## Tennis News

John Elmore beat Andy Kevey to win the 1973 men's singles championship of the BNL annual tennis tournament. The score was 5-7, 7-6, 6-1. It was an extremely close and exciting match throughout the first two sets. Kevey was behind 3-5 in the first set before taking four games in a row for the set. His play was exemplified by outstanding defense, brilliant anticipation, and shrewd placement of shot. The second set was close all the way. Elmore's big game, with twisting serve, flashing backhand, and crashing overheads was essentially nullified by Kevey's steady shotmaking and a few untimely errors. The second set tie-breaker game went to Elmore, leading 4 points to 3, on a shot of Kevey's that missed by inches. The final set was all Elmore's. His game came together as Kevey, fatigued from the heat, humidity, and pace, could not keep up. A crowd of about 40 watched.

For those of a historical bent, John Elmore won the men's singles championship back in 1966. That same year he teamed with Kevey for the doubles championship. Remember?

## Wednesday Concert By Flutist Nina Barwell

At 8:30 p.m. Wednesday September 12, Nina Barwell will give a flute recital to the accompaniment of piano and cello, in Berkner Hall. The program will include works of Telemann, Roussel, Copland, C.P.E. Bach, Messiaen, and Martinu.

Miss Barwell is a graduate of the New England Conservatory of Music, Boston, Mass. She was a recipient of a Fulbright Grant to Paris, France where she studied with Jean-Pierre Rampal. During her two years abroad she played numerous concerts in Paris and in the central part of France and appeared as flute soloist with the orchestra of Uppsala, Sweden.

Miss Barwell has been on the faculty of music at the University of Wisconsin at Stevens Point where she was a member of the Walden Woodwin Quintet and taught flute, music theory and chamber music. She toured throughout Wisconsin and Minn. with the Quintet and played several solo recitals on the Wisconsin State Radio network. Presently Miss Barwell is associated with the State University of New York at Stony Brook.

Accompanist Carol Baron's career as a concert pianist began while she was still attending college. Taking leave from her studies, she had a successful tour of the U.S. and Canada, then returned to complete degrees at Queens College. Mrs. Baron studied piano with Israel Citkowitz, Bruce Simonds and Dorothy Taubman. Her studies in musical analysis were extensive and she studied composition with Luigi Dallapiccola.



In recent years, Carol Baron has edited contemporary piano music for publication. She has participated in recitals and chamber music with New York's leading musicians, most significantly with her husband the world famous flutist, Samuel Baron, and she is a member of the Duo Consort. She has recorded contemporary music for Desto Records and Serenus.

Yvonne Cable, cellist, received a masters degree from SUNY at Stony Brook, where she is a student of Bernard Greenhouse. Miss Cable has played at the Spoleto Music Festival in Italy, was a cellist with the New Jersey Symphony and currently plays with the Suffolk Symphony Orchestra.

The recital next Wednesday evening will begin at 8:30 p.m., in Berkner Hall. Tickets are \$2.00 for adults and \$1.00 for those under 18 years of age. Tickets will be available at the door.

### Concerts

Francesca Pannell, soprano, and the Baroque Chamber Sorority will present Chamber Music by J.S. Bach at 8 p.m., Thursday, September 13, in the Stony Brook Union Auditorium. The program will include such pieces as "Sonata in G minor for Cello and Harpsichord," and "Sonata in A minor for Solo Violin."

### Lectures

Professors Arniold Strassenberg and Lester Paldy of the Physics Department will lecture on Mondays and Wednesdays from 5:30 to 6:45 in Room 128 of the Graduate Chemistry building on "The Science Establishment in the United States." The lecture will include a study of the organizations and institutions, such as Congressional Committees, national laboratories and industry, that shape and direct American science.

He will examine selected great works of contemporary African, Asian, and Latin American fiction with a view to discovering the unique historical and cultural experiences of life which they provide.

Dr. Sheldon Ackley will discuss "The Philosophy of Law" in a weekly lecture on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 8:30 to 9:45 p.m. in Room 258 of the Social Sciences building. He will explore the relationship of law with philosophical and social ideas such as freedom, rights, morality, welfare, property and equality.

"Darwinism: An Intellectual Revolution" will be the topic of Professor Peter Bretsky's weekly lecture held on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 5:30 to 6:45 p.m. in Room 101 of the Lecture Center. The material will study the concept of natural selection including its effect on science, theology, and the economy of Europe and America in the latter half of the 19th century.

On Wednesdays, Dr. Forrest Dill of the Sociology Department will discuss "Contemporary American Society" from 7:00 to 8:15 p.m. in Room 102 of the Lecture Center. The lectures will embody a sociological analysis and description of salient issues in American social life.

Dr. Robert Schneider will lecture on Thursdays from 7:00 to 8:15 p.m. in Room 116 of the Lecture Hall in the Chemistry Building, on "Chemistry in Human Culture." He will focus on the impact of chemistry on the developing culture of man.
