BNL and IBEW Agree On 25-Month Contract

The Laboratory and IBEW Local Union 2230 reached agreement on a 25-month Contract beginning July 1, 1972 and terminating July 31, 1974. Members of the Local Union ratified the new Contract on July 5th. Provision is made for a wage increase of 5% the first year and 6% the second year. In addition, 26 employees will receive classification adjustments.

The following changes of benefits were also agreed upon:

- A sick leave repurchase plan will become effective December 31, 1972. At that time, and annually thereafter, employees who have accumulated unused sick leave in excess of 108 since the first of each January, beginning January 1, 1972, will be reimbursed at the rate of one day's pay for each four days of unused sick leave in excess of 108 days.

- All medical insurance premiums will be paid by the Laboratory, starting with the first payroll period in January, 1974.

- Beginning July 10, 1972, the maximum number of allowable doctor and dentist visits will be four, of up to two hours each, for the balance of this calendar year and for each full calendar year thereafter without charge against sick leave or vacation credit.

All of the above modifications are subject to governmental Economic Stabilization controls.

Dr. Veljko Radeka has announced the appointment of D. Gerd Dimmler as Head of the Systems Group in the Instrumentation Division. He will have the general responsibility for development and implementation of computer-based instrumentation and control systems.

Tick Caution


As ticks are making their usual seasonal appearance in Suffolk County, Dr. George E. Leone, Commissioner of Health, recently stated that there were 15 cases of Rocky Mountain spotted fever in the year 1971. Following treatment, all patients recovered from the illness associated with tick bites. Three confirmed cases for 1972 have been reported.

Individuals with an undetermined fever and rash, especially with a history of a tick bite, should seek medical care. Treatment with specific antibiotics promptly controls the infection. Dr. Leone noted not all ticks are infective. The American Dog Tick (*Dermacentor variabilis*) is found in Suffolk County.

Ticks cling to tips of grass blades, along the edges of mowed lawns bordered by meadows or dense undergrowth, animal trails, garden paths, and roadsides.

The disease is transmitted to man or animal by the bite of an infected tick. The disease is not communicable from person to person, but contamination of the skin with crushed tissues of feces of infected ticks may lead to infection. Ticks therefore should not be removed with the fingers but with a tweezer.

Dogs and cats may bring ticks into the home so it may be helpful to use a de-ticking spray on them.



121 units of blood were fractionated, producing 121 each of packed red cells and plasma like the ones being held.



Packets of plasma are put in a freezer where they can be preserved for a year. The plasma can be used by hemophiliacs and leukemia patients.

Tennis Everyone!

Because of the increase in new tennis players who may not be familiar with the traditions of the sport, the tennis committee wishes to make the following information available.

All players on the tennis courts must wear tennis shoes or sneakers. Street shoes will damage the court surface.

The tennis courts are for tennis. BERA has provided other facilities for handball.

The tennis courts are not a safe playground for young children. Parents are requested to keep their toddlers and tricyclers off the courts.

Tennis nets should not be over-tightened. The proper height at the center is 36 inches. Some players measure this height as one racquet length plus one racquet width.

Tennis is a "gentleman's game." All players and spectators are expected to exercise sportsmanship and conduct themselves with decorum. Any action which serves to interfere with the concentration of the players should be avoided. Obviously, outbursts of temper have no place on the courts. Wait until action on a court has temporarily stopped before crossing behind a player for any reason. If a tennis ball has strayed to another court, do not chase after it. Ask politely for its return during an appropriate pause in the play. Many players object to the sound of an automobile engine idling while the driver watches the activity on the courts. Please turn off the ignition if you want to watch play from the parking lot.
