

AEC Announces Merger Of Brookhaven and NY Offices

According to Robert E. Hollingsworth, General Manager of the AEC, the Atomic Energy Commission has approved the consolidation of the Brookhaven Office with the New York Operations Office to be effective July 1, 1970.

Under this arrangement, according to Hollingsworth, the New York Operations Office will assume responsibility for administration of the contract with Associated Universities, Inc., for operation of Brookhaven National Laboratory, and for other functions previously performed by the Brookhaven Office. An Area Office, reporting to the New York Operations Office, will be established at Brookhaven to perform on-site contract administration and support activities. There will be no change in the existing direct program management relationships between Brookhaven and

AEC Headquarters.

The relationship of the Brookhaven Area Office to New York was clarified further by NY Manager Wesley M. Johnson. He explained that he planned to have Brookhaven continue to carry the full responsibility for all activities relating to the AEC's contract with Associated Universities, Inc. "Everything concerning the Laboratory will pass over the Area Office Manager's desk."

Mr. Johnson emphasized that NY's complete resources will be available to the Area Office Manager, whom he envisions as playing the role of an NY assistant manager. "In this way," Johnson said, "the Commission can best continue the productive relationship with Brookhaven National Laboratory that it has maintained over the years."

Six From BNL Retire

With a combined total of 117 years of service to BNL behind them, six members of the staff will retire at the end of this month.

Silvio (Steve) Bello, General Foreman of Roads and Grounds in P E & P, started at BNL in the month of March, 1948. Before coming to the Lab he was in the Navy. His wife, Bertha, and their eleven-year old son are leaving for Florida on July 10. When they arrive, Steve plans to just fish and lie in the sun.

Loranus P. Hatch, Sanitary Engineer, DAS, has been at Brookhaven since February 1948. He served as a Major in the Army during World War II. He and his wife, Kathleen, have purchased a home in Camden, Maine for which Mr. Hatch has great plans. He will be busy for some time to come with alterations and renovations.

Theodor Korsos, I & HP Technician, came to the Lab in 1947 after leaving the Signal Corps at the end of World War II. He and his wife, Ruth (Head Nurse at Medical) are leaving around September first for a trip to Ireland and to Hungary. Until that time, Teddy will be kept busy

E. Van Horn Retires As AEC Head Of Brookhaven Office

Emery L. Van Horn, Manager of the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission's Brookhaven Office, will retire on June 30, 1970 after thirty-nine years of service with the Federal Government. Mr. Van Horn began his career in 1931 with the Corps of Engineers on public works programs in New York State and Vermont. In 1942 he was commissioned a First Lieutenant in the Corps of Engineers and assigned to the Manhattan District (Atomic Bomb Project) in Buffalo and Niagara Falls, New York.

After the war he was assigned as liaison officer with a northeast Initiatory University Group, whose efforts culminated in the selection of the site at Upton for Brookhaven National Laboratory.

Upon discharge from the Army as a Major in 1946, he was appointed to the AEC's Brookhaven Office where he has been Manager for twenty-four years and was responsible for the administration of the AEC's contract with Associated Universities, Inc. for operation of Brookhaven National Laboratory. During his career Mr. Van Horn was awarded the Medal of Merit for his service in World War II and the Outstanding Service Award of the Atomic Energy Commission.

Mr. Van Horn was born in Granville Township, Pennsylvania, and graduated from Lehigh University with a degree in Civil Engineering. He is a Fellow of the American Society of Civil Engineers, a Trustee of the Bellport Memorial Library, a member of the Board of Directors of the American Red Cross (Suffolk County Chapter), and a member of the Rotary Club of Bellport.

He resides with his wife, Pauline, in East Patchogue.

The AEC Brookhaven Office has also announced the retirement of Charles G. Yax on June 26, 1970 after completion of twenty-seven years of service with the Federal Government. Mr. Yax began his career in 1943 with the Manhattan District (Atomic Bomb Project) of the Corps of Engineers at Kenmore, New York.

In 1946 he came to Upton, Long Island, and assisted in the transfer of the former Camp Upton site from the Department of Defense to the Atomic Energy Commission, Brookhaven Office. He has held various responsible financial and administrative positions and has been Director of the Finance & Administrative Division of the Brookhaven Office since 1961.

Mr. Yax and his wife, Marie, plan on moving to Vero Beach, Florida, in July.

