Dienes Gets Award From Carnegie-Mellon

Dr. George J. Dienes, senior physicist and head of Solid State Physics, will be honored by the Alumni Association of Carnegie-Mellon University at homecoming ceremonies October 20.

Dr. Dienes, an internationally renowned authority in solid state physics, will be given a Merit Award for the outstanding research he has done in his field.

The award is one of several given annually to alumni for outstanding professional achievements or service to their alma mater.

Dr. Dienes, who holds three degrees from Carnegie-Mellon, has made fundamental contributions to solid state physics in the areas of diffusion, order-disorder phenomena, point defects and radiation damage, and has played a major role in making the Brookhaven Laboratory one of the world's major centers of solid state investigation.

Dr. Dienes earned his B.S. in chemistry from Carnegie-Mellon in 1940, his M.S. in 1942, and his D.Sc. in physics and chemistry in 1947. He also earned an M.A. in mathematics from Columbia University in 1946.

Dr. Dienes was group leader of the Physics Division at the Bakelite Corporation from 1944 to 1949, and in 1948 and 1949 also served as an assistant professor at Hunter College in New York. In 1949 he became a research specialist in the Atomic Energy Research Department of North American Aviation, then joined Brookhaven Laboratory as a physicist in 1951. In 1955 he was appointed senior physicist at Brookhaven.

Dr. Dienes has authored over 100 research articles in professional journals and has authored three books. He has edited several professional journals, and has served on the board of editors for *Gordon and Breach* publishers since 1962.

Dr. Dienes was a member of the governing board of the American Institute of Physics in 1952 and 1953. In 1955 he was the United States delegate to the Atoms for Peace Conference, and from 1958 through 1962 he was a member of the Materials Advisory Board. He has been on the Solid State Sciences Panel of the National Research Council since 1953 and was a member of the visiting committee for the National Bureau of Standards from 1959 through 1965. He has also been a member of the visiting committee for the American Physical Society and a member of the Society of Rheology, of the A.A.A.S. and Sigma Xi.

Dr. Dienes and his wife, Margaret, an editor in the Information Division, live in Stony Brook, New York.

An exchange of general information was made covering such subjects as central computer facility usage, budget monitoring and control procedures, development of overhead rates and their application, and reimbursable work for others. The Budget Officers find the exchange of general information at these annual meetings to be very beneficial in solving mutual budgetary problems.

Science Congress Winner



The winner of the AEC award at the 1972 New York State Science Congress, Peter Goldman (center), and his science project counselor, Dr. R. Widman, of Valley Stream High School, were guests of the Laboratory on Monday. Dan Schaeffer toured them through Medical, Biology, the AGS, the LINAC, the 80-inch bubble chamber, and the HFBR. Peter is interested in physics and his winning project was the measurement of the nuclear magnetic moment of hydrogen atoms using a radio frequency resonance technique. Peter and Dr. Widman joined Deputy Director George Vineyard, Associate Director R.R. Rau, and Glenn Price of Scientific Personnel for lunch, during which a lively discussion took place regarding his project. Apparently it was a cliff-hanger. He did not find the magnetic moment he was looking for until about a week before the project was to be entered and judged. The 1973 New York State finals will be held at BNL on May 17-19, 1973. The Science Congress is sponsored annually by the Science Teachers Association of New York State.

Visitors' Days Coming Soon

Employees are reminded that the annual Visitors' Days at Brookhaven National Laboratory will be held this year on Saturday, October 28, for high school students and teachers, and on the following Saturday, November 4, for the general public. The gate will open at 9:00 a.m. and remain open until 2:00 p.m. The exhibits will remain open until 4:00 p.m.

As in the past, visitors will check in at Berkner Hall, where food and refreshments will be available, then proceed at their own pace through the many exhibits. Included in this year's program are the following:

Chemistry Building - Moon rocks and chemistry exhibits.

Exhibit Hall - Mathematics exhibits, including terminals to "talk" to BNL's central computer, will be here.

Gymnasium - Medical, biology, health physics, and instrumentation exhibits. The Amateur Radio Club at BNL will also operate its short wave station and send messages to servicemen, etc., for visitors.

