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## Experiments Of Nature Is Next AUI Lecture

Dr. Robert A. Good, noted immunologist and Chairman of the Department of Pediatrics of the University of Minnesota, will lecture on "Experiments of Nature and Pursuit of The Scientific Revolution" at Berkner Hall on Monday, February 1.

Dr. Good has been described as "... an elegant speaker, and has done fascinating research."

One of Dr. Good's research projects has led him far afield, and made "Experiments of Nature" more than an empty phrase. He noted a circumscribed area in Minneapolis, characterized by a high degree of infant mortality, childhood sickness and



generally marginal state of health. Modern measures supplied in great abundance failed to change this picture.

Dr. Good suspected that there exist factors beyond our current technology which contribute to disease and mortality. He therefore studied various wild animal populations in their natural habitat. He spent many rugged months in hostile territory despite his being a victim of poliomyelitis.

In collaboration with others he discovered that certain prides of African lions contain a fixed proportion of males versus females. They also maintained a fixed territory which had to be defended against violation by other prides. Upon weaning, both male and female lions had to join another pride.

After a ritual the females which were admitted into a pride were turned on by mechanisms unknown to perform the following functions: 1) They became hunters. 2) They became sexually responsive. By contrast, the males upon joining a pride became the fighters and as such were entitled to gorge themselves on the prey secured by the females.

During a battle which followed trespass by lions from another pride, all the males of the first pride were killed at a time when all the females were pregnant. The pregnant females gave normal birth but showed total disinterest in the young. The young were left to die. The presence of males in the right proportion appeared to inspire the females, so that they would take care of the young.

Dr. Good has confirmed his observations with other animal populations. He seems to believe that these animal populations constitute prototypes for the fatherless (Cont'd on page 2)

## BNL Service Station Becomes Citgo Dealer

After five years of operation as a Mobil Dealer, the on-site service station will become a Citgo station on February 1.

Citgo, the trade name for Cities Service Company, was awarded the contract for the operation of the station after bids were solicited from all the major oil companies. Paul Lindsay, operator of the station since 1949, will continue to be the proprietor of the on-site facility.

The service station was first opened in 1948 as a Gulf station and was located on Technology Street opposite the bank. In May, 1949, Paul Lindsay took over the operation and continued to sell Gulf gas until 1966, when the present station on Rochester Street was built by the Mobil Oil Company.

The contract with Citgo will be in effect for five years, during which time a percentage of the revenues will be paid to the Employees Recreation Association.

Citgo will have available both regular and premium grade of gas, as well as a full line of services and accessories. Included in the proposal for the operation of the station is a plan to install a New York State Vehicle Inspection Station as soon as details can be arranged.

During the first three months of operation by Citgo, Mobil credit cards will be honored, and applications will be received at the station for Citgo credit cards. In addition, the station will honor cards from Diners Club, American Express, Carte Blanche, Bank Americard and Master Charge.

Because of new regulations dealing with issuance of credit cards, individual applications will have to be made for a card for each member of the family. However, the cards will be of the "lifetime" type such as were issued by Mobil.

## Technical Information Headed by Binnington

Following the retirement of Dennis Puleston on December 31, John P. Binnington has been named to head the Technical Information Division.

The Division, which had formerly been called the Information Division, has been renamed in order to more accurately describe its function.

John Binnington started work at BNL in July, 1947 as Associate Librarian. He, with his wife Blanche and their two small children, were one of the first families to move into the on-site apartments. Prior to coming to Brookhaven he was Associate Librarian at the Merchant Marine Academy at Kings Point.



Mr. Binnington was born in London and as a child was brought to the United States where his family settled in Connecticut. He had his undergraduate education at the University of the South in Sewanee, Tennessee, and graduate studies at Wesleyan University in Connecticut and at Columbia University.

During World War II he served in the navy with the 7th Fleet in the Mediterranean Theatre.

He is a member of the Special Libraries Association, and a member of the Board of Trustees of the Bellport Library.

Mr. Binnington has always been interested in employee activities at Brookhaven, and served as President of BERA in 1969. He is presently Chairman of the BERA Special Events Committee, and an active member of two theatre groups. A sailing enthusiast, he spends much of his leisure time on the Great South Bay near his home in Bellport.

Mr. Binnington and his wife Blanche have four grown children. His headquarters at BNL is in the Research Library at 25 Brookhaven Avenue.

## Met Opera Star Steber At BNL



The fourth concert in the BERA concert series will feature Eleanor Steber who will make her long-awaited BNL appearance on Tuesday, February 2, at 8:30 p.m. in Berkner Hall.

A luminous, shining soprano voice coupled with rare musicianship and interpretive ability brought Eleanor Steber brilliant international acclaim.

American born and trained, Miss Steber is a unique artist, loved by concert and opera audiences alike and beloved of musicians and conductors.

With Miss Steber as the star, the Metropolitan Opera mounted its first production of Mozart's "The Abduction from the Seraglio," the American premiere of Richard Strauss' "Arabella," the world premiere of Samuel Barber's "Vanessa," and Alban Berg's "Wozzeck." Miss Steber has a grand total of 50 major operatic roles in her repertory -- a record that is matched by few if any other singers.

In honor of the inauguration of Lincoln Center for the Performing Arts, Eleanor

Steber presented a comprehensive series of three lieder recitals in Philharmonic Hall. Wrote the New York Herald Tribune: "When soprano Eleanor Steber walked out on the stage of Philharmonic Hall, everyone knew 'here was a star!' -- not just a Metropolitan Opera star -- but a star who can dazzle the beholder by a simple entrance.