It was also announced that in addition to Van Horn and Yax, Donald C. Moore will retire on July 7. Mr. Moore began his

career with the Federal Government in 1934 when he accepted an appointment with the U.S. Department of the Interior at West Point, New York. In 1940 he transferred to the U.S. Corps of Engineers and served with the Manhattan Engineering District (Atomic Bomb Project) from 1943 to 1946, obtaining the rank of Major in the U.S. Army. Upon discharge from the Army, Mr. Moore was appointed to the position

of Budget Officer at the AEC's Oak Ridge Operations Office in Tennessee. In 1950 he was appointed Director, Engineering and Construction Division, New York Operations Office, where he remained until 1954 when he joined the staff of the Brookhaven Office. As Director, Engineering and Construction Division, he was responsible for the planning, design, and construction of facilities at Brookhaven.

Mr. Moore received his engineering degree from the University of Illinois, and resides in Roslyn, New York, with his wife, Lola.

Traffic Caution

As many Laboratory people have undoubtedly noticed, the east bound lanes of Princeton Avenue have been repaved recently, giving us a nice, smooth road. This jet-smooth surface has perhaps tempted people into driving faster than they used to over the old surface. In any event, it is a fact that there have been three accidents involving seven cars in that general area during the past two weeks. All happened in dry, clear weather.

Traffic moves at a rate of at least 2500 vehicles per hour on the east bound lanes of Princeton Avenue during the height of the morning rush hour, resulting in two lanes of closely bunched traffic. When the speed of this traffic climbs above the 40 mph average, the chances of a chain reaction type collision are very high. If the posted speed limit is obeyed, adequate space is kept between vehicles, and all lane changes are signalled, drivers will be ready in case some careless driver does the wrong thing. The Laboratory site is no special sanctuary where defensive driving can be forgotten and accidents do not happen.

Tennis Court Procedures

With the approach of summer, it is anticipated that the tennis courts will be in greater demand. There will be times when all six courts will be used and players will be waiting on the sideline for "their turn." Please remember these rules.

1. All players on the tennis courts must wear tennis shoes or sneakers. Street shoes will damage the court surface.

2. Tennis has first priority. Handball or other activities can be accommodated only when there are empty courts and there are no tennis players waiting on the sidelines.

3. When all courts are in use, Singles games should be deferred. Courts should be used for Doubles.

4. Tennis courts are not reserved except for the finals of the BERA Tennis Tournament.

BERA has eight tennis rackets available for loan. If you wish to play and don't have your racket with you, or you want to try out your tennis game before investing in a racket, you may borrow a racket on a daily basis. The BERA rackets are not for long-term loan. Rackets may be borrowed daily before 4:30 p.m. from D.M. Schaeffer (Ext. 2322) in the Administration Building, 40 Brookhaven Avenue on a first-come-first-serve basis.

Children

Parents bringing children to use the Pool should not do so any earlier than 15 minutes before their scheduled admission time. Children are to remain in the designated waiting area near the Pool's entrance until the pool opens for them and when waiting to be picked up by parents. The Gymnasium will not be available for this purpose.

Repairs

The Swimming Pool complex is now undergoing some maintenance, repairs and revisions. While the pool will remain open as scheduled, there will be times when certain of the pool's facilities will temporarily not be available.

Get In The Swim But Get Home Safe

The first swim in the ocean can be a harrowing experience for those who have previously been only to lakes and pools. Ocean swimming can be a lot of fun if some basic safety rules are followed. At Smith Point Park, the nearest ocean beach to BNL, the sun, the sand, and the waves make possible a complete day of sport.

Ocean waves are a joy to the surfer, a challenge to the bather, and a haven for the fish that feed on the churned-up bottom.

Never let a wave break over your head. Serious injury can result due to the churning action of the water, and the crushing weight as it falls. Always dive into a large breaker so that you come to the surface on the calm side to seaward.

An undertow, a sea puss, or a backwash, is created as the water washed up on the beach shelf by a breaker runs back to the sea. If caught in an undertow, swim parallel to the shore before trying to turn in to the beach again. If you find that you are tired, relax by floating on you back for a while or slowly treading water before swimming back to shore. Floating in salt water, incidentally, is much easier than in fresh water.

The prime rule for ocean swimming is to never swim alone, and never at a beach without lifeguard protection. Speaking of protection, don't forget the sun-tan oil even though the day is cloudy or overcast. The ultraviolet rays of the sun penetrate the haze on a chilly day, and a serious burn can result if proper precautions are not taken.



On the roof of the Linac building, Ken Doughty checks prints of the building with the help of Des McGrand and Walt Jacobs (right).




Checking system performance in the control room of the Linac is always a tense moment for Ken Batchelor (left) Pierre Grande (center) and Joe Sheehan (right)

Vincent LoDestro is running cables from the lower level to the upper level of the Linac service bay.




