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Need Help? Call RAP

It was two a.m. and the 2200 extension in BNL Police Headquarters was ringing. The patrolman on duty answered the phone, as he had been instructed, knowing the call could be originating anywhere on the Northeast from Maine down to Washington, D.C. The important thing was someone was requesting the aid of the Radiological Assistance Program (RAP).

This hypothetical scene occurred 21 times last year and has already taken place 35 times this year. "The requests seem to be increasing each year," says David Schweller, Chief, Technical Operations & Safety, Brookhaven AEC Area Office and RAP Regional Coordinator. He attributes the increase to a combination of things. First, since the beginning of the Program in the 1950's, there has been a greater use of radiological materials commercially, such as in the pharmaceutical industry. Also, the public is more aware of RAP than it has been in the past.

Originally, RAP was strictly a cooperative effort between the Atomic Energy Commission and the Department of Defense. It was formed to provide emergency assistance in the case of incidents involving nuclear weapons. But, in the 1950's, with the increased commercial use of radioactive materials, a need was seen to expand the program. The AEC divided the country into eight regions with an administrative center in each one.

The Brookhaven Area Office of the AEC coordinates the Program in Region I which covers the New England states, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland and Washington, D.C. The AEC draws on the resources of BNL in the way of trained personnel and specialized equipment.

RAP is an emergency service which can be called upon for assistance if a state cannot handle an incident involving radioactive materials. The responsibility of RAP members is to provide advice and assistance to cope with the incident until the safety of the community is insured. The Program was not designed to be used for routine procedures such as long term decontamination.

Approximately 38 BNL employees, primarily health physicists, are RAP team members. There are 12 team captains, one for each month. When a request is made for RAP assistance, the team captain for that month is the first to be notified.

A special RAP telephone extension, 345-2200, is manned 24 hours a day. During working hours it is answered in the on-site AEC office, usually by Schweller. After working hours or if the office is closed, the phone is answered in BNL Police Headquarters.

Brookhaven receives 25 percent of all RAP requests. This is because the nuclear industry is concentrated in the Northeast, explains Schweller. Approximately 75 percent of all the calls are transportation related and originate from airline, train, bus and trucking terminals. In some cases radioactive materials are poorly packed or mishandled and are lost or released from their containers.

A common call has been coined by RAP members as the "wet package request." Sometimes a package containing radio-

Blood and Marrow Sought For Research

Brookhaven National Laboratory employees who participate in the Medical Department's research program as contributors of blood or bone marrow for laboratory studies may now receive payment.

In several related studies scientists investigate the characteristics of human blood cells and the bone marrow from which the blood cells originate. Also procedures are investigated for labeling various elements and molecules in the blood with radioactive nuclides. Much of the work involves the study of blood and bone marrow from patients with disorders related to blood. To characterize samples from these patients, however, it is necessary to make laboratory comparisons with samples from individuals with no blood related disorders.

To meet this need for blood and marrow to be used in laboratory studies, the Medical Department has established procedures whereby Brookhaven National Laboratory employees may be compensated \$10.00 for a withdrawal of up to 50 milliliters of blood and \$50.00 for up to 10 milliliters of bone marrow. If both are withdrawn at the same time the contributor would receive \$60.00.

A list of individuals wishing to participate will be maintained at the Hospital and as the needs for marrow and/or blood for the laboratory studies arise, individuals will be called. Obtaining blood for laboratory studies is in no way a part of the blood donor program sponsored by the American Red Cross to provide blood for patients.

Requirements for participation in this program are that the individual be a Brookhaven National Laboratory employee, at least 21 years of age and in good health. As samples will be taken as scheduled during the regular working hours (8:30 a.m. - 5:00 p.m.), absence from one's regular duties must be approved by the individual's supervisor. The total time required in the Medical Department for taking a blood sample will be approximately 10 minutes; for taking a bone marrow sample, approximately 30 minutes.

Three of the biggest wheeler-dealers on site are Art Nelson, Joe Kenneally and Fred Altrui. They're the guys who see to it that BNL has an adequate supply of bicycles.

Nelson and Altrui work out of the Supply and Materiel office. There, with the help of computer printouts, they are able to keep tabs on the inventory of thousands of items, including bicycles. When the supply of bikes on hand falls below the standard in-stock quantity (usually about six), they place an order, with specifications, to the Purchasing Division, where the actual buying is done. Joe Kenneally is the man who handles that end of the business.

Since 1971, over 150 two-wheelers have been purchased. About two-thirds of these are men's styles; the remainder are ladies'. The bicycles are purchased from local stores and must meet quality requirements previously established by S&M quality control man John Schneider and a team of purchasing agents.

A set of BNL wheels is a restricted item and requires Department approval before one can be drawn from stock. "They're really good, though," says Altrui; "They save gasoline, they're good exercise and you can get around site pretty fast on them."

Do any of these three big wheels know how to ride a bike? Altrui says he rides a bike at home - sometimes, and Nelsen says he's good for about three rides a week. Kenneally is another story. "Heck," he says, "the last time I rode a bike it was the three-wheeler I used to pedal around the Bronx. That was awhile ago."

active materials gets wet during transport, either by rain or snow. The conclusion reached when this happens is that the package is leaking and a request is often made for a RAP team to check it out.

The immediate needs of a RAP team, such as instrumentation, protective clothing, maps, and travel vouchers, are kept at Police Headquarters. Specialized instruments, are stored in the Calibration Laboratory where they are calibrated once a month. This equipment has been designated exclusively for RAP and is not used routinely. Some of the equipment, like the fidler kit, is highly sophisticated. This kit is capable of measuring extremely low doses of gamma radiation, normally associated with plutonium and other alpha emitters.

An important part of RAP is the Interagency Radiological Assistance Program (IRAP). Eleven different federal agencies can be called upon for assistance. For example, if a RAP team needs emergency air transportation they can depend upon the U.S. Coast Guard for helicopters. The extensive radiological laboratory facilities of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare are available for use by RAP.

An environmental or health agency in each Region I state is constantly on call to investigate RAP related incidents. These agencies are equipped with routine monitoring equipment. Last year, out of 21 RAP requests, the AEC sent assistance only twice and gave advice in three instances. The states were able to handle the remaining 16 requests themselves.

Over the years since its beginnings, RAP has developed into a vast network of agencies and individuals working together to insure the safety of the public.

Would not a ruler have been a good object to show the metric system of measurement. It would seem to me that using the human body to sell a system in this day and age is both an antiquated and passé idea.


