

Energy Cost Study Underway Now At Brookhaven Lab

Social scientists, including sociologists, economists, and environmentalists, will meet with Brookhaven National Laboratory staff members for the coming three weeks to make an intensive study of dealing with the external costs of energy.

The 42 participants from colleges, universities, and foundations throughout the United States, and 2 from Europe, were welcomed to Brookhaven on Monday, August 6, by Laboratory Director George H. Vineyard. They will spend the next three weeks listening to formal presentations and participating in informal discussions in an effort to bridge the gap between those concerned with technically-oriented energy analysis and those whose concern is with the social sciences.

The study will focus on the methodological problems involved in determining specific external costs, starting with the problem of what part of our socio-economic system should be considered as the energy system for these purposes. Problems of dealing with health effects, long-term environmental impacts, public perception of costs, etc., will be addressed. The study will also examine the question of incorporating such costs into energy policy analysis and decisions.

The study group, whose members will reflect the multidisciplinary nature of the problem, will work together August 6 thru 24. Specialists will join the group for shorter periods. A report will be prepared summarizing the state-of-the-art as evaluated by the group and presenting the conclusions of the study.

The study will be sponsored by the Department of Applied Science of Brookhaven National Laboratory. The Energy Systems Analysis Group in that Department is engaged in a number of studies of the national energy systems and will provide the summer study with the technical background for its deliberations. This group is currently engaged in a number of energy systems studies relative to U.S. energy production and use. This work involves model development and policy evaluation.

Supporting the study are: Division of Bio-medical and Environmental Research of the Office of Planning and Analysis of the AEC; The National Science Foundation; and The Rockefeller Fund.

A study of biomedical and environmental costs of energy is being made, primarily by members of the Medical Department of BNL.

According to Philip Palmedo, Chairman of the Study Planning Group, "The questions of environmental and social impact of energy are now being dealt with in many places very superficially. The intent of this study is to delve a little more deeply into just what the impact of energy is, both in the positive and the negative sense."

All sessions of the Study Group are being held in Building 903, and run from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Next week's schedule of speakers includes: Dr. Charles Cicchetti, Department of Economics, University of Wisconsin, who will talk on the Trans-Alaska Pipeline; Dr. S. Fred Singer, Department of Environmental Sciences, University of Virginia, "Costs" of Global Environmental Impacts; and Dr. Ronald E. Wyzga, Environment Directorate, OECD, Paris, France, OECD Damage Costing Activities.

In addition to Palmedo, other Brookhaven people playing major parts in the study are: Vance Sailor, Murrey Goldberg, and Jerry Stein.



After the recent evening Specials in the Theatre, the Committee is hoping that a Sunday afternoon out-of-doors with the Isotope Stompers, The Homesteaders, and Jeannie C. will bring a big family crowd with blankets, picnic baskets, and soda.

Start making plans now.

The success of Jeannie C. Riley began with the popularity of her hit record "Harper Valley PTA." In the wake of hits that followed in the late 60's, such as "There Never Was a Time," "The Girl Most Likely," "Things Go Better with Love," and "Back Side of Dallas," Jeannie C. Riley grew up and matured as a performer, showing every indication of becoming an artist whose dimensions weren't to be limited to a single hit record.

With the decade of the 70's barely underway, she became the first female artist in Country Music to have her own prime-time network special (on NBC in 1970) - another in a series of career highlights that by then included highly successful engagements in Las Vegas headlining at both the Flamingo and Fremont Hotels, a NARAS Grammy Award in the Country field for "Best Female Vocal Performance," and a combined list of international record sales to rival those of any seasoned recording veteran.

To date, Jeannie's television credits have included guest spots on virtually every major variety program in the United States and Canada. Return shots on "The Glen Campbell Show," "The Tonight Show," "Kraft Music Hall," "The Ian Tyson Show" (of Canada), and "The Mike Douglas Show," among others, have been frequent. Equally well received on international screens, Jeannie has made several tours of Europe and the Continent, combining television guest appearances with live engagements.

The Homesteaders are made up of five talented individual musicians. Each individual has worked with other artists in Nashville prior to becoming a Homesteader. Because of this, the group is one of the most favored groups of the other artists who have appeared on shows with them and have been backed by them in concert.

Often when other artists are booked as a single on a show they will request the Homesteaders so that they may be backed by them during their performance. This group of talented musicians has found a new frontier and a new destination with a blend of modern beats into old traditional country music - a group that can walk on the stage and perform numbers ranging from blue grass to a country rock into a ballad and back to hard swinging, foot stomping beat, from comedy of a country nature that is blended with wit that can be appreciated by an intellectual. They are one of the few country groups that can walk out and perform a rock song to a pure country audience and sell it, or walk in front of a sophisticated country club audi-




Graphic Display From Crystnet




The Crystnet computer graphics terminal was recently installed in the Chemistry Department at Brookhaven National Laboratory. Additional terminals will be installed in October at the Cancer Institute in Philadelphia and at Texas A&M University. Assisting in the installation and operation are Gerd Dimmler of Instrumentation, and Graham Campbell and Herbert Bernstein of Applied Mathematics.

As part of the initial checkout phase of the project, the accompanying photographs of three-dimensional polynomial functions were made. Visiting Brookhaven this summer from Texas A&M University and working on this project are Edgar Meyer, Carl Morimoto, Tom Willoughby, and David Klunk. The project is coordinated locally by Thomas Koetzle, Chemistry.

When the communications link becomes operational, all three terminals will be hooked up to the CSCF computer. The Crystnet project has been funded by The National Science Foundation. This work was initiated by the late Walter C. Hamilton and Meyer.

She does, however, become romantically involved with Jos (Alan Bates), one of Meredith's many lovers, and has an affair with him while Meredith is at the hospital, having Jos's baby. Meredith is glad to give up her unwanted child to Georgy and Jos; and she returns to her other boyfriends. The love between Georgy and Jos eventually pales, and Jos moves out.

All ends happily when Leamington, whose shrewish wife has died, proposes to Georgy, agreeing to adopt her treasured child. Georgy accepts. This heartwarming film marked Lynn Redgrave's first starring role; for her part in it she shared the New York Film Critics Award as Best Actress with Elizabeth Taylor. The film's title song was one of the biggest hits of the year.

According to Judith Christ, New York World Journal Tribune, "*Georgy Girl* is a heart throb, a charmer that comes right from the depths of kitchen-sink drama to provide a Cinderella story that's as offbeat and kooky as the heroine thereof herself, right down to her size 12 slipper and whale-sized heart . . .
