick Copy can offer the

Laboratory a total savings of almost \$75,000 a year.

The "Red Ball" service that picks up material for Quick Copy is dispatched by radio, and oftentimes can answer a call within minutes. Rush work can be delivered within hours, and routine work sent to Quick Copy before 5 p.m. is usually de-

livered early the next morning. The quality of work from Quick Copy is the best since it is produced on the most modern equipment available.

Supervisor of Quick Copy, Jack Laurie, has a staff of four people. Tyce Beede, Herb Davis, Joe Hanson and Jon Siebert all have the technical skills to help customers with their problems quickly and inexpensively.

Last year, with only one 3600 Xerox machine, and two Offset presses, over 7,500,000 copies were produced by Quick Copy. This year, with two more 3600 machines installed, more copies can be produced faster and more economically. The recent addition of an inserting machine has lessened the burden of such jobs as putting pay checks in envelopes, mailing press releases to newspapers and magazines, sending out the Brookhaven Bulletin to retired employees, and sending out meeting notices and programs to interested parties.

Questions about the special services available from Quick Copy can be answered by Supervisor Jack Laurie, Assistant Graphic Arts Supervisor Bill Bottinger or Graphic Arts Supervisor, Ken Boehm. The Quick Copy Service Center is located at 25 Cornell Avenue at the West end of Building 197, adjacent to the circle in front of the Cosmotron Building. Parking spaces have been reserved for anyone who wishes to come directly to the Center in order to discuss his copy problems with one of the supervisors.

All bosses who are interested in making life easier for their secretaries, and saving the Lab money at the same time, are urged to encourage the use of the Quick Copy Service.

Dr. Agnew Appointed Head of Los Alamos

Dr. Harold M. Agnew, a pioneer in the field of nuclear research, has been named director of the Los Alamos Scientific Laboratory effective September 1.

The appointment of Dr. Agnew to succeed Dr. Norris E. Bradbury, who is retiring, after 25 years as director, was announced Friday, by the regents of the University of California at a meeting in San Francisco.



Dr. Agnew currently is weapons physics division leader at LASL. In addition to applied research, his responsibilities have included direction of work in fundamental physical and chemical research. He received the AEC's E.O. Lawrence Award in 1966 and is a Fellow of the American Physical Society.

The 49-year-old physicist has been involved in atomic energy programs since 1942, when he was one of a group working with Enrico Fermi on the first nuclear fission chain reaction at the University of Chicago. He came to Los Alamos the following year.

In 1946, Dr. Agnew returned to Chicago to earn his doctorate under Fermi. Three years later he returned to Los Alamos to resume work at the Laboratory. Except for the period 1962 to 1964, when he was scientific advisor to NATO, he has been at Los Alamos ever since.

He has been technical advisor to a number of government agencies and in 1960-61 was technical consultant to the Joint Congressional Committee on Atomic Energy.

Cotzias on WNBC Research Report

Dr. George Cotzias, Senior Scientist at BNL's Medical Research Center will appear on the WNBC-TV television show, Research Report on Sunday, April 26 at 3 p.m.

Cotzias will be interviewed by Science Editor Frank Field on the subject of L-Dopa in the Research of Parkinson's Disease. During the program the history of Parkinson's disease will be traced both before and after the use of L-Dopa.

Dr. Cotzias will discuss with Dr. Frank Field first the current status of L-Dopa as a drug for the market. He will then indicate why he thinks that the advantages offered by L-Dopa grossly outweigh its disadvantages. Thereafter, Dr. Cotzias and Dr. Frank Field will discuss L-Dopa as a tool for further research. Dr. Cotzias will present the uses of dopaminergic drugs other than L-Dopa in the therapeutic study of Parkinson's Disease. He will discuss the relationships between trace metals and the therapy of Parkinsonism. He will finally indicate extensions of this work to other diseases at Brookhaven.
