



L.I. Sound — Energy, Environment and Planning

A comprehensive look at Long Island Sound and its relationship to the energy crisis is offered as the latest publication of Brookhaven National Laboratory, entitled "Energy, Environment and Planning: The Long Island Sound Region."

Officially known by the dull title of BNL 50355, the proceedings of a conference held at Brookhaven in October 1971 give an overall look at Long Island Sound from all viewpoints associated with the need for energy sources in the future.

Participants in the conference were drawn from all scientific disciplines and a wide variety of political persuasions. Organizations ranged from the Long Island Lighting Company to the League of Women Voters.

During the summer of 1971 several members of the staff of Brookhaven National Laboratory who had become interested in various aspects of energy policy began to develop the idea of a Conference on regional energy planning. Although a primary focus of the Conference was to be the incorporation of scientific and technical knowledge into the planning process, energy planning was to be examined in a broad sense. As presented in the announcement of the Conference: "The primary focus of attention will be the future development of central-station power in the region, but this subject will be examined in a broad context with regard both to technical options and to social, environmental, and planning implications."

Twenty papers were presented and are reproduced in the report, edited by Murrey Goldberg, together with the discussion generated from each presentation. The titles are intriguing and the content varies from general interest to highly technical.

The diversity of opinion and attitude of the participants will be obvious in the reading of the proceedings. The ultimate justification for the meeting turned out to be a subtle but significant increase in communication, the recognition of common interest, and the increase in common understanding, though it proved difficult to capture all of this in the written record. It became clear that, if this crucial area of public planning is to be carried out effectively, this sort of communication must be greatly increased and organized. It is as a contribution toward that end that this volume has been published.

Special thanks are due to the numerous staff members of the Laboratory who worked with Program Chairman Phil Palmedo in defining the focus and content presented in the proceedings.

The Rules:

1. A team shall consist of two bowlers, one male and one female. At least one member of each team must be a BNL employee (per BERA definition).
