




## A Park For Future Generations

The two parcels for the Water Authority will be for wells, and the Shoreham School District parcel will be reserved for a future school.

## Work Effectiveness Policy Reaffirmed

In a memorandum to department chairmen and administrative heads on "Work Effectiveness," Dr. Vineyard made the following statements:

"... that immediate steps be taken to insure conformity with the Laboratory's policies on working hours and sick leave. I remind you that Laboratory policy is and must be somewhat different for different categories of exempt and nonexempt employees. Thus, a nonexempt employee (this includes all weekly and some monthly employees) is expected to be on duty for the full number of hours for which he is scheduled.

"In certain cases, 'on duty' includes time allowed for required changes of clothes and special clean-up, but 'on duty' never includes times required for the dispersal and collection of car pools, excessive coffee breaks, and lengthy lunch periods.

"If required to work overtime, such employees receive supplemental pay. In contrast to the compensation paid to nonexempt employees, the monthly salary paid to exempt employees is considered full compensation for all time worked. Salary levels are set with due allowance for the extra work from time to time in certain jobs...

"Most of our employees at all levels observe the rules, perform well, and give us a fair day's work for a fair day's pay. For their benefit, it is our responsibility to curtail those few employees who do abuse Laboratory policy. Without corrective action, the abuse of these policies on working hours and sick leave rapidly tends to become a right in the minds of employees.

"I have requested the Personnel Manager to be responsible for regularly reviewing each department's progress in reducing abuse of sick leave, and working time. Late arrivals and early departures will be monitored by periodic gate checks."

Random gate checks will commence in December. The red light at the entrance gate will be turned on promptly at 0830 and a check of employees arriving after that time will be made by Security personnel. Similar checks will be made of employees leaving prior to 1700.

More than 70 science writers from daily and weekly papers; magazines; television and radio stations; listen to the above speakers brief them on the latest developments in science. In addition to the regular speakers, the writers also interviewed a score of Brookhaven researchers and visited many areas of the lab to view research equipment.

**The Week That Was . . .**

To many BNL'ers, the week of November 15 will forever be known as the week that was, perhaps never to be again. It was a week when many of the nation's top scientists visited BNL to speak to an audience of science writers who also came here from many parts of this country and Canada.

It was the week when Mrs. Julie Nixon Eisenhower, Governor Nelson Rockefeller, and numerous other notables visited BNL to participate in the ceremonies marking the transfer of the North Tract to the State and other new owners. These two events, one coming in the midst of the other, required more cooperation, resourcefulness, and pure stamina, of many BNL staff people than some of the "old timers" could recall in the entire 25-year history of the Lab. Yet, it all went according to schedule (which kept changing almost up to the last moment) with nary a hitch, and to everyone at BNL who was called upon to help, it was deeply appreciated, not only by the Lab management, but by many others who had any dealings with the Lab or its people and wrote to tell of their feelings.

Yes, Virginia, there "was a week that was" at BNL, and don't be surprised in the future if you overhear a conversation that begins, "Remember that week before Thanksgiving in 1971, when . . ."



**Showcase Is Showstopper Too**

As good as Showcase and the recent science writers week-long meeting here at BNL were, they did cause some complaints.

In fairness, however, the complaints were most complimentary, and centered around the theme that the premier performance of Showcase was not open for all Lab employees, their families and guests. "As you know, on the 'serious' part of our program, there are always some writers who don't find one or another of the scientist-speakers pleasing, but everyone was unanimous about Showcase, including the most sophisticated theater goers who were dropping the names of plays they had seen this fall in London and elsewhere."

And many of the science writers have seen the latest plays in London and elsewhere, so they were doing some critical comparing. This writer heard nothing but praise from the science writer audience, and many of them sought out the cast to tell them personally how much they enjoyed Showcase.

Now it is your turn to enjoy it. The dates are December 7 and 8, at the Brookhaven Center, starting at 8:30 p.m. The cost is \$1.50 per person, and a cash bar will be set up in the North Room. You can pay at the door, but the smart ones will get their tickets from the booth in the lobby of the cafeteria. We suggest that you get your tickets early as capacity is limited, and even make up a party of ten to fill the table. Table reservations will be honored until 8:20. Remember, he (or she) who hesitates will just be a wishful, or wistful, thinker.

**CREF Unit Values Listed**








