## Reflect On This . . .

"I didn't see him until it was too late!"  
"It was too dark to have a clear view . . ."

Only pedestrians wearing reflectorized clothing are safely visible to drivers at all speeds says the American Optometric Association.

Since all-year Daylight Savings Time has been started there have been several real accidents involving children walking to school, and a large number of near-accidents that could have ended in tragedy.

While school officials are trying to educate the children in the hazards of early morning travel, it is important that parents do their share to minimize the risk of being injured. A piece of reflectorized tape sewed or ironed on to the sleeve or back of a jacket will make the garment or the child easily visible to drivers in the pre-daylight hours.

For Brookhaven drivers, it is important to be aware that children will be waiting in the dark shadows by the side of the road and may dart out into the path of a car. Most of the accidents involving children do not involve excessive speed, but are caused by the inattentiveness of the driver.

Be aware that children may be on the road when you are going to work in the pre-dawn hours. Use your bright lights, and expect the unexpected at all times and you may save a life!

## IBEW To Meet Jan. 24



## Medicare Reminder

Employees are reminded that their dependents who are eligible for Medicare upon reaching age 65 or because of a disability, are not insured under the Laboratory's Group Medical Insurance Plan for active employees. These individuals are provided at no cost, with the Laboratory's Medicare Major Medical Benefits Insurance Plan, which covers certain expenses not covered by either Medicare Part A or B.

Employees' spouses who are nearing or have reached age 65, should contact their nearest Social Security Office to enroll in Medicare if they have not already done so. The Laboratory's medical insurance coverage for such dependents is based on the assumption that they are eligible to collect benefits under Parts A and B of Medicare.

An individual's Medicare enrollment period is seven months long, extending from the third month prior to the month in which he reaches age 65 to the third month following the month of his 65th birthday.

## Lab Group Medical Insurance Revisions

Effective January 1, 1974 the following changes are being made in the Laboratory group medical insurance program.

As previously announced, as of that date employees will no longer pay any premium for their group medical insurance. Since July 1, 1969 there has been no cost to the employee for individual employee medical coverage, and now the Laboratory will pay the full cost of the group medical insurance program, including dependent's coverage.

The Laboratory group medical insurance presently covers employees terminating in the calendar year in which their 60th birthday occurs and continues to age 65 when they become eligible for Medicare. This has also been modified as follows.

An employee terminating at age 58 or older with at least three years of service will continue to receive Laboratory group medical insurance at no cost, whether associated with another institution or not. An employee retiring between age 55 and age 58 with at least three years of service will be allowed to continue the same group medical insurance coverage. Such employees who so elect will pay the full premium for this coverage, which currently is approximately \$17 per month per individual and \$60 per month per family. Starting the first day of the year in which a covered employee becomes 58, this insurance will be provided at no cost.

The Laboratory is also introducing a Coordination of Benefits provision into its group medical insurance program. If you or your family members are eligible to receive benefits from another group medical plan, which contains a Coordination of Benefits provision, benefits from the Laboratory's plan will be coordinated with the benefits from the other plan so that the allowable covered expenses will be paid jointly by the plans.

If, however, you or your family members are eligible to receive benefits from another group medical plan, which does not contain a Coordination of Benefits provision, benefits from the Laboratory's plan will not be coordinated. Thus there will be no loss to Laboratory employees as a result of the adoption of this provision.

## Tune In!

Whether or not the gas shortage is genuine, it is real. Despite notices in the Brookhaven Bulletin, there are still persons who defy the suggested economy measures. I have noted four Lab vehicles today left empty but with the engine idling. Some of these were left for as long as one-half hour; all but one vehicle were pick-up trucks.

Answer:

The reality of the gasoline shortage should be more evident to anyone who drives. The on-site Citgo station has been out of gas several times recently; off-site stations suffer the same dilemma with increasing frequency. BNL has been directed to decrease gasoline consumption, first by 7%, then 15%, and now a 20% goal is being considered. Still to come is a mandatory fuel allocation which will not guarantee gasoline when there isn't any; neither can the allocation be expected to match earlier consumption.

Be careful with your gas and with the Laboratory's gas as well. An idling engine does nothing for anyone; it is pure waste and is perhaps the largest single source of waste at BNL. We can burn a lot less fuel without suffering reduced mileage. Just 2 more miles per gallon at BNL would reduce gasoline consumption by 18%, and this is an attainable goal - Let's do it.

The week of January 11-17, 1974 is National Education Week on Smoking. It is now 10 years since the Surgeon General's report on smoking. Recent statistics indicate that about 40% of males and a smaller percentage of females are smokers.

In view of what is known about the harmful effect of smoking on both smokers and non-smokers and in recognition of the rights of non-smokers to breathe clean air, I would like to suggest a change in the arrangement of the cafeteria. An area should be set aside for smokers leaving most of the eating area for the majority, non-smoking population. By thus segregating smokers and indicating the social unacceptability of smoking it might help these unfortunates to free themselves from their addiction and make life a little more pleasant for everyone.
