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Kriegsman To Replace Schlesinger On AEC

On April 12, the President announced his intention to nominate William E. Kriegsman, of Bethesda, Maryland, to be a Commissioner of the Atomic Energy Commission for the remainder of the term expiring June 30, 1975. He will succeed James R. Schlesinger, who is now Director of Central Intelligence.

Mr. Kriegsman has been Manager of the Washington, D.C., office of Arthur D. Little, Inc., since 1971. His work has been concentrated in the areas of energy, technology and the environment. From 1969 to 1971, he was a Staff Assistant at the White House, where his duties included the areas of the environment, space, nuclear energy and oceanography.

With the exception of one year (1965-66) as a congressional fellow on the staffs of Senator Howard H. Baker, Jr., of Tennessee, and Congressman Donald Rumsfeld of Illinois, Mr. Kriegsman served with the Atomic Energy Commission from 1957 to 1969. From 1957 to 1962 he was a Supervisory Health Physicist and from 1962 to 1969 he was an Inspection Specialist directing and conducting studies of AEC management problems.

He was born on February 22, 1932. He received his Bachelor's degree in chemistry from the University of Rochester in 1953 and his Master's degree in engineering administration from George Washington University in 1964. From 1953 to 1957 he was an officer in the U.S. Navy with duties including supervision of the nuclear weapons assembly team aboard an aircraft carrier.

Mr. Kriegsman is married and has two children. The Kriegsman's reside in Bethesda, Maryland.

LAMPF Accelerates Two Beams

The first simultaneous acceleration of both positive and negative hydrogen ions in a proton linear accelerator has been achieved by scientists of the Los Alamos Scientific Laboratory.

The event was confirmed at 7 p.m. April 6 by members of the Laboratory's Medium Energy Physics Division at the Clinton P. Anderson Los Alamos Meson Physics Facility.

Fifty microamperes of negative hydrogen (H^-) ions were accelerated simultaneously with 200 microamperes of positive hydrogen ions to energies greater than 100 million electron volts (MeV). This energy is also a record for the acceleration of H^- ions alone.

The new negative ion source was developed by Dr. Paul W. Allison and installed in the LAMPF negative ion injector and transport system built under the supervision of Dr. Ralph R. Stevens, Jr.

The two types of ions were accelerated in the LAMPF proton linear accelerator by timing the injection of the positively and negatively charged particles so they ride on opposite halves of the same accelerating wave. This feature doubles the utility of the accelerator at little extra cost and greatly expands the role of the facility.

The next goal is to increase the intensity of the beams and to accelerate them to energies greater than 200 MeV. Ultimately, the beams will be accelerated to 800 MeV.

BERA Concert Series

The last concert in the current series will be presented by the Museum Musicum Trio on Thursday, April 26, at 8:30 p.m. in Berkner Hall.

The Museum Musicum Trio specializes in early music and consists of Daniel Waitzman, Phil Levin, and Judith Norell. Part of the program to be presented at BNL will feature music of the early Renaissance for double reeds. The other part will consist of chamber works by Bach, Quantz, Telemann and other baroque composers, including some harpsichord solos by Ms. Norell.

David Waitzman, a 1971 Concert Artists Guild Award Winner, has achieved critical acclaim as a virtuoso performer of 18th century music on bell-keyed recorder, conical Boehm flute, and baroque flute. A member of several chamber groups, he has also appeared as soloist with Clarion Concerts, and has performed with The Bach Aria Group, and the Handel Society. Mr. Waitzman is Professor of Recorder at Queens College.

Phil Levin is the Music Director of the New York Recorder Guild. He received his B.A. in bassoon from Manhattan School of Music where he also was instrumental in starting an early music collegium. He has participated in numerous performances and recordings as a player of recorder, bassoon, Baroque bassoon, and other historical woodwinds, and has participated in or directed various early music workshops in the Eastern U.S. in recent years.

Judith Norell studied piano with Firkusny and Serkin. After becoming interested in the harpsichord while in London, she studied harpsichord at the Royal College of Music, and later with Albert Fuller at the Juilliard School, where she received her Masters Degree. She has performed extensively in the U.S. and Europe and is a member of various chamber groups.

Admission to the concert is \$4.00 for adults, \$2.00 for students under 25 years and senior citizens over 65 years, and free for those under 18.

tators alike. After awards of trophies and door prizes the crowd was entertained by a comedy monologue and treated to a live band for dancing till the late hours.




