

Benefit Statement Mailed To Homes

A new, personalized statement of each employee's present insurance and retirement benefits will be mailed next week to the home address of all regular full-time and eligible part-time employees.

The data for this computer-prepared statement were obtained from the Laboratory's payroll and personnel records. The statement reflects each individual employee's various group insurance coverages (premiums, beneficiaries, and disability benefits) and AUI and employee contributions (including current allocation) to the retirement plan.

The purpose of this statement is to provide employees and their families with a better understanding of their AUI benefits program and to insure that their insurance coverages and beneficiaries are correct and up to date.

Not Too Soon To Plan

On May 14, BERA will once again hold an estate planning seminar in Berkner Hall, starting at 8 p.m.


The educational seminar has been developed by three organizations: Putnam Company, Inc.; Merrill, Lynch, Pierce, Fenner & Smith, Inc. and the Analytical Planning Corporation. The seminar consists of a colorful 45-minute slide presentation followed by a discussion. Representatives of Putnam and Merrill-Lynch and a lawyer, well versed in matters of trusts and estates, will be present to answer questions.

The information is broadly informative, covering estate tax returns, wills, trusts, joint ownership of property, gifts and exclusions, and how to avoid unnecessary taxation through proper estate planning. The seminar will be public service oriented, with only a few mentions made that a product might be negotiated for sale.

A confidential information sheet will be presented to all participants. Its completion enables the Analytical Planning Corporation to give an individual financial appraisal, at no charge, to those who wish further advice on their estate planning problems. If the form is completed and forwarded, a representative of Merrill-Lynch will contact the individual after the information has been summarized by the Analytical Planning Corporation. The decision to proceed further is the choice of the individual.

Lab Blooms Into Open House '75

Evidences of Open House '75 are springing up all over site. Each day something is added to the BNL landscape, reminding all that May 17 and 18 are drawing closer.

One of the most outstanding additions to the landscape is a huge piece of abstract art, formed from 216 tons of radiation shielding blocks, donated by the Accelerator Department.

The design for the massive artwork is the creation of Beverly and Marty Plotkin, Accelerator.

The Megalith, as it is called, stands at the intersection of the William Floyd Parkway and the main entrance to the Lab. Standing 13-feet high and 28-feet wide, it is an impressive welcome to visitors coming to the Lab for Open House. The smallest blocks weigh 2-tons and the largest are 30-tons each.

This type of shielding block is normally used at the AGS. They are made of a special high density concrete, weighing almost twice as much per cubic foot as regular concrete. Sand and gravel are mixed with cement and water to form regular concrete, while high density concrete is made by combining iron titanium oxide with cement and water.

Colorful signs are also popping up, directing visitors to information centers (white), physical sciences (red), life sciences (green), and applied sciences (blue).

Over 60 V.I.P.'s and members of the press have been invited to the Lab on Fri-

day, May 16 to attend a preview of Open House '75. Those who have already accepted the invitation are ERDA Administrator Robert Seamans, AUI President Gerald Tape, N.Y. Congressmen Jerome Ambro and Norman Lent, Brookhaven Town Councilman Robert Reid and Guy Ferri, representing the International Atomic Energy Agency.

During Open House '75 Lab employees are urged to come on site via the north gate to ease the traffic flow through the main gate. This also applies to those employees coming to Open House with their families. Employees who will be working might want to bring their lunches since the cafeteria will be quite crowded.


Exchange Of Ideas

More Than Half Way!




