



## Nursery School Registration

The Upton Nursery School is now registering children for the 1973-74 school year. The School offers three- and four-year old children a variety of opportunities in social activities, art, dramatic play, music, outdoor activities and experiences that build readiness for work in elementary school. Classes are held in the Recreation Building in the Apartment Area. Professional teachers are in charge of all classes.

When they arrived at Brookhaven Airport the Schweizer 2-33 sailplane had just returned from Sayville after two hours of cavorting around the clouds. The other Schweizer 2-33 that was to be used was soaring overhead at 6,000 feet. Weather conditions were perfect. A bright sun and a cold front from the north-west produced an ample array of cumulus clouds to mark the thermals - those invisible columns of rising air in which sailplanes climb.

A tow by a Supercab to a little more than a thousand feet in these 2-place sailplanes was all the height that was necessary to reach the thermals. At this point the rope is released and the thermal center is located and the sailplane begins to climb high above the airport. Each flight was ended only in order to give the next eager passenger a flight.

## Chairman's Statement On Energy Message

AEC Chairman Ray issued the following statement to the news media on Friday, June 29:

"The Atomic Energy Commission will proceed at once to carry out the President's directives as outlined in his energy message today. We will conduct a comprehensive review of high priority R&D programs for FY 74 which will be completed and forwarded to the President by September 9. We will also undertake immediately, with the assistance of other agencies, to survey public and private energy R&D programs and prepare recommendations on an integrated energy research and development program for the Nation, including cooperative efforts with industry. These recommendations will be reported to the President by December 9. We are pleased that the President has chosen the AEC to undertake this important assignment. We recognize that this is a key part of the far-sighted initiatives the President is taking, and we will apply to this endeavor the best talents of the Commission and the unique capabilities of our national laboratories."

## BNL Takes Steps To Conserve Energy

A few months ago, you may have still thought that the energy crisis was a myth, but last week-end, when your gas tank was empty and your friendly service station was closed, the idea of a shortage became meaningful.

The need to conserve is no longer confined to the summer months when air conditioning is added to the electrical load and vacationers take to the highways. Energy conservation has become a full-time job.

BNL employees have been asked to reduce their use of automobiles, lights, and air conditioning. As a result of the most recent memo sent to all employees in June, Associate Director for Administration Vincent O'Leary noted that several people have submitted suggestions, and "we have taken corrective action," in those areas where power could be reduced.

The need to conserve is important to everyone. There is currently a space utilization study underway, investigating the possibility of consolidating people where possible, so that excess buildings may be closed and power rerouted. As part of the effort to conserve electricity, scientific personnel are also asked to turn their equipment off when not in use.

Any suggestions as to how the Laboratory can maintain efficiency while reducing its consumption of energy, can be reported to Plant Engineering. "We would like to mount a concerted effort . . . to save in any way," said O'Leary. "The biggest thing is to try to overcome public apathy."

## Graduate Program In Applied Math

Professor Daniel Dicker and Mrs. Esther Weitzman of the State University of New York at Stony Brook will discuss the proposed graduate program in Applied Mathematics at a meeting Thursday, July 12, at 11 a.m. in the Physics Seminar Room.

This program, announced in a memorandum to all employees on June 14, will lead to the Master of Science and Doctor of Philosophy degrees and will be conducted at Brookhaven. So far, about 60 employees have responded and, if interest is maintained, the program could get underway as early as September 1973.

All employees who are interested in pursuing graduate study in Applied Mathematics and Statistics are urged to attend the meeting.

## Lab Responds To Blood Need

Even a hospital patient wanted to give. That's how enthusiastic the response was to the BNL blood drive. When the Greater New York Blood Program's Bloodmobile came to the Lab on June 28 and 29, over 600 donors answered the call to give.

After registering, each donor gave a medical history to a bloodmobile staff member in order to establish his or her eligibility. The big point was, "Is it safe for them," said one Red cross volunteer. The donor's health always comes first.

While donors were tested, nurses and volunteers prepared the collection units which come in either single, double, triple, "quad" or "quint" packs. Single packs are made to contain one pint of whole blood. Multiple packs however, are made up of a main bag and a satellite, allowing the blood to be spun into its component parts at the processing center. If a "quad" pack is used for example, one donor may help up to four different people once the blood has been fractionated.

Whole blood is used in cases of acute bleeding. Fresh frozen plasma is given to hemophiliacs, while platelets aid in the treatment of bleeding disorders and gamma globulin helps to prevent infections such as hepatitis and polio. The blood may also be flash frozen and stored in liquid nitrogen for future use.

After the blood was drawn, each donor was escorted to the canteen area for refreshments. Beverly Gwathney, one of the first donors, chided Alfred Berretta, a first-time donor, as he approached the canteen escorted by a pretty volunteer. "That's the reason he gives it," said Gwathney, "just to have someone guide him to the table." Berretta laughed and replied, "I've never had such service." Another donor remarked, "These people are doing a wonderful job, and so is Alf Christoffersen (Blood Program Chairman) who sets this whole thing up."

Besides Christoffersen, there were others who made the drive work, including some that donors may have missed, like Mary Gager and Beverly Newman. "We're what's called kitchen help," said Beverly as she and Mary prepared refreshments. Both volunteered their time to help with the drive.

Back at the canteen tables, Vera Scott said, "I don't enjoy it one bit." When asked why she still donated she said "I might need it someday." She also mentioned her elderly parents who may benefit at some time.

One other donor seemed to capulize the feelings of those who gave, "We wanted to help. Somebody needs it."

Note: Because donor cards are computer-issued, it is sometimes necessary to put human feed-back into them. In addition, a large number of donors have never received cards. If you have: 1) never received a card, 2) lost your card, 3) have married or moved, 4) if your blood type disagrees with a previous donation, please furnish to Alf Christoffersen, your name, address, birth date and the approximate date of your last donation. New donors should receive their cards in five to six weeks.
