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Retirement Plan Changes

The information distributed to retirement plan participants on November 26th, regarding the Retirement Plan, has generated questions. The following are some typical questions and their answers:

Question 1: I am presently participating in the retirement plan but I am not required to make any contributions. I am not interested in SRA and do not intend to make any contributions in the future. What must I do?

Answer: Do nothing - no forms need be returned.

Question 2: I am presently only making a voluntary contribution to the retirement plan. I am not interested in SRA, but I wish to continue my present voluntary contribution amount. What must I do?

Answer: On either the Payroll Deduction or the Salary Reduction form, whichever was sent to you, check item 1B, fill in your present voluntary amount on line 2 of the form and sign and return it to the Payroll Supervisor.

Question 3: I am presently only making required contributions to the retirement plan. I want to keep it that way. What must I do?

Answer: On either the Payroll Deduction or the Salary Reduction form, whichever was sent to you, check item 1A and sign and return the form to the Payroll Supervisor.

Nuclear Science At UN

To celebrate the founding of the United Nations, Dixy Lee Ray was asked to provide an exhibit commemorating 25 years of Nuclear Science. A reception was held to premier the exhibit at the Smithsonian Institution for the International Atomic Energy Agency. The National Laboratories were asked to provide artifacts. Chosen for exhibit were the I^{132} and Technetium 99m generators as well as a variety of the polymer materials from Brookhaven.

After the Smithsonian Institution the exhibit was on display at the Pan American Union prior to the United Nations showing. Future planned showings include the Franklin Institute and Atomic Energy Museum at Oak Ridge.

Turning Off Lights Really Saves Power

Lighting BNL's laboratories, offices and shops consumes 10,000,000 kilowatt-hours of electricity each year. Reducing this use by 20 percent through lowering lighting levels and turning off unneeded lights would be equivalent to saving the power used by a community of 500 people. Since most of our electric power is generated at LILCO's oil-fired plants, the savings in fuel oil would be over 150,000 gallons per year.

Good progress has already been made in cutting down corridor lighting, reducing lighting levels in offices and conscientiously turning off lights whenever an area is unoccupied. As a result of such conservation measures, the consumption of power for general building services last month was 16 percent lower than for the same period a year ago.

Continuing efforts are needed in conserving energy by turning off fluorescent lights when they will not be needed for at least one hour. Incandescent lights should be turned off any time they are not needed. The life of a fluorescent tube is greatly shortened when it is turned off and on at intervals less than one hour.

One way not to save power is to extinguish fluorescent lamps by rotating them 90° and leaving them in the fixture. Such lamps could easily fall out and cause serious injury. Plant Engineering's Electric Shop (Ext. 3280) will take care of removing unneeded lights. Where practical, they will disconnect the fixture from the circuit to eliminate the small power loss in the ballast.

Dear Sir:

I believe everyone is trying to do his or her best at conserving gas, fuel oil, and electricity, but I believe a few are trying too hard and may be wasting more than they are saving. Could you investigate and publish information (facts) concerning the amount of electricity that is needed to start six (6) banks of fluorescent bulbs, 4 bulbs per bank, as opposed to the amount of electricity that one thinks he is saving by turning them off for 15-20 minutes while he leaves the room, then turns them back on again when he returns. This occurs several times per day in our building and I think that this not only wastes electricity but also shortens the life of the bulbs and starters. If I'm wrong, please say so; if I'm correct, please publish some data to this effect. I'm sure many of us would appreciate this and any other factual information that would help us conserve energy.

Reply:

The question of turning off fluorescent lights was discussed briefly in a *Brookhaven Bulletin* article of June 15, 1973. Further information will appear in this week's *Brookhaven Bulletin*.

An energy saving occurs whenever lamps are turned off, even for a short time. However, the life of a fluorescent lamp is shortened each time it is turned on. For example, the 40-watt, rapid-start fluorescent lamp commonly used on Site has an average life of almost 30,000 hours when burned continuously.

Weighing the cost of relamping against the dollar value of energy saved, it is economical to turn off fluorescent lights when they will be left off for a minimum of one hour.
