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J.M. Hendrie Named To AEC Licensing Unit

Dr. Joseph M. Hendrie, Senior Physicist at Brookhaven, has been appointed Deputy Director for Technical Review in the AEC's directorate of licensing. Dr. Hendrie assumed his new post on May 15.

In announcing Dr. Hendrie's appointment, L. Manning Muntzing, AEC Director of Regulation, said:

"We are pleased that Dr. Hendrie has agreed to accept this key position on our licensing staff. He has had 17 years' experience in the nuclear reactor field, including six years as a member of the Commission's Advisory Committee on Reactor Safeguards. His long experience in the physics and engineering design of nuclear reactors makes him especially suited to supervise the reactor safety, containment safety and site safety aspects of our licensing program."

The licensing directorate was one of the three major units established in the reorganization of the AEC regulatory staff which was announced on April 25. It per-



forms all activities related to staff review and processing of applications for nuclear power plant and other facilities licenses, radioactive material licenses and the licensing of reactor operators. The other two directorates are regulatory standards and regulatory operations.

Dr. Hendrie received the B.S. degree in physics from Case Institute of Technology in 1950, and the Ph.D. degree in physics from Columbia University in 1957.

He joined Brookhaven National Laboratory in the Nuclear Engineering Department in 1955, and performed research on the physics of nuclear power reactors. He directed the design and construction of the nuclear source reactor and the High Flux Beam Reactor at Brookhaven. He has worked in the area of high strength concrete structures, stress analysis, nuclear power plant siting and safety, and cryogenic power transmission. He is currently senior Physicist and Head of the Engineering Division of the Department of Applied Science at Brookhaven.

Feldberg To Lecture On Electrochemistry

Stephen W. Feldberg, a chemist in the Department of Applied Science, will deliver the 111th BNL Lecture on Wednesday, May 24, at 8 p.m. in Berkner Hall.

The subject of Dr. Feldberg's lecture will be "Computer Simulation of Electrochemical Phenomena."

According to Feldberg, "Electrochemistry" in the broadest sense of the word can refer to a variety of phenomena ranging from the chemistry of car batteries and fuel cells to the problem of ion transport and bio-electrical impulses.

An aspect of electrochemistry which has been of interest to Dr. Feldberg is the study of the electron transfer process between a chemical species in solution and a metal surface. There are, however, several additional complicating phenomena, for example the diffusion of reactants and products to and from the electrode surface and the chemical reactions of these species in the solution. The mathematics required to unravel these phenomena ranges from difficult to impossible.

It is possible, however, to develop solutions for even the most complex systems using the technique of computer simulation. The approach is conceptually simple and allows even the non-mathematically oriented experimentalists to test their theoretical interpretations. Dr. Feldberg hopes to demonstrate this approach in such a way that a general audience can appreciate its simplicity and usefulness.

He plans to discuss briefly the application of the computer simulation technique to problems in membrane phenomena. Hopefully, some light may be shed on the interesting, and to a great extent mysterious, aspects of bio-membranes.

Stephen Feldberg received his undergraduate and graduate degrees from Princeton University where he earned the Ph.D. in 1961 with a thesis on "Electrolytic Formation and Dissolution of the Platinum Oxide Film." In 1961 he came to Brookhaven as a Research Associate (post doctoral). He has been at the Laboratory since that time, except for brief periods in 1964 and 1968 when he taught, first as Visiting Assistant Professor and later as Visiting Associate Professor, at the University of Kansas, Lawrence.

His research interests include electrochemical effects of coupling heterogeneous electron transfer and homogeneous chemical kinetics, and theoretical membrane models.
