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The More Things Change The More They Stay The Same

In the 118th Brookhaven Lecture, Mr. Charles Meinhold will discuss each of the major changes in the radiation protection standards from 1915 to 1971.

The changes will be treated in the historical context of their progression by highlighting the events which prompted them. It is not surprising to find that these developments correlate with the appearance of new inventions, world wars, political situations, and in some cases, even with advances in radiobiology! It follows that this will lead to a review of the standards we have today for both occupational and non-occupational exposures and to what we can expect in the next decade.

Although we may seem to be caught between the dire predictions of the prophets of doom and the somewhat autocratic assumptions of the standards setters, this brief historical review may help to put it all into perspective.

The 118th Brookhaven Lecture will be presented on Wednesday, April 18 at 8 p.m. in Berkner Hall. Mr. Meinhold will be introduced by Dr. C. J. Shellabarger of the Medical Department. Immediately following the lecture, refreshments will be available in the lobby of Berkner Hall.

Charles Meinhold is the Head of the Health Physics & Safety Division which



was recently expanded to include the Police and Fire Groups. He has been at Brookhaven since 1957. Shortly after joining the staff he became the Health Physics representative to the Biology and Medical Departments. In 1962 he joined the administrative group in the Division with particular responsibility for its training programs. He came to his present position in January 1972.

Mr. Meinhold recently completed an assignment as a member of an International Commission on Radiation Units and Measurements Task Group and is now chairing a National Council on Radiation Protection and Measurements Scientific Committee. He is a member of the AEC's traveling faculty for Regional Seminars on State Emergency Planning, and is also a member

Repeat Performance For Careers






Sid Thompson, Chemistry, and Ginnie Sayre, Directors, discuss placement of exhibits.

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Lloyd A. O'Laughlin

Lloyd A. O'Laughlin, administrative aide in the Graphic Arts group of Photography and Graphic Arts, died on Monday, April 9 at the age of 52.

Lloyd was born in the town of Onaka, South Dakota on September 15, 1920. He joined the US Army in 1939, and served at continental and overseas posts until the conclusion of World War II in 1945.

On May 19, 1947 he joined the staff of the Information Division of Brookhaven National Laboratory. From 1950 until his death, he worked in Graphic Arts.

Lloyd or "Ole" as he was known by his legions of friends, was always intensely interested in Laboratory activities, particularly the work of the Brookhaven Employees Recreation Association. The first issue of the Bulletin Board, in 1948 carries the note that Lloyd, along with others, was responsible for the preparation and editing of the weekly news of the activities of employees.

When Lloyd was elected to the BERA Executive Board in 1965, he was described as, "A one-time fast ball softball pitcher at BNL." Lloyd's other activities have included the chairmanship of our Bowling Awards Evening and many roles in Brookhaven Social activities, particularly as a member of our square dance band, 'The Fearsome Foursome.'

For many years Lloyd bowled and played softball as a member of the Phoubars, and was frequently hailed as being, "The Oldest Phoubar of All."

In community affairs, Lloyd was also very active, serving over the years in several important posts in the incorporated village of Belle Terre, where he lived with his wife Eileen of the Fiscal Division.

His many friends throughout the Lab will miss him. His cheerful voice over the phone and his warm personal welcome at the front desk of Graphic Arts, brightened the day for anyone who was fortunate enough to know him. He was "fine people" and a wonderful human being.

Masonic services were held on Wednesday evening and Funeral services on Thursday afternoon at the Casimir Funeral Home in Port Jefferson. Lloyd was buried in Long Island National Cemetery.

"La Salamandre" Coming Thursday

The French Group of BNL will present the film "La Salamandre" at Berkner Hall on Thursday, April 19, at 8:30 p.m. The film, which was released in New York last fall, is in French with English subtitles. Admission for non-members will be \$1.50.

There are three people in Alain Tanner's Swiss film "La Salamandre," a black-and-white movie that one remembers in so many shades of gray that it might have been in color.

First, Rosemonde (Bulle Ogier), an imperishable little lizard of a girl who goes through fire unchanged. She stuffs sausage skins in a factory, and hates her job with all her heart. Different moods engulf her from minute to minute; her face changes are extraordinary. Miraculously, she looks beautiful all the time. She was sent, as a school-girl, to live in Geneva with an uncle, a whining old warrior. He tells a story that once hit the newspapers about her having shot him in the shoulder with his rifle; she maintains that the incident happened when he was cleaning it.

Second, Pierre (Jean-Luc Bideau), a huge-framed, goofy-looking journalist much fascinated by the unmatching narratives. As much as the girl, he incarnates one of the themes of the film: the large number of modern people to whom the right to be themselves is systematically refused.

And then Paul (Jacques Denis), a low-key, lovable man with a lugubrious mustache like a Victorian bather's. He is a writer, living with his poet wife and his small daughter in a no man's land between the frontiers of France and Switzerland. He cheerfully cycles fifteen kilometers to see Pierre about writing a television script on Rosemonde. Every nerve end tells him he'll wreck his way of working if he gets to know her. But he does, and falls in love with her.

The film is about freedom and constriction: about the conditions that allow people to create images of themselves, and about being stalemated for economic and social reasons. It is no accident that the film is set in Switzerland - a small, isolationist country. A wish to be free and a clear longing for a wholeness that might be regained in a new form - these are the inextinguishable notions at the root of "La Salamandre."