Graphite Research Reactor - The first reactor designed and built for peacetime research, this reactor has been de-fueled, thus permitting visitors to see it up close. Remote control "mechanical hands" and solid state physics exhibits will also be located here.

Tandem Van de Graaff Accelerator - The only facility in the world in which two of the largest Van de Graaffs made are installed end to end. Visitors will be able to view the inside of the accelerators and see nuclear physics demonstrations and exhibits.

Alternating Gradient Synchrotron - Experimental Area - Demonstrations and exhibits on accelerators, particle beams, and high energy physics.

Cotzias To Receive AEC Citation

Two Biomedical researchers and a contributor to the gas centrifuge process for separating isotopes have been named to receive Atomic Energy Commission Citations for outstanding contributions to the Nuclear Energy Program.

Dr. James R. Schlesinger, AEC Chairman, today announced citations will be presented to Dr. George C. Cotzias whose Brookhaven National Laboratory team developed the first successful treatment of Parkinson's Disease using L-Dopa; Dr. Norman G. Anderson who headed development at Oak Ridge National Laboratory of a centrifuge system for mass production of a pure Influenza vaccine and Dr. Jesse W. Beams of the University of Virginia, a pioneer in the development of the Gas centrifuge for separating Isotopes and AEC's use of this process for separating Uranium Isotopes.

The awards, consisting of a Citation and a symbolic Medallion will be presented at a ceremony at the Commission's Germantown, Maryland, Headquarters on November 2, 1972, at 4:00 p.m.

The Citation follows:

George Constantin Cotzias

For his distinguished service as Senior Scientist in the Physiology Division and Senior Physician in the Medical Research Center at the Brookhaven National Laboratory; for his courage and perception in electing to reinvestigate Dopa as a therapeutic agent for Parkinson's Disease despite the earlier failures of others and his persistence in pursuing this endeavor until the first effective insight, which has opened new experimental and conceptual avenues to the study and control of serious neurological disorders; and for his contributions to mankind.

How The BERA Budget Is Developed

Each BERA activity requiring funds submits a request to BNL's Recreation Supervisor George Sabine, who reviews it along with the many other needs of the Association. For example, How much money will be required for facility equipment, salaries, insurances and other operating expenses?

George then estimates how much income will be forthcoming via commissions and how much will be generated by the activities. He then prepares and presents a balanced proposed budget along with his recommendations to the BERA Executive Board for their consideration.

The Board discusses each request in depth and tries to establish priorities which will result in a budget which best represents the interests of the employees.

After the Board's approval, the proposed budget is submitted to management for approval - and implementation.

Concert Series To Start Soon

The 1972-73 season will begin on November 15 when BNL will welcome a group of distinguished visitors from France. The Toulouse Chamber Orchestra will offer a concert consisting of works by Handel, Rameau, Hindemith and Bartok. This group of 13 instrumentalists was founded in 1953 and is a three-time winner of LeGrand Prix du Disque. It has toured all of Europe and made its North American debut in 1969-1970 to great critical acclaim.

The Vaghy String Quartet will visit BNL on January 24. This ensemble was founded in 1965, has toured all over the U.S. and Canada, and is now Quartet-in-Residence at Queen's University, Kingston, Ontario. The quartet has been critically praised in such terms as "triumphant" and "ravishing quality of ensemble."

The young and widely acclaimed pianist Susan Starr will give a recital on February 27. Miss Starr made her debut at the age of six, and 14 years later became the first American since Van Cliburn to rank among the top winners in the Tchaikovsky Competition in Moscow. Her North American tour last season included her Carnegie Hall debut which was sold out.

The fourth concert will be presented on March 27 by the Richards Quartet, an ensemble consisting of flute, oboe, clarinet, French horn and bassoon. The group is in residence at Michigan State University and has performed all throughout the U.S. Their repertoire encompasses music ranging from Beethoven to Samuel Barber.

The series will close on April 26 with a lecture-concert by the Museum Musicum Trio, a group consisting of performers on recorders, baroque flute, harpsichord and other ancient instruments.
